Introduction

Education is a fundamental human right; it is essential for the achievement of all the other rights. Nevertheless, there are nearly 781 million people around the world who are unable to read. About 58 million children still remain out of school. Many youth, adult women and men go through life without learning that they need to know in order to conduct their lives with dignity and health.

Quality of education is a distant dream for many, especially for girls from poor families in rural areas. They are among the children who face the biggest barriers to access to education due to a combination of factors – such as poverty, gender inequality, geographic isolation.

Experience

Colégio Nossa Senhora de Lourdes (Our Lady of Lourdes School) is part of the School Sisters of Notre Dame network (SSND) in the Province of Latin America and the Caribbean. It is located in the wilderness of the Northeast Area of Brazil. For the past 25 years it has prepared teachers for both public and private schools. Kelly Cartaxo reports her educational path. She is among the many young girls and women who have had the opportunity to participate in this teacher formation (Magisterium) through scholarships provided by SSND.

“Education for all” is unknown in many countries, including Brazil. I began my teaching career when I decided to do a Teacher Training Course at high school in 1988. I was 15 years old and pregnant with my first daughter. Many times I wondered why I had chosen this course since my shyness was very strong. Slowly, with the help of teachers, I began to identify and find for myself my life purpose. In 1990, the School Sisters of Notre Dame arrived at Colégio Nossa Senhora de Lourdes, in Cajazeiras. From that time on, already in the last year of my course, I began to understand my vocation/mission in the way of being and doing of the SSNDs. They believed in me and I could see myself teaching with passion and feeling. I accepted all the challenges given to me and achieved great success in my apprenticeship. This led to my entrance as a teacher at Colégio Nossa Senhora de Lourdes. All the formation that I received, first as a student and then as a teacher, made me fall more in love each day with school education.

In the first years I worked as an elementary school teacher. Then I worked in early childhood education, as the coordinator of the elementary school, and in the teacher’s training course at the high school. I also worked for 15 years as a teacher in the same Training Course. I am happy because this course helped me to be who I am as a woman, mother and educator. I believe that EDUCATION is the key for a better nation. Many young women coming from poor and rural areas receive scholarships to become teachers, good professionals/educators in the tradition of Mother Theresa’s educational principles.

Reflection

In *You Are Sent*, General Directory 33 we read: “A particular concern in all ministries is the establishment of a just society. a) We call ourselves and others to embody gospel values and to live the social teachings of the church. Working toward the enablement of persons and the promotion of human dignity, we contribute to positive systemic change in society.”
