



VERSES TO LIVE BY

Encountering Torah one verse at a time

הינה לכם לציצת וראיהם אנו זכרם את כל מאנז' יהוה ונשעיהם אתם ולא תחרו אתני לבבכם ואחרי עניכם אשרארכם נזם אפריקם:

That shall be your fringe; look at it and recall all the commandments of the LORD and observe them, so that you do not follow your heart and eyes in your lustful urge.

Bamidbar 15:39

The Rabbis teach in the Midrash to the book of *Bamidbar* that the Torah has seventy 'faces.' The underlying idea is that a single piece of Torah - a single verse, a single word, even - is capable of being understood in multiple ways. This is one of the reasons that as a people we remain entranced by Torah - we 'turn it and turn it, for everything is in it' (*Pirkei Avot* 5:26).

Yet sometimes it feels like the inverse is true, and that a whole Torah portion is framed around a single, central idea. This week's Torah portion can be read that way. The central idea is the one set out in our verse: that it matters where, and how, we place our eyes.

At the beginning of the Torah portion, Moses instructs twelve scouts to go into the land of Canaan and investigate it. After this, ten of the scouts come back terrified - they have seen the land, they say, and the inhabitants are giants to whom they must look like grasshoppers. And, they continue, now they feel like grasshoppers would feel in front of giants. The scouts' terror prompts an outbreak of panic, which is met by an equally passionate outbreak from God. The whole generation will be left to wander in the wilderness until all but a select few die off. The scouts' loss of perspective exacts the heaviest of collective penalties.

Rather than simply read this as the act of a capricious, punishing God, it can be helpful instead to realize that the Torah is forcing our attention back to the magnitude of what went wrong in the first place. We need a big word to describe the ten scouts' loss of perspective: 'vertiginous' might work. Something in what they saw triggered a sense of being tiny in relation to something immensely tall, which in turn left them feeling distraught and powerless. By contrast, Joshua and Caleb, the remaining two scouts, seem to have seen something entirely different - the beauty and richness of the land itself that they 'traversed and scouted.' But the vertical imagery used by the ten terrified scouts is what catches the people's imagination, and Joshua and Caleb's broader vision is simply denied.

The word translated as 'scout' - *latur* - appears again in our verse about the *tzitzit*. If we focus on them and direct our imaginations towards Torah, we will be less inclined to *latur* after where our eyes and our thoughts pull us. The verse underscores the message by pointing out that following our thoughts is a 'lustful' business - addictive, perhaps, in the same way as desire itself. But if we choose a point of focus for our eyes and our heart/minds, we won't fall into terror and panic.

And this idea is as helpful now as it was then to Joshua and Caleb. We, too, are navigating a kind of wilderness. We, too, are being confronted with the unknown and the unquantifiable.

It matters where we place our eyes.
