Message From Thack

"Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return."

Ash Wednesday will be observed on February 18. Ash Wednesday stands at the threshold of Lent—quiet, stark, and honest. It is a day that does not rush past our brokenness or dress it up in religious language. Instead, the Church bids us to stop, kneel, and tell the truth about ourselves before God.

The Collect appointed for Ash Wednesday gives voice to that truth with striking clarity: “Create and make in us new and contrite hearts, that we, worthily lamenting our sins and acknowledging our wretchedness, may obtain of you, the God of all mercy, perfect remission and forgiveness” (*BCP*, p. 264). This prayer does not begin with what we promise to do for God. It begins with what we ask God to do in us. “Create and make in us...” Lent, from its very first day, is not a season of self-improvement or moral bootstrapping. It is a season of divine re-creation.

Ash Wednesday invites us to observe a “holy Lent,” marked by “. . .self-examination and repentance; by prayer, fasting, and self-denial; and by reading and meditating on God’s holy Word” (*BCP*, p. 265). These are not spiritual hoops to jump through, nor are they meant to induce guilt for guilt’s sake. Rather, they are practices that clear space for truth and for grace.

Self-examination asks us to look carefully at our lives: our relationships, our habits, our priorities, and our loves. Where have we drifted from God? Where have we harmed relationships or ourselves? Where have we settled for something less than the life God desires for us? Repentance, then, is not merely feeling sorry. It is turning—turning back toward God, trusting that the One who knows us fully still desires us deeply.

During Lent, prayer becomes less about saying the “right” things and more about showing up honestly. It may look like lingering a little longer in silence, praying the Daily Office, or simply offering God the truth of our exhaustion, grief, or longing.

Fasting and self-denial are not punishments; they are invitations to freedom. By setting something aside—food, noise, distraction, or excess—we make room to notice our dependence on God and our hunger for what truly satisfies.

Reading and meditating on Holy Scripture grounds us in the larger story of God’s mercy. Lent invites us to listen again to God’s Word, not to master it, but to let it question us and gently reshape us.

Ash Wednesday is marked by ashes, by the reminder of our mortality, and by the sober truth that we are dust. But it is also marked by hope.

The Collect reminds us that the God who sees our sin and our “wretchedness” is also “the God of all mercy.” We do not confess in order to be crushed. We confess so that we may be healed. We do not lament our sins without hope. We do so trusting in “perfect remission and forgiveness.”

The hope of Lent is not that we will finally get everything right. The hope of Lent is that God is still at work—creating, making, and renewing contrite hearts—and leading us, step by step, toward the joy of Easter.

As we begin this holy season, may we have the courage to be honest, the humility to repent, and the faith to trust that God’s mercy is deeper than our failures and stronger than our sin.

An Invitation to Renewal: Cursillo at Camp Beckwith, March 12–17, 2026

This coming spring, members of our parish have a wonderful opportunity to step away from the routines of daily life and immerse themselves in a life-giving experience of Christian community and renewal. The Cursillo 174 Conference will be held March 12–17, 2026, at Camp Beckwith, and all are warmly encouraged to consider attending.

Cursillo (from the Spanish “Cursillo,” meaning “a short course”) is a three-day spiritual retreat grounded in prayer, worship, study, and Christian fellowship. It is designed to help participants deepen their relationship with Christ and discover how that renewed faith can be lived out more fully in everyday life—at home, at work, and within the Church.

The weekend includes worship, inspiring talks by clergy and lay leaders, small-group conversations, shared meals, and plenty of time for reflection. It is not a lecture series, nor is it a silent retreat. Rather, it is a joyful, communal experience centered on grace, encouragement, and mutual support.

People attend Cursillo for many reasons. Some are seeking renewal after a dry or difficult season. Others are longing for deeper connection with God or with fellow Christians. Still others simply sense a nudge from the Holy Spirit to “come and see.”

Those who attend often speak of a renewed awareness of God’s grace and mercy; fresh energy for prayer and worship; meaningful Christian friendships; and greater confidence in living out their faith beyond Sunday morning. Cursillo does not promise to change your life overnight—but many discover that it gently and faithfully changes the direction of their life, orienting it more clearly toward Christ.

One of the remarkable blessings of Cursillo is that there is no cost to attend. Room and board are fully covered through the generosity of former Cursillo participants and the work of the Cursillo Commission of our Diocese. This spirit of gratitude and giving is itself a powerful witness to the enduring impact of the Cursillo experience.

We are especially glad that Clay and Anita Rankin and Laurie and Allen Simpson, all from St. Paul’s, will be serving on staff for the March retreat. Their presence reflects our parish’s ongoing commitment to Christian formation and spiritual growth, and they would be delighted to share more about what the weekend is like.

For more information or to express interest, please reach out to any of them—or contact Meredith Portman, our parish Cursillo liaison, who will be happy to guide you through the process. If you are feeling drawn to deepen your faith, strengthen your walk with Christ, or simply listen for God's voice in a supportive and prayerful setting, Cursillo may be just the invitation you have been waiting for. New Adult Sunday School Offering: *Here and Now*

Beginning Sunday, February 8, our Adult Sunday School class will be offering a book study of *Here and Now* by Henri Nouwen. This short but profound book is a guide for reflection on what it means to live in the Spirit—not someday, not elsewhere, but here and now.

The book is made up of 11 brief, accessible chapters, each one a meditation on an essential aspect of the spiritual life. Topics include living in the present, joy, suffering, prayer, and the nature of the spiritual life, among others. Each chapter invites us to slow down, reflect honestly, and pay attention to how God is already at work in our lives. The readings are short, yet deep enough to spark meaningful conversation and spiritual growth.

About Henri Nouwen

Henri J.M. Nouwen (1932–1996) was a Dutch Catholic priest, theologian, teacher, and one of the most beloved spiritual writers of the twentieth century. He taught at Notre Dame, Yale, and Harvard, and later lived in community with people with intellectual and developmental disabilities at L’Arche Daybreak in Canada—an experience that profoundly shaped his spirituality and writing.

Over the course of his life, Nouwen wrote more than 40 books, many of which have become modern spiritual classics. If you are longing for a deeper, more grounded spiritual life—and a space to reflect with others—this study promises to be a meaningful and enriching journey. All are welcome. Dear people of St. Paul's,

In late December of each year, I'm given the names of those who contributed to the Bishop's Discretionary Fund in the year just past. Your name was included among those generous donors, and I wanted to write to you personally to say thank you.

The Discretionary Fund plays a quiet but indispensable role in the ministry entrusted to me as your Bishop. It exists precisely for moments that cannot be anticipated—situations that arise suddenly and require compassion, discretion, and timely support. Having these resources available allows me to respond pastorally when needs emerge without warning.

Many needs come from clergy across the diocese and students in seminary. This fund offers a resource to them in moments of crisis or transition—whether due to unexpected family circumstances, unforeseen medical expenses, or opportunities for professional growth that were never part of a parish budget.

Some needs come from parishes that seek new unbudgeted ministries like the young adult ministry at Holy Cross or Sleep in Heavenly Peace, a ministry for building beds for children by the people of Holy Trinity or a weekly community dinner at St. Monica's in Cantonment.

Other requests come from beyond our diocesan boundaries and our operational budget. In 2025, your generosity helped support the Diocese of Navaho Land and the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem. These are just a few examples of how the fund has been used to extend care, encouragement, and practical assistance where it was most needed.

Your gift has had an impact far wider than any single situation, and often in places you may never see firsthand. Please know how deeply grateful I am for your generosity and for the trust you place in my ministry through your support of this fund.

With this note of thanks comes also my prayer for you. May God bless you with grace for the days ahead, hope in times of uncertainty, and peace that abides now and forever.




