For several weeks the secular world has glutted itself with Christmas carols and Christmas decorations. These trappings of Christmas have no religious meaning to the secular world other than they are part of the tradition that comes with the season this time of year. To most of these folks, the Christmas carols and decorations simply provide a quaint, seasonal back drop, much like elevator music. Parish Nurse News

Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays, everyone! I hope you all are taking time to rest and destress some during this traditionally hectic time of year.

A topic that has been making its rounds in the literature lately is that of herbal supplements and their pros and cons. Did you know that the National Center for Complementary and Integrative Health (first of all did you know such an agency even existed??) reports 1 out of every 5 adults has used an herbal supplement in the past year? Herbal supplements are not without risk and can possibly have serious medication interactions. I thought it might be wise to review some of the most common supplements and note important considerations in their use. I can't stress enough that you should ALWAYS consult your primary care provider before using an herbal supplement if you are on other medications.

Echinacea – used to strengthen the body's immune system and is considered a preventive against colds and flu. It might slow the metabolism of caffeine which could lead to side effects like jitteriness, headache or insomnia.

Evening Primrose – may be helpful in reducing rheumatoid arthritis symptoms. It may slow blood clotting and increase the likelihood of bleeding or bruising – especially if you take blood thinner medications. It might also reduce the effectiveness of anti-seizure medications increasing the likelihood of a seizure to occur although the evidence is still controversial.

Black Cohosh – general used for menopausal symptoms hot flashes. There is some concern that this supplement may be toxic to the liver and may increase the likelihood of liver toxicity with certain medication such as statins (Lipitor), acetaminophen (Tylenol), and alcohol.

Feverfew – has pain relieving properties that often help with migraines. Like Evening Primrose, Feverfew may increase the risk of bleeding and should be used very cautiously with blood thinning medications such as aspirin, Coumadin (warfarin), Plavix (clopidogrel), Xarelto (rivaroxaban), Lovenox (enoxaparin), etc.

Garlic – generally used for cardiovascular conditions including high cholesterol and decreasing blood sugar levels. Garlic has also been reported to increase the effects of blood clotting medications as noted with Feverfew.

Ginseng – used to improve energy levels and resistance to stress. It can interfere with blood pressure medications and diabetes medications – Ginseng may lower blood sugar, and too much (ginseng abuse syndrome) can cause hypertension, insomnia, and diarrhea. Be mindful & cautious when using with any anticoagulant medication as it has blood thinning properties.

Goldenseal – popular for its healing and antiseptic properties. Often used for soothing irritated nasal passages. Goldenseal can have very serious interactions with certain antipsychotic medications potentially leading to an irregular heart rhythm.

Green tea – used to combat fatigue, lower cholesterol, and aid in weight loss. Green tea contains vitamin K which is the antidote for warfarin (Coumadin) overdose. Large amounts of green tea should be avoided by patients on warfarin as it can potentially decrease the effectiveness of the medication.

Valerian – commonly used as a sleep aid. It may cause extreme drowsiness if mixed with barbiturates or other medications for insomnia or anxiety. It should not be used with opioids, antihistamines, or alcohol.

St. John's Wort – a popular supplement for depression. St. John's Wort has many well documented drug interactions. Because of this, you should always consult your primary care provider before using.

And just in case you're wondering...yes, there's an app for that. The National Library of Health has an app called Herb List that has information on some of the most common herbs including their history, uses, safety problems, and side effects.

It's important to remember that supplements are not subject to FDA requirements and have not been tested in FDA approved trials to prove the effectiveness of their claims. Patient frequently do not disclose their supplements when giving a medication list so compiling accurate data on drug interactions is a challenge. As with any new treatments, please consult your primary care provider before starting an herbal regimen. And ask your Pharmacist to review your medications and supplements for any possible medication interactions.

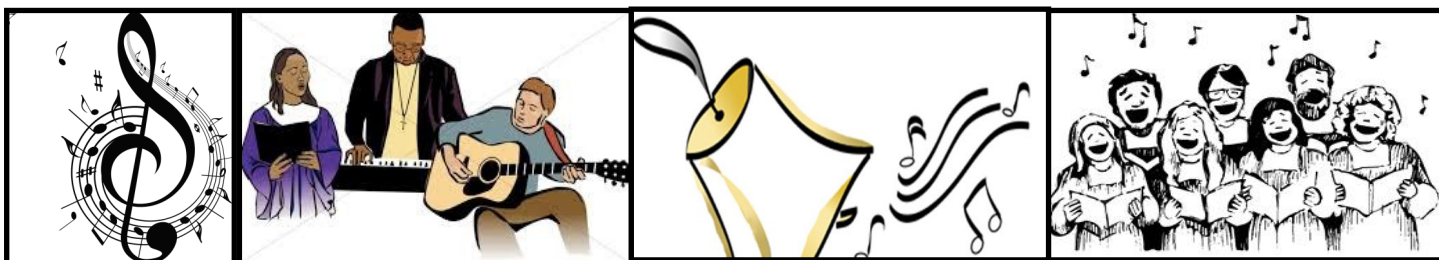

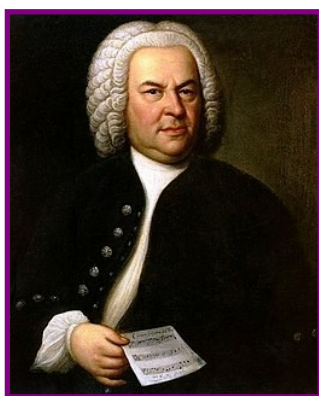

There are so many people, doing so many jobs, to thank for her celebration of life service, her burial in the Garden and the luncheon which followed..... All who helped plan, preach, lector, serve, set up and take down the Life Center, prepare the luncheon and the desserts, preparing the flowers, sending us food, cards, and your love. It brings tears- but not tears of sadness, rather tears of joy that God placed us here among this special family. What a blessing!

The music for Christmas Eve has a wonderful mix of old and new, choral, solo voice, solo instruments, and of course all the great carols and hymns of Christmas. If you've never been with us before for Christmas Eve, but you know lots of traditional carols [such as Angels we have heard on high, Good Christian friends, rejoice, What Child is this? and Joy to the world], you're all set to join in all the service music for the evening- the Glory to God, the Holy, holy, the Fraction Anthem and the Christmas doxology.
