

Global Education

On February 2, world leaders will be [meeting in Dakar, Senegal](#), to pledge their support for the right of every child, everywhere, to receive a quality education by supporting the Global Partnership for Education (GPE). A staggering 263 million children and youth around the globe are not in school, and millions more don't gain the necessary skills to read and write due to a poor-quality education. [This isn't right. Urge your Senator](#) to voice their support for Global Education.

DACA Deal Reality

Stakeholders working toward a deal on the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals, those young

undocumented immigrants who came to the U.S. as children, are still hopeful. But the restrictions dictated by the White House and some Republicans pose a tremendous gap to bridge. The proposed deal does offer a path to citizenship for an estimated 1.8 million undocumented immigrants, but also supports upwards of \$25 billion for a wall and other border security. It also ends family migration beyond spouses and minor children and abolishes the diversity visa lottery.

The best chance for a legislative solution for Dreamers may very well be as part of a spending bill Congress needs to pass by February 8 - so contacting Congress now is essential. We urge you to [send emails/write letters](#), make [phone calls](#), and pray - lots of prayers.

Temporary Protected Status

Since earthquakes in El Salvador in January and February of 2001 destroyed thousands of homes and killed more than 1,000 people, nearly 200,000 people from that country have been allowed to live in the United States. But the Trump administration says that the TPS program has turned into a somewhat permanent

benefit for those people and, since the conditions caused by the earthquake no longer exist, the TPS designation must be terminated. Salvadorans have until September of 2019 to get their affairs in order and leave this country. Advocates say that, although El Salvador has rebuilt since the earthquakes, extreme violence in the country has inhibited investment and job creation and prompted tens of thousands to flee. Human Trafficking found in over 9,000 Massage Businesses

By mapping and cross referencing numerous publicly available datasets, Polaris found more than 9,000 illicit massage businesses operating in America. They exist in every single state and revenues for these businesses total approximately \$2.5 billion a year. Evidence gathered from the Hotline, from focus groups and from extensive case studies suggest that thousands of women are being trafficked in massage parlors in the United States on any given day.


International Day of Prayer and Awareness against Human Trafficking (2/8)
