

Wisconsin Voter Registration

Am I registered to vote? Where do I vote? Where is my municipal clerk's office? When and where can I vote early? How do I request an absentee ballot?

EVERYTHING you need to know about voting in Wisconsin can be found here: <https://myvote.wi.gov/en-us/> Click on "My Voter Info" and you will be asked to fill in your name and birthdate to begin.

If you need to register to vote, an easy, online registration form can be filled out, printed and mailed to your municipality clerk's office, **postmarked by October 17, 2018**:

Proof of residence and photo ID are required for voter registration. The two things can be accomplished with a single WI driver's license that has your current address on it.

Are you unable to vote at your polling place on Election Day? Take advantage of one of these other options:

Receive your ballot by mail

Wisconsin voters can receive their absentee ballot by mail. If you are a regular voter who would like to vote in the 2018 General Election, make sure to submit your request for an absentee ballot by November 1, 2018. [Request an Absentee Ballot](#)

Vote early in your Municipal Clerk's office

Starting the third Monday before Election Day, you can vote by absentee ballot in person at your Municipal Clerk's office. **For the November 6th election, EARLY VOTING is (at least) from Monday, October 22 through Friday, November 2nd, however**, as a result of recent court decisions, early voting **may** be expanded in certain areas. Receive a ballot for every election by mail

If you are unable to go to your polling place on Election Day due to age, illness, disability or infirmity, you can request an absentee ballot be sent to you for every election, automatically, as an "indefinitely confined elector." [Request Automatic Absentee Ballots](#)
