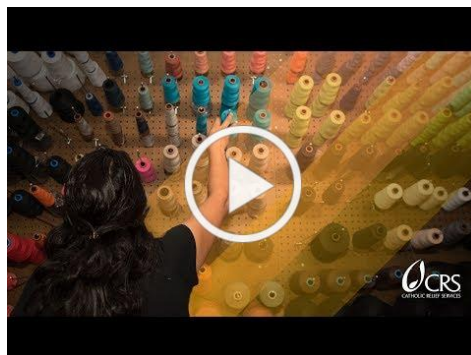
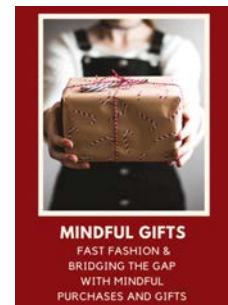
A historic deal to establish a "loss and damage" fund for countries vulnerable to the devastating impacts of a warming world was reached at the recently concluded United Nations Climate Change Summit (COP27). Catholic and other religious attendees hailed this development as "a real breakthrough," but acknowledged that the new fund will fail to aid those already suffering from situations and promises which have not yet been delivered or implemented. ### Purchasing Power Used for Common Good

In this Advent season, let us take time to consider our advances in simple and sustainable living and make changes to our purchasing habits so that they best uphold human dignity and the care of all earth's communities. Pope Francis tells us, "Purchasing is always a moral – and not simply economic – act." When considering a purchase, it is helpful to reflect upon such questions as – Are the rights of workers upheld concerning fair wages, safe working conditions, the right to organize, etc.? Does the product or its manufacture adversely affect the environment? Consider purchasing from companies (like [SERRV](#) and [Ten Thousand Villages](#)) that certify their products as fair trade or are transparent about their supply chain (where and how products are produced). ### UN Biodiversity Conference (12/7 - 12/19)

The UN Biodiversity Conference (COP15) will be held in Montreal, Quebec from December 7 - 19. Despite on-going efforts, biodiversity is deteriorating worldwide and this decline is projected to worsen with business-as-usual scenarios. The [UN Biodiversity Conference](#) will convene governments from around the world to agree to a new set of goals for nature over the next decade through the Convention on Biological Diversity [post-2020 framework](#) process. The framework sets out an ambitious plan to implement broad-based action to bring about a transformation in society's relationship with biodiversity and to ensure that, by 2050, the shared vision of living in harmony with nature is fulfilled. Ahead of this milestone celebration, starting on this year's Human Rights Day, December 10, 2022, the UN will launch a year-long campaign to showcase the UDHR by focusing on its legacy, relevance, and activism. ### St. Juan Diego (12/10) and Our Lady of Guadalupe (12/12)

At the height of the worst massacres of the Indigenous in history, the genocide by explorers, Mary, a Nahuatl woman and Mother of God, Téotl, came to a poor, dignified farmer, Juan Diego of the Nahuatl Tribe in Mexico in 1531. She also healed his uncle and converted their new bishop, Fray Juan de Zumárraga. Mary became known as Our Lady of Guadalupe, Mother of the Americas, Mother of the New Creation. Bringing dignity and honor to Indigenous and converting the hearts of oppressors, she knows we all need her help urgently, again, today. Mary promised: "I will give to all people, all my love, my compassion, my help and my protection, because I am your merciful mother and the mother of all nations that live on this earth, of all who love me and speak with me, of all who search for me and trust me. I will hear their laments. I will heal and cure all their miseries, misfortunes and sorrows." ## The Holy Family and Migrants

Since 2000, the United Nations has recognized December 18 as International Migrants Day. It is a day to uphold our brothers and sisters who choose to or are forced to migrate due to economic, environmental or social strife. There are an estimated 281 million, or 3.6% of the global population, living in a country other than their country of birth. See the [UN's interactive migration report for 2022](#).

During the Advent Season, we remember that the Holy Family was a migrant family – on the move to Bethlehem and then to Egypt to escape Herod's threat to kill the newborn Jesus. What are our attitudes towards strangers seeking to live among us? As Christians, we are called to welcome the stranger, and when we do so, we welcome God in person. In doing this, we will be made richer through their gifts of culture, skill, energy, and faith. Like migrants around the world, we too, are on a journey with God. Let us accompany one another, like the biblical innkeeper who assisted the Holy Family, offering help and refuge to those in need. ### SSND Voter Voice - Let Your Voice Be Heard

Several important legislative items we have been tracking – focused on immigration, human trafficking, farmworkers, truth and reconciliation for indigenous peoples, preserving wildlife, and avoiding war/promoting peace – need to receive final approval in the U.S. Congress by January 3 or they fail and can only be considered again if re-introduced in the next Congress. We urge you to take a few minutes this week (and again next week) to use our [SSND Voter Voice Tool](#) to let your voice be heard and urge Congress to act on these important matters.





### Addressing Gun Violence in the U.S.

The United States has averaged nearly two mass shootings a day this year, according to the Gun Violence Archive, which tracks when four or more people are shot. Too often these tragedies are written off to individual cases of mental illness. That does not explain why the U.S has had more than [600 mass shootings](#) every year since 2020 and why no other country has anything close to this level of gun violence. As stated in a recent [Washington Post opinion](#) – “the fact that no single action will stop all mass shootings is no excuse not to do things that could prevent some of them or lower the toll when they happen.”

We join with LCWR (read [Statement on Colorado Springs Shooting](#)) and others in calling on elected officials at all levels to take action and pledge to continue our efforts to promote nonviolence and respect for all life. Urge Congress to [take action here](#). This December marks the 10-year anniversary of the tragic mass shooting at Sandy Hook Elementary School. Vigils to mark this anniversary and call for action to address gun violence will be held in Washington DC and throughout the United States. [Click here](#) to learn more and participate.

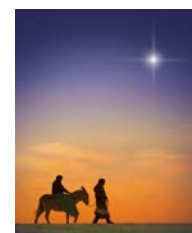
### Roses in December (12/2)
