



NLCS D2 ENRICHMENT PROGRAM Year 3: PROFESSIONAL ROLES and RESPONSIBILITIES 2017-2018

PURPOSE AND DESCRIPTION:

The Enrichment Program will supplement and complement the programs of study taken by scholars at their respective individual universities. The focus of this year will be to explore various postdoctoral career options, be prepared to enter the job market, and to continue to develop collaborative relationships.

COMPETENCIES:

By the end of this Enrichment Year, Scholars will be able to:

1. Describe, compare, and contrast the roles and responsibilities of different positions within universities (e.g., teaching, research, post-doctoral, and service responsibilities);
2. Describe the roles and responsibilities of educational program administrators (e.g., in SEA, LEA, LA, and EIS programs);
3. Describe the roles and responsibilities for leadership within organizations (e.g., non-profits, educational or university programs);
4. Describe and demonstrate general and specific job-seeking skills;
5. Describe the skills needed to develop collaborative relationships; identify potential collaborators within and/or across fields.

FORMAT OF COURSE

The Enrichment Program consists of two main parts 1) technologically mediated course using Blackboard Learning Management System and 2) two face-to-face meetings.

Blackboard Portion

Faculty members of the Consortium and guests (e.g., authors, researchers, PAC members) will lead discussions on an assigned topic using the Blackboard system administered by Salus University (<https://ecampus.salus.edu/webapps/login/>). Individuals leading the discussions may pose questions prior to the discussion and answer questions and provide feedback throughout. Synchronous and asynchronous meetings may be scheduled on Blackboard, with small group and/or individual work throughout. **The Blackboard portion of the Program will run from September, 2017 to April, 2018.** See schedule below for more details.

Face-to-face Component

There are two required face-to-face meetings that are part of the Enrichment Program. These meetings offer both structured time for scholars to engage in topics related to research with their peers, Consortium faculty, PAC members, and the project staff, as well as unstructured times to develop relationships and collaborate efforts.

The first meeting will be held at the Project Director's Conference in Washington, DC on September 25-26, 2017. The second meeting will be held at a relevant spring conference (*tentative*: ASCD conference, March 24-26, 2018, Boston, MA).

SCHOLAR REQUIREMENTS

1. Participation

- **Attendance and active and thoughtful participation in the online Enrichment activities, as well as face-to face meetings, are required as a condition of funding.**
- Participation will be evaluated by session leaders for each topical discussion. (See rubric in Blackboard for guidance on thoughtful posts in online activities. This rubric will be used by session leaders to provide feedback to scholars on their participation.) If the scholar receives university credit for the course, the final grade will be the responsibility of the scholar's university advisor, with input from the Management Team if desired.

2. Readings

- Complete all required readings and activities assigned by session leaders.
- A list of *recommended* readings can be found in the Blackboard course.

3. Projects/Activities:

- Mock interview participation, to take place at an upcoming face-to-face meeting.
- Small-group or paired activities, to be discussed further by session leaders during the online component of Enrichment.
