



American Heritage Month

In the U.S., November is [Native American Heritage Month](#). The month is meant to call attention to contributions made by the first Americans to the development of North America, and to raise awareness about the struggles and triumphs of Native Americans throughout history and today. One such struggle is the vulnerability to human trafficking experienced by Indigenous peoples. One study involving the U.S. and Canada found that on average, [40 percent of female sex trafficking victims](#) identified as American Indian, Alaska Native, or First Nations, although Native women represent only 10 percent or less of the general population in the studied communities.
