Mission


Effectively administer traffic safety grants that deliver innovative programs and eliminate traffic fatalities and injuries on California roadways.






TOTAL TRAFFIC FATALITIES




CA TOTAL TRAFFIC FATALITIES BY AGE





THE 5 SAFE SYSTEM ELEMENTS











- A vision and goal for the safety of the Nation's roadways
- Principles to guide our safety actions
- Identify critical and significant to take in pursuit of five core objectives



GHSA - PUTTING THE PIECES TOGETHER

ADDRESSING THE ROLE OF BEHAVIOR AL SAFETY IN THE SAFE SYSTEM APPROACH

- Makes the case for the integral role of behavioral safety and road user responsibility in the Safe System Approach.
- Debunks the misconception that infrastructure alone can end road deaths and that behavioral safety plays no role in keeping road users safe.
- Makes it clear that it will take a comprehensive solution to reduce traffic crashes, injuries, and deaths.
 - Infrastructure improvements
 - Changes to road designs
 - Equitable enforcement of traffic laws
 - Education and public outreach
 - Emergency response
- Includes actionable recommendations illustrating how organizations and advocates can work together to prevent roadway deaths.





EFFORTS TO INSTITUTIONALIZE SAFE SYSTEM APPROACH AND EQUITY

- The OTS Equity Statement commits to taking a comprehensive, inclusive, and equitable approach to delivering education, enforcement, and outreach programs.
- The OTS Equity Working Group developed an Equity Action Plan.
- All programs and actions are evaluated through both a Safe System framework and equity lens.
- Programs should identify how they plan to implement traffic safety programs for the most marginalized and underserved communities.





FUNDING AUTHORITY

- National Highway Safety Act
- California State Transportation Agency (CalSTA)
- National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA)
- Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA)







NEW PROGRAM AREAS FROM IIJA

- 23 U.S.C. 405(h) Preventing Roadside Deaths
 - To Purchase digital alert technology, optical visibility, and Move Over public information campaign and data collection
 - Address the disabled vehicle safety issue
- 23 U.S.C. 405(i) Driver and Officer Safety Education
 - Driver education and driver safety courses include instruction and testing materials relating to law enforcement practicing during traffic stops
 - Covering the role of law enforcement
 - Legal rights of individuals
 - Consequences for failure to comply with the law



1906 GRANT FUNDS WITH EXPANDED USES

- Section 1906: Racial Profiling Prohibition Grants
 - This program provides grants to encourage states to maintain and allow public inspection of statistical information on the race and ethnicity of the driver for all motor vehicle stops made on all public roads except local or minor rural roads, as well as training and education to reduce the disparate impact of traffic stops.
- 1906 Grant funds can be used to:
 - Collect and maintain data on traffic stops
 - Evaluate the results of the data
 - Develop and implement programs, public outreach, and training to reduce the disparate impact of traffic stops




FUNDING ELIGIBILITY


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
CA IMPAIRED DRIVING FATALITIES BY AGE


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
CA MOTORCYCLIST FATALITIES BY AGE


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CA PEDESTRIAN FATALITIES BY AGE



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
CA BICYCLIST FATALITIES BY AGE



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
CA SPEEDING-RELATED FATALITIES BY AGE




