COP 22 – Moving from Agreement to Action

At the recently held UN Climate Change conference (COP 22), 196 countries and the European
Union pledged to move forward on their 2015
Paris Agreement commitment to hold the increase in the global average temperature to well below 2 °C above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5 °C above pre-industrial levels. To date, 112 countries, responsible for 80% of global greenhouse emissions, have ratified the Paris climate agreement. Learn more about the outcomes of the COP 22 meeting. 2017 Hunger Report

Bread for the World Institute has released its 2017 Hunger Report: Fragile Environments, Resilient Communities. The report explains why ending hunger globally demands a clear focus on supporting fragile countries, where two-thirds of people facing hunger will live by 2030. These are nations torn apart by civil conflicts, weak governments, and the destabilizing effects of climate change. The report includes a four-

section <u>study guide</u> with specific actions readers can take to mobilize their communities around anti-hunger advocacy.

Wounded Knee to Standing Rock

December 29 marks the anniversary of the Wounded Knee Massacre on the Lakota Pine Ridge Indian Reservation in 1890. That was also the site of a second conflict in 1973. In both conflicts, the U.S. government's failure to
