A Message From Thack

One of the great stories of Greek Mythology is that of Antaeus and Hercules. Antaeus, like Hercules, was a giant with extraordinary strength. His parents were Neptune and Gaia, the personification of earth. When he and Hercules engaged in mortal combat, Hercules proved to be the strongest, but every time he had Antaeus exhausted and near defeat, Antaeus's flesh would touch Gaia (Mother Earth) and his strength was mysteriously renewed. He then resumed the contest with fresh vigor. Hercules finally slew the mighty Antaeus by performing the titanic feat of lifting him into the air where he was out of touch with the earth. The Greeks were saying by this legend that there is great power in touch. The earth was the source of life for Antaeus, and when he could not keep in touch with his source of life he lost his power, and, therefore, lost his life.

Though this story is a myth, the truth it illustrates is a fact. Direct contact with the source of life revitalizes you and rejuvenates the flow of energy. The power of touch can never be underestimated.

All of nature is a witness to the power of touch. If the plant world is not kept in touch with mother earth, no life can exist. Jesus used this fact of nature to illustrate the necessity for contact in the Christian life. In John 15:4-5 he said, "Abide in me as I abide in you. Just as the branch cannot bear fruit by itself unless it abides in the vine, neither can you unless you abide in me. I am the vine, you are the branches. Those who abide in me and I in them bear much fruit, because apart from me you can do nothing." Jesus is clearly saying that the power of life is found only by maintaining contact with the source of power. Get out of touch with Christ, and you are like Antaeus up in the air cut off from mother earth---weak, helpless and doomed to defeat.

The words of Jesus describe the great power in touch. We can all relate to this concept. Lovers know it and experience great connectivity with each other by just the holding of hands. Children know it through the touch of a mother's lips on a scraped elbow. From infancy, we ache for the warmth of one another's skin. Jesus did not have to touch any of the ones he healed in the gospels. He did not have to touch the blind man's eyes or the leper's sores, but he did. The Son of God understood the power of touch and healed with his hands.

The Church has embraced this idea of the power of touch and incorporated this by commissioning its leaders with the laying on of hands. The holy orders of bishop, priest, and deacon begin their ministry with the hands of God's people placed upon their heads. During the ordination of a priest, the bishop lays hands on the ordinand and says, "Fill him/her with grace and power, and make him/her a priest in your church . . . make him/her a faithful pastor, a patient teacher, and a wise councilor." (BCP, pp. 533-34).

These pastors' hands will eventually baptize babies, prepare sermons, and make crosses of ash on the penitents' foreheads. They will break the bread, pour wine, and comfort the uncomfortable. They will also make signs of the cross on the foreheads of the deceased and the dying.¹


That said, the healing power of touch is not limited to ordained ministers. Since we are all ministers by virtue of our baptisms, the laity are also endowed with the power of touch. Whether in the act of passing the peace in corporate worship, passing a meal to the homeless on the street, or wrapping arms around the shoulders of strangers in distress, the power of touch can bring comfort, healing and peace to others.

Recently, the power of touch became especially poignant for me. Two weeks ago, two of my brothers, our spouses and myself gathered around my mother's bedside in her room in the memory care unit at her retirement community in Gulf Breeze. I offered her unction, the anointing with holy oil, in conjunction with prayers for the dying. As I laid my hands on my mother's head, a lifetime of memories washed over me. They were memories of her holding me as a small child, caressing my head and kissing me in happy times and comforting me in my pain. I remembered when she held my hand the many times we walked along the water's edge at Pensacola Beach. Her grasp was both soft and firm to make sure I didn't wander into the rough surf. Her touch was always comforting and reassuring.

These memories were reminders that through loving touch, God gave us the power to heal and to pass God's love on to others. My mother's touch passed God's love to me more times than I could ever begin to count. I hope and pray she felt God's love through me that last morning we had together.

Never forget the power of touch and pass God's love to others at every opportunity.

Tracts Talk! Centering Prayer

You owe it to yourself to take just a few minutes every day to “Be still and know that I am God,” as in Psalm 46:10. Centering prayer is a wonderful way to do this. It gives us a quiet respite from the day’s activities and distractions, and it sets us up for better awareness of God’s constant presence. It can even reduce anxiety and increase patience throughout the day.

The pamphlet, **Centering Prayer**, gives tips on how to go about practicing centering prayer, and it answers some questions about why it’s a good thing to do. I think many of us have difficulty with any kind of meditation - and centering prayer is a type of meditation - because we feel we cannot clear our minds. It takes practice! This pamphlet gives suggestions on just how to do that. My two favorite FAQs included are: “What if I don’t feel anything?” and “What difference does it make?” Pick up this excellent publication to find out.

Treasurer's Report, by Janet Norman

Following is an excerpt of discussions during our last vestry meeting.

- Terri has trouble sleeping because she worries about the church cash flow.
- The church runs two payrolls a month. And Terri worries about having enough cash on hand to cover payroll.
- The church has a loan payment due every month of \$23,000. This keeps chipping away at our \$2.2 million remaining mortgage balance.
- The church insurance premium, due quarterly, is about \$21,000.
- We have at least two insurance claims a year for lightning strike damage. Our deductible is \$5,000.
- We continue to struggle with flooding issues at the preschool building. The men's group has come up with a band-aid solution to tie us over because having a contractor come in would be cost prohibitive at this time.
- Two of our A/C units were found to have limited coolant last month during a regular maintenance inspection. Just refilling the coolant for each unit was over \$1,000 each.
- We all (vestry, treasurer, clergy) HATE begging our parishioners for contributions.
- As I have said month, after month this year, we are struggling with cash flow. Necie Boroni has offered to help create a cash flow statement for the church. Thank you Necie.
