

## Events at the Howard Wilson Life Center:

This was an exciting month at the Life Center. As many of you know, St. Paul's sponsors Scout Troop 82, both boys and girls; they meet on Sunday afternoons. This month was special, however, as on Sunday, April 7 we hosted the Troop 82 Eagle Scout Court of Honor. Around fifty people gathered in the gym to honor the Troop's most recent recipient of the Eagle Scout award.

If you are not familiar, Eagle Scout is the highest rank awarded to Scouts, and only comes after a great deal of effort. Since 1912, over 2 million young men have been awarded scouting's highest rank, but that only represents about 4 percent of all Scouts.

Duty to God, service to others, service to the community, and leadership are traits that are especially strong in Eagle Scouts. Eagles are statistically more likely to succeed in later life in leadership roles in business, church life, civic engagement and the like. The award requires Scouts earn merit badges in first aid, lifesaving, community service, citizenship, physical fitness, camping, personal management, family life, communication and much more! There are 21 required merit badges required, as well as elective merit badges and community service projects. It's not an easy thing to earn, and I think any young person who achieves at this level should be commended.

I would like to extend my personal congratulations to Troop 82's newest Eagle Scout, Jack Henry Robinson (who happens to be my next door neighbor!)

Of course all of our regular meetings, conferences, clubs, committees etc. are meeting at the Wilson Life Center. Our newest tenant is the District 23 AA group, which will begin regular meetings soon. I hope to have more details about this group to share soon.



## Tracts Talk! The Bible: A book about us; A book about God

Have you read War and Peace, Don Quixote, or Les Miserables, cover to cover? Most haven't, because they're daunting, not only in length, but also in content. Everyone has heard of these books, and maybe feel they really ought to have read them. Does the Holy Bible fall into the same category?

Well, first of all, the Bible is not designed to be read cover to cover. It has many familiar passages as well as some you've probably never read or heard. For example, Exodus 25-37 describes in great detail how the Tabernacle and Ark are to be made and adorned. Numbers 16 tells us about Korah, Dathan and Abiram, who rose up against Moses. We are possibly most unfamiliar with the Old Testament, as we may feel that happened long ago and doesn't apply to us — aside from the Ten Commandments, some of the Psalms, and a few other tidbits.

This title of this pamphlet, *The Bible: A book about us; A book about God*, lets us know that the Bible is about **US**, all of us. The author states that if you believe in God, the book is about you, and if you don't believe in God, the book is about you. And it is. When you read some of the passages, especially in the Old Testament, you may think, oh, that was then. But if you look closely, you'll see that it's also about now.

In Sunday School, Thack is introducing us to Judges, and we learn a couple of lessons: 1) God doesn't pick the most obvious people to do his bidding; 2) The people are constantly forgetting to be faithful servants. This happens to us, here, every day. Having some instruction while reading the Bible is extremely helpful. For one, it may help you keep awake through some of the passages; and also you may find that the stories it tells can be interpreted in different ways.

*The Bible: A book about us; A book about God* encourages us to read the Bible with a good commentary, and especially, to read it. It is about us, and it is about God.

We meet weekly for Sunday School at 9:15 in the underground and at 4:30 for youth.


