Executive Order Puts Achieving Climate Pledge in Jeopardy

President Trump has rolled back key Obama-era greenhouse gas regulations – drawing [rebuke from several Catholic groups](#) and environmentalists throughout the country. The order itself did not address the Paris climate accord, but if fully enacted, puts achieving the U.S. pledge in serious doubt. See [these graphic images](#) illustrating this concern. Recognizing that (as Pope Francis reminds us) climate change is “one of the principal challenges facing humanity in our day,” we urge you to [contact your legislators](#) to express your concerns with President Trump’s executive order and to urge them to take leadership on climate action



and block any proposals to cut the budgets for the EPA and climate science research. If you are represented by a Republican in the House of Representatives, consider [inviting him/her](#) to join the bipartisan Climate Solutions Caucus (or thank those who are already members).

April 22 is Earth Day

Our planet is truly a magnificent place. The Earth is an incredibly complex and vibrant ecosystem, where living organisms interact with each other and their environment to create the ideal conditions for life. We have it all: it’s warm but not too warm, lots of water but again, not too much. It’s perfect. And it’s in trouble. Famine Crisis

The world’s largest humanitarian crisis in 70 years has been declared in three African countries on the brink of famine, just as President Donald Trump proposes to [cut foreign aid](#) by almost a third. A cut like this would be devastating to the world’s poorest. 106 faith leaders recently united to send a letter to congressional leaders urging “support for the International Affairs Budget that every day brings hope to poor, hungry, vulnerable and displaced men, women and children around the world.” With so many global conflicts, countries on the brink of famine, and a worldwide refugee crisis in full bloom, [now is not the time to cut foreign aid](#). International aid makes up less than 1% of the federal budget — yet it provides lifesaving assistance to tens of millions of people in need. Catholic Leaders Appeal for Support of Refugees


Over 4,000 priests, religious brothers and sisters (including many SSNDs) and deacons recently shared a statement with President Trump and other political leaders urging support for refugees, specifically calling upon “our elected officials to ensure that refugees of all ethnic and religious backgrounds have equal access to the U.S. resettlement program.” The statement explained that, “Our Catholic community will continue to stand with refugees and other marginalized migrant populations. We will continue to advocate for the recognition and protection of the human dignity of all. And we will recommit to work with our government in order to ensure that our resettlement program is both secure and accessible to the vulnerable refugees in need of our compassion, welcome, and support.” Read the full statement [here](#). Polaris Project has analyzed more than 32,000 cases of human trafficking over the past nine years and has identified 25 unique types of trafficking that exist in the United States. Education for All

The Basic Education Coalition (BEC) submitted its fiscal year 2018 appropriations request for international basic education to congressional appropriators this month. This year, [BEC urged Congress](#) to approve a basic education funding level of \$925 million, with at least \$800 million provided for bilateral assistance programs. BEC is supporting a congressional sign-on letter urging appropriators to support international basic education in FY18. This letter is being spearheaded by Congressmen Dave Reichert (R-WA) and Mike Quigley (D-IL). Consider urging your members of Congress to support this letter.


Peace and Non-Violence

Pope Francis Urges Elimination of Nuclear Weapons

In his message to the [UN Conference on prohibiting nuclear weapons](#), Pope Francis said that the strategy of nuclear deterrence was not an effective response to today's threats to peace and security: terrorism, cybersecurity, environmental problems and poverty. "Peace must be built on justice, on integral human development, on respect for fundamental human rights, on the protection of creation, on the participation of all in public life, on trust between peoples, on the support of peaceful institutions, on access to education and health, on dialogue and solidarity." On April 11 we make the 54th anniversary of [Pacem in Terris](#) in which Pope John XXIII contends that peace needs to be “founded on truth, built according to justice, vivified and integrated by charity and put into practice in freedom.” This month we also celebrate the 1 year anniversary of the [Nonviolence and Just Peace Conference](#) which affirmed pro-action, nonviolent approaches to peace-making at all levels and asserted that “only by considering all as brothers and sisters can humanity overcome wars and conflicts”.
