

AB 572 (QUIRK-SILVA): ALCOHOLISM OR DRUG ABUSE TREATMENT FACILITIES: ORANGE COUNTY PILOT PROGRAM

IN BRIEF

This bill would create a voluntary pilot program for the cities in the County of Orange, run out of Costa Mesa (the Lead Agency), to fund and house a Department of Health Care Services (DHCS) Complaint Analyst to investigate local, licensed Residential Treatment Facility (RTF) complaints.

THE ISSUE

An overwhelming number of California cities face complicated public safety, and quality care issues having to do with licensed RTF or licensed “sober living facilities”. The challenges, deriving from non-compliant facilities are a strain on law enforcement resources, the community, and negatively affect the patients seeking treatment.

According to the Department of Health Care Services (DHCS), there are only 16 investigative Complaint Analysts that handle the entirety of the state’s noncompliant sober living home and facility investigations.

California has between 2,000 licensed facilities and treatment centers – an alarming 15% of those facilities are saturated in Orange County. Unfortunately, the Complaint Analysts are all located in Sacramento, causing a backlog in complaint processes, investigation response, and general monitoring.

Due to a lack of regulatory authority, cities need support from the State to ensure that facilities are following state regulations, and unlicensed facilities are not operating treatments that would be required by a license.

EXISTING LAW

The Department of Health Care Services has sole authority to license and investigate facilities providing 24-hour residential nonmedical services to eligible adults who are recovering from problems related to alcohol or other drug misuse or abuse.

Licensure is required when at least one of the following services is provided: detoxification, group sessions, individual sessions, educational sessions, or alcoholism or drug abuse recovery or treatment planning.

Additionally, facilities may be subject to other types of permits, clearances, business taxes or local fees that may be required by the cities or counties in which the facilities are located.

THE SOLUTION

AB 572 would require DHCS to establish a pilot program to locate an investigator within the City of Costa Mesa in Orange County to investigate complaints against licensed adult alcoholism or drug abuse recovery or treatment facilities within the County. This would be an added resource for cities, helping them to enforce state and local regulations, and most importantly provide patients with better outcomes.

Over the last several decades, cities in California have struggled in managing regulations related to sober living facilities, within their residential communities. This bill would help alleviate the enforcement shortfall that is currently experienced throughout the County.

AB 572 would incentivize residential treatment facilities to stay in compliance with cities and the state, while offering a high level of care.

ASSEMBLY BILL

An act to add and repeal Section 11834.015 of the Health and Safety Code, relating to alcoholism or drug abuse recovery or treatment facilities.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 572, as amended, Quirk-Silva. Alcoholism or drug abuse treatment facilities: ~~Orange County~~ *City of Costa Mesa* pilot program.

Existing law provides that the State Department of Health Care Services has the sole authority in state government to license adult alcoholism or drug abuse recovery or treatment facilities, as defined. Existing law authorizes the department to conduct announced or unannounced site visits to licensed facilities to review compliance with all applicable statutes and regulations.

This bill would require the State Department of Health Care Services to establish a pilot program to locate an investigator within a participating ~~county~~ *city* to investigate complaints against licensed adult alcoholism or drug abuse recovery or treatment facilities within the ~~county~~ *city*. The participating ~~county~~ *city* would be the ~~County of Orange~~ *City of Costa Mesa* if the ~~Orange County Board of Supervisors~~ *City Council of the City of Costa Mesa* elects to participate in the pilot program. The bill would require the department to implement the pilot program by executing a contract with the ~~County of Orange~~ *City of*

Costa Mesa providing that the department will assign an investigator and the ~~county~~ city will reimburse the department for the costs associated with the pilot program, including, but not limited to, the administrative costs and the investigator's compensation and benefits. *The bill would authorize the City of Costa Mesa to contract with the County of Orange or a city incorporated within the County of Orange to assign the investigator to investigate complaints within those entities if the Orange County Board of Supervisors or the city council of the city adopts an ordinance or resolution electing to participate in the pilot program.* The bill would require the pilot program to be completed no later than December 31, 2019, and would require the ~~county~~ City of Costa Mesa to submit a report of the results of the pilot program, as specified, to the Legislature no later than July 1, 2020. *The bill would require the pilot program to be conducted in conformance with federal confidentiality laws and regulations.* The provisions of this bill would be repealed on January 1, 2021.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

3 11834.015. (a) (1) The State Department of Health Care
4 Services shall establish a pilot program to locate a Substance Use
5 Disorder Compliance Division investigator within a participating

32 *federal confidentiality laws and regulations, including, but not*
