



### **VERSES TO LIVE BY**

Encountering Torah one verse at a time

פָּנִוּ וּ וּסְעַוּ לָכֶּׁם וּבֹּאוּ הַר הָאֱמֹרְ ٞוְאֶל־כָּל־שָׁבַנִיוֹ בְּעֲרָבָה בָהֶר וּבִשְׁפַלָה וּבַנֶּגֶב וּבְחוֹף הַיֶּם אֶרֶץ הָכְּנַעֲנִיּ וְהַלְבָנוֹן עִד־הַנַּחָר הַגַּּלִל נְהַר־פָּרַת:

Turn away and make your way to the hill country of the Amorites and to all their neighbors in the Arabah, the hill country, the Shephelah, the Negeb, the seacoast, the land of the Canaanites, and the Lebanon, as far as the Great River, the river Euphrates.

\*Devarim 1:7\*

Right at the lowest point of the Jewish year, we always begin reading a new book. The Jewish calendar is arranged so that parashat *Devarim* always starts on the Shabbat before the fast of the 9th of Av. Commentators even point out that the word that begins the scroll of Lamentations - *Eicha!* - appears in this Torah portion, and that verse is usually sung to "*Eicha* chant," as is most of the paired Haftarah.

But Rabbi Alan Lew z"l sees this parashah differently.

In his classic book about the High Holydays, *This Is Real And You Are Completely Unprepared* \* he sets out a thesis that the High Holyday season doesn't just comprise Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, or even the period that starts with Rosh Hashanah and ends with Simchat Torah. Instead, he argues that the High Holydays begin this week, with Tisha B'Av.

And our verse this week is one of his prooftexts. He points out that the Hebrew verb *peh nun heh* shows up seven times in this Torah portion. *Panah* means 'to turn'. In the verse that precedes ours, Moses recalls God saying to the people, "you have stayed here at Sinai long enough."

We can almost hear an impatience in those words, "turn away." It is as if the people are being pushed out of a sense of being settled, being complacent, and asked, instead, to take another journey. Unlike the one their ancestor Abraham took, this has a known destination - but it is still long and full of unknowns along the way. And the people do, indeed, begin to move on. It's as if they know they must.

Seven times the commandment to turn is repeated, just here, at the time that is seven weeks before Rosh Hashanah. Rabbi Lew teaches that this turning, this dislocation, is the beginning of the process of *teshuvah*, the process that reminds us that change is always possible.

And this year, the parashah seems to be speaking directly to the pandemic. As we watch the numbers of the sick rise around us this year, we might feel that we are locked down in ways that are not only physical. The thought of any kind of a journey feels impossible. But change is happening around us at such an accelerated rate that even though we might not be able to travel far from our homes, we already know that we will emerge from this process different to when it began.

So perhaps it's time to turn towards it.
