Message from Thack

In 2006, The Rev. Dr. Michael Battle, then a professor at Virginia Theological Seminary and now a member of the faculty of General Theological Seminary, was the guest speaker at our clergy conference. His subject was the African concept of “Ubuntu.” Ubuntu means “community,” but not just a group of people taking up the same space, living on the same block, enjoying the same activities or similar political or social proclivities. No, the idea of Ubuntu goes well beyond that. Ubuntu is a word in the “Xhosa” language of southern Africa that means “I am because we are.” It’s the understanding that we need other people in order for us to be. That it’s only in community that we come to exist. The Rt. Rev. Desmond Tutu developed what he calls “Ubuntu theology”, which asserts that persons are ends in themselves only through the discovery of who they are in others.¹

According to Michael Onyebuchi Eze, the core of Ubuntu can best be summarized this way: “A person is only a person through other people’s affirmations of their humanity ... through a recognition of the ‘other’ in their uniqueness and in their difference. This suggests that my humanity is not embedded solely in my person as an individual, but rather that my humanity is only bestowed upon me as I relate to other human beings.”² He goes on to assert that humanity then is a quality that we owe to each other. So there is a responsibility there – one where I am responsible to you and you are responsible to me. Jesus spoke of the same ethic in the Gospel of Matthew when he said, “In everything do to others as you would have them do to you; for this is the law and the prophets.” (Matthew 7:12, NRSV).

Prof. Battle offered a practical illustration of Ubuntu involving an experiment by an anthropologist. The anthropologist proposed a game to some children in an African tribe. He put a basket full of fruit near a tree and told the children that whoever got there first wins the whole basket of sweet fruits. When he told them to run, they all took each other’s hands and ran together. They crossed the finish line together and then sat together enjoying their treats. When he asked them why they had run that way, when one of them could have had all the fruits for himself, they said, “Ubuntu, how can one of us be happy if all the others are sad?”

In that context, I think that's what we mean when we say we are all God's children and are all members of the Body of Christ. That our Triune God, our Creator, Redeemer, Sanctifier, has provided us with the model of Ubuntu that we were created to be. God is a God in community, in the three persons of the Trinity. And we, created in God's own image, are created to be in the same kind of radical community, sealed with radical love and caring for one another. In that context, when we are working, worshipping, and living together for the common good, we exhibit a unique harmony of spirit that sets us apart. When that happens, we are fully living into our identities as children of God. That is how the Kingdom of God looks in the here and now.

An excellent example of this oneness can be seen in the real-life story of some young men who were a part of a rowing team. It was captured in a book called *The Boys in the Boat* by Daniel James Brown. Frieda Ward gave me a copy of the book for Christmas some years ago and it instantly became one of my most favorite books. *The Boys in the Boat* is the story of the University of Washington's eight-oar crew team that won the gold medal at the 1936 Berlin Olympics. There was no reason that this team should have won. They weren't particularly stronger than the other teams on the water that day. In fact, Don Hume, their stroke oar, the person who sets the rhythm of the boat, had been sick in bed for days leading up to the race, and they had to literally get him out of bed, put him in the boat and ask him to row.

They should not have won. However, that day they exhibited their special connection as a team. They displayed their absolute harmony, their absolute giving of themselves over to the collective good, their belief in the power of the unity of their efforts, and created an unbeatable phenomenon. In their common effort, they found their "swing," that moment when their rowing together achieved an almost mystical quality about it. Totally in rhythm with each other, these common men accomplished an uncommon feat.

I could not help but think of Ubuntu as I read their story. None of these young men could have accomplished alone what they all did together. They were responsible for and to one another and they needed to have absolute faith in what their working in absolute harmony could accomplish.

Boat builder, George Yeoman Pocock, the man who built the team's gold medal winning racing shell said, "Where is the spiritual value of rowing? In the losing of self entirely to the cooperative effort of the crew as a whole."³ Pocock's observation reminded me of a passage from John's Gospel where Jesus said, "I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." (John 15:5, NRSV).

Ubuntu should be the ethos of every Christian community, including St. Paul's. We should live our lives always in mind of each other. In such community, any distinctions the world uses to define, exclude, or marginalize others fall away in favor of seeing everyone else as necessary for our own identity and existence. May that always be the spirit of our wonderful parish.


Upcoming reminders:


