

Catholic Trivia 6-4 Answers:

1. *Corpus Christi* (which translates the Body of Christ)
2. The feast is liturgically celebrated on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday or, “where the Solemnity of The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ is not a holy day of obligation, it is assigned to the Sunday after the Most Holy Trinity as its proper day.” [Roman Missal, 2011] For many years it has been celebrated in the United States on the Sunday.
3. The feast of Corpus Christi was proposed by Saint Thomas Aquinas to Pope Urban IV in order to create a feast focused solely on the Holy Eucharist at a time other than the multilayered themes of Holy Week. In 1264, the pope acceded to this request and established the feast of Corpus Christi as a Solemnity and extended it to the whole Catholic Church.
4. Matthew, Mark, Luke and 1 Corinthians
5. The 16th century ecumenical Council of Trent, states: “In the Most Blessed Sacrament of the Eucharist, the Body and Blood, together with the Soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, and therefore the whole Christ, is truly, really, and substantially contained.” This statement is quoted directly in the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 1374.
