Featured Dr. Kimberly Vrudny, Professor of Systematic Theology at the University of St. Thomas. Professor Vrudny outlined stages of racial identity development, tracking the stages in lives of black folk as well as white folk. In addition, she discussed the "Blackness of God" with reference to a famous essay by AME theologian, James Cone.

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Activity for Personal Integration:

Write a ["Letter to the Editor,"](#) or ["Letter to an Elected Official,"](#). Think about how you will craft each section based on what you've learned in the past six weeks of Solidarity Summer. What has meant most to you? What do you most want the wider community to know? And what would you like to see happen in the community as a result of taking in this knowledge?

- Write a salutation
- Grab your reader's attention with the opening line.
- Concisely explain the purpose and what your letter is about.
- Explain why the issue is important or summarize your understanding of the issue.

- Give evidence for praise or criticism of something related to racism happening in your community.
- State your opinion about what should be done or your position on the issue.
- Sign the letter.

Once you're satisfied with the letter, consider sending it to your news outlet of choice, or to your elected representatives.

For Personal Reflection:

Reflect on the phrase, "Becoming Human," especially in conversation with Jane Alexander's sculpture depicting three monstrous men who represent, according to Vrudny's interpretation, "whiteness," insofar as they participate in the destruction of black and brown lives.

Is it "monstrous", i.e., "sinful" in theological vocabulary, for a culture to bestow privileges to some on the basis of ethnicity?

Is it "monstrous", i.e., "sinful" in theological vocabulary, for a culture to bestow privileges on the basis of gender? Or is there a difference and, if so, why?
