conversation. The first of these screenings will take place on Monday evening, April 30. We will watch the film *Trigger: The Ripple Effect of Gun Violence* and follow up with a panel discussion. The panel will include public officials such as **Congressman Ro Khanna** and community leaders like **Rev. Erik Swanson**, a local Presbyterian pastor who is leading local efforts to address gun violence.



This series will also include films about immigrant detention, the Syrian refugee crisis, and about Presbyterian disaster relief efforts following the Indian Ocean Tsunami in 2004. Keep checking <u>our website</u> for additional dates and times.

<u>Discipleship</u> Focuses on Christian Life and the Workplace

On April 9 Bay Area business consultant Lanny Vincent will deliver a brief lecture, "Make Meaning Before Money."

After the lecture, Discipleship elder **Barry Vickrey** will interview Vincent and invite audience members to engage in discussion. A light supper of salads and sandwiches will be provided before the lecture at 7 PM.

Vincent's lecture is based on a chapter from his book, A Primer on Innovation Theology: Responding to Change in the Company of God (2017), which is available in the church library and from Book Sales on Sundays. Vincent, a former Presbyterian pastor, will discuss where and why we create value for others (innovate) and how we imagine God to be involved in our meaning-making (theology) and value-making (economics).

Beginning April 15, Discipleship will offer a five-week class on "Vocation."

Barry Vickrey will lead the class, in which those attending will be encouraged to discuss their experiences in the workplace. Specific class topics will include what the Bible says about vocation, how to maintain a balance of work, personal and family life, and service, and how to apply Christian values in Silicon Valley's diverse, secular workplaces. The class will also explore the application of Christian values to two current topics: sexual harassment and business exploitation of addictive technologies.



Spring Choir Concert

The texts and music move from pouring out grief, and wrestling with the problem of pain and sorrow,



to finding hope in Christ's redemption, seeing God's glory in His creation, and arriving at rest and peace in Christ, even while living in our broken world. Music by Ralph Vaughan Williams rounds out the program: Five Mystical Songs featuring a baritone soloist; an organ setting of "For All the Saints;" and a majestic setting of Psalm 100 for choir, orchestra, and audience.

Child care for ages 6 months to 6 years will be provided and everyone is invited to a reception immediately following the concert. A free-will offering will be collected to help offset the concert costs.

Income continues to be more than expenses resulting in a \$52K surplus. It is expected that we will end this current year on March 31 with an estimated surplus around \$5K. 
Financial Highlights from the **Annual Meeting on March 18**

Giving remains steady.

The number of 2018 pledges is up 1% from 2017 and pledged dollars are down less than 1%. This is not the usual experience for churches that have a change in leadership. It is typical to see giving drop when there is new staff.

The April 2018-March 2019 budget reflects a \$128K deficit.

To help us fulfill the vision of ministry articulated in the 2015 Mission Study Report (MSR), we are investing in our employees, marketing, and facilities. The MSR affirmed our commitment to maintain our strengths in worship and community, but also challenged us to grow in mission and outreach. Our need is for additional giving in 2018 to reduce our budgeted deficit. We are grateful for your generosity and faithfulness to this ministry.

agencies. One of those agencies was Amigos de Guadalupe Center for Justice and Empowerment, which was born out of a vision to break the cycle of poverty in the Mayfair neighborhood in East San Jose. Supporting first generation college students with scholarships is a major focus of Amigos.

Inspired by their presentation, several members of our church volunteered to mentor students, who are first in their families to attend college. The Executive Director of Amigos, **Maritza Maldonado** and Board Member, **Nancy Pang**, have partnered with us in carrying out a pilot program. In addition to six members from our church, several members of the Amigos Board have mentored students during this year.

At a recent "all mentor" meeting, participants shared what has been learned from the pilot program and how it can be strengthened for the 2018–19 school year. One goal is to increase the number of mentors, as Amigos anticipates being able to provide as many as 25 scholarships this spring.




