Message from Thack

Last Monday we remembered St. Alban in our Church calendar. St. Alban was the first Church martyr in Britain. A Roman soldier stationed in Britain during the Third Century, Alban gave aid and comfort to a fugitive Christian priest by hiding him in his home. The priest was such a compelling model of Christian piety, kindness and love that Alban asked to be baptized. He eventually assumed the priest's identity when the Roman authorities went to Alban's house to arrest him. Alban was subsequently tortured and executed for not renouncing the faith in the one, true God.

Alban's courage and unshakable faith inspired his first executioner to throw down his sword and ask to be martyred either in Alban's place or with Alban. They both died for the faith.

St. Alban is venerated because of his "incarnational" presence after his arrest by Roman authorities. The language of "incarnational presence" represents the rooting of our lives and the gospel into the places we live. He literally personified Christ in the presence of his persecutors.

The word "incarnation" comes from a Latin word that literally means "in the flesh." It refers to the act whereby God took on human flesh and entered into our world to bring about reconciliation between himself and humanity. The incarnation is God's ultimate participation in creation (John 3:16-17). When God entered into our world in and through the person of Jesus, He came to live among us. As Eugene Peterson said in his contemporary Bible *The Message*, "The Word became flesh and blood, and moved into the neighborhood" (John 1:14, *The Message*).

The Incarnation not only qualifies God's acts in the world, but also must qualify ours. If God's central way of reaching His world was to incarnate himself in Jesus, then our way of reaching the world should likewise be incarnational. That said, it is important to acknowledge that the incarnation of Jesus was a special, unrepeatable event. Further, as we enter into the world of others, we certainly cannot take on another's identity in the fully integrated way that Jesus did. But we can make a distinction between the Incarnation with a capital "I" and incarnational ministry.

Obviously, there is nothing wrong to pattern our lives after the life of Jesus. The apostles encouraged Christians to imitate Christ as a way of identifying with Him. Both Peter (1 Pet. 2:21) and Paul (1 Cor. 11:1) insisted that Jesus is to be the model for Christian living. Peter makes clear that Jesus' life is to be our example.

Paul makes this point even more strongly in his Letter to the Philippians, in which he tells us, "Let the same mind be in you that was in Christ Jesus" (Phil. 2:5). We often assume that this passage then commends to us Jesus' humility, which is clearly present in the text. But Jesus' humility is commended to us insofar as it is expressed in his commitments to identification and relinquishment. First, to follow Jesus' example means that we should share his profoundly humble identification with humankind (Phil. 2:7b-8a). Second, those of us who wish to emulate Jesus should be aware of his equally humble willingness to empty himself and make himself nothing for the sake of God's redemptive purposes (Phil. 2:6-7a). In other words, to embrace an incarnational ministry involves a willingness to relinquish our own desires and interests in the service of others.

This passage from Philippians speaks to two very important ideas related to incarnational mission — the concepts of “proximity” and “presence.” Incarnational ministry must involve living in close proximity with others. We cannot love and serve those God has sent us to from a distance. Just as Jesus took on flesh and blood and moved into the “neighborhood,” we must do likewise. This will demand creating time and space to be directly and actively involved in the lives of the people around us, whether at home, work and beyond.

The concept of presence moves beyond mere proximity to identification and surrender. Jesus identified with and advocated for those to whom he was called. As the Philippians passage makes clear, he *humbled* himself. He literally emptied himself for the sake of others. This realization suggests an incarnational approach that calls us to relational identification with our neighbors that will lead to tangible acts of love and sacrifice.

In the incarnation of Jesus Christ, God revealed himself as the One who is with and for his creation. Now, as the Risen Lord sends his Spirit to empower the church, we are called to become God’s people present in the world, with and for the world, and like John the Baptist, always pointing to Christ. Incarnational witness is therefore a way of describing how we should pattern our lives as Christians. To this end, we should always ask ourselves, “Can the world see Christ in me?”

So, what does all this talk of identification, proximity, and presence have to do with daily living? It may sound like a cliché, but it really is all about relationships. It’s about getting close enough to people to listen, understand their hopes and dreams, and actually come to like and love them.

Our “neighborhood” is in a state of radical change. Between the Covid-19 Pandemic and race relations, our world needs us to be incarnational people more than ever. Now is not the time to be complacent about our faith because we haven’t been attending church as much lately. Please look around you for people and places that are crying for Christ and be that person.

It’s also easier to watch church live stream in your pajamas rather than dressing and driving to church. Yet it is worship *as a community* that feeds our souls and connects us as a body of Christ. Therefore, when you are ready, please consider live worship as an option again. We would love to see you! Thack
