Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

This month we are celebrating two significant and special milestones – one close to home and one around the world. Every birthday or anniversary is a gift and a blessing. Milestones remind us to pause and find particular meaning in the events in our lives.


Israel's Independence Day falls on the fifth day of the Hebrew month of Iyar. On this date in 1948, the Declaration of Independence was signed in Tel Aviv. David Ben-Gurion, the first Prime Minister of the State, read the document publicly. Ben-Gurion once said, "In Israel, in order to be a realist you must believe in miracles." The observance of this historic and miraculous day begins at sundown on April 18th this year. In Israel, Yom HaAtzmaut, as it is called in Hebrew, is a national holiday with parades and speeches and celebrations in the streets. As American Jews, living in the Diaspora, Yom HaAtzmaut is a day to express our connections and solidarity with our beloved homeland. This year marks the seventieth anniversary – seven decades – since the events of 1948. As a community we will turn our thoughts especially to the State of Israel during Shabbat Services on Friday, April 13th, the Shabbat immediately before Independence Day.

I am thrilled to announce that we will hear from Jeremy Faust that evening. Many of you may already know Jeremy and his parents, Jonathan and Deborah. Jeremy, who has grown up at TBD, is now in eleventh grade at Commack High School. He spent the first half of this school year living and studying in Israel, participating in the URJ Heller High School program, sponsored by the Reform Movement. You may have read an article in *HaKol* during the fall which he wrote while still away. We look forward to hearing his insights and experiences on April 13th.

On the following weekend, April $20^{th} - 22^{nd}$, we will celebrate a very special milestone in the life and history of TBD. As you know, during these days we will honor Cantor Audrey Halpern for her thirty years – three decades – of service to our sacred community. I feel fortunate to

Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

I received a phone call from my cousin Linda from Chicago a couple of weeks ago. Linda is the daughter of my mother's sister and more like a sister to me than a cousin.

"Hi Aud, I got the invitation to your celebration. Mazel Tov! That's so nice that they are honoring you...."

"Yeah, it really is, I'm very happy about it," I responded, waiting to hear what would follow.

"I don't think I can make it since Rachel's wedding is two weeks later and, of course, I'm coming in for that."

I kind of expected that, so I wasn't surprised, and yet I did feel slightly disappointed. I answered her as one would expect, "I completely understand, so don't even give it a thought. I'm just glad you'll be there for Rachie's wedding."

"Well, tell me a little about it anyway," she sweetly asked.

"You would not believe it! It is turning into two big events and I am spending so much time planning both that my whole office is filled with music and programs and piles of folders for different singers. My choir is singing on Friday night at an original service that I'm planning on creating specifically for this event. Peter (my brother) is coming in from Boston and we are singing together both Friday and Sunday. He is even singing a piece he wrote for me when I was installed here thirty years ago." Maybe Divrei Libeinu or Tefillot Libeinu: Prayers of Our Hearts because Sunday's concert is going to be called Shirei Chayeinu: Songs of Our Lives and there is lots of Broadway music," I rambled on as I continued to describe the festivities. "Some very talented kids are joining my choir on Friday and on Sunday; I have a Bar Mitzvah boy who sings with a national touring company doing a solo!"

"My friends are coming in to sing; Debi from Easthampton, Howard from Short Hills and my High Holiday Quartet as well as a gorgeous soprano who is also a close family friend are all singing. Jonathan and Rachel will sing in the ensemble on Sunday and I am giving a speech on Friday night. My machatunum, Jenny's parents, are coming in from Denver. The whole thing is unbelievable! I am so touched that they even asked me what my favorite flowers are! It is amazing."

There was a brief silence on the other end of the phone as I composed myself from crying to my sister/cousin. "I never thought I would live to see any of this and I just feel so blessed."

"Aud," she jumped in, "I'm definitely coming!" I had no idea this was such a big deal. Of course I want to be there."

"Oh, Linda, that's wonderful!"

So my dear congregation, I invite you with a full heart to celebrate the thirty years that we have shared together. Whether we have stood at the Torah, under the chupah or at a bedside or a graveside, you have touched me in more ways than you know. I hope you will join us at services on Friday, April 20 at 8:00 p.m. and again on Sunday at 4:00 p.m. for a joyous concert and festive reception to follow.

Religious School News

April is a holiday-heavy month this year according to the Jewish calendar. Some holidays are joyous, some are sad, and like life, we have good and not so good days.

Passover is one of our three pilgrimage festivals, Sukkot and Shavuot are the other two. In ancient times, Israelites travelled to Jerusalem from all over to celebrate these "Chaggim" together. On Passover, we celebrate our ancestors' deliverance from slavery in Egypt. We recall these events in a formal way by conducting a Seder and reading from a Haggadah. "Seder" means order and "Haggadah" means the telling. By following the order of the Haggadah, we retell the story of our persecution at the hands of the Egyptians, followed by an exodus which eventually took us to our freedom. We also eat specific foods as "props" of the story. The youngest person will ask "Four Questions" that set the stage for the ensuing tale. This ancient history of our people defines us as Jews. We are reminded that we were slaves in Egypt as we welcome the stranger, help the needy and be "lights unto the world".

Thursday, April 12 is "Yom Hashoah," Holocaust Remembrance Day--yet another period in our history when Jews were enslaved and murdered for just "being." This day always falls a week after the seventh day of Passover. It was established by the Israeli government in 1951 and has become a day commemorated by Jewish communities and individuals world-wide. In Israel, the sound of a siren will stop vehicle and pedestrian traffic throughout the country for two minutes. During that time, people are engaged in silent contemplation. All radio and TV programming centers on the Holocaust, including interviews with survivors. There is no public entertainment on this day. Our Temple Beth David Brotherhood has distributed Yom Hashoah memorial candles to the school families to light on the evening of April 11.

Wednesday, April 18 is **Yom Hazikaron, Israel's Memorial Day**--a day to honor and remember the courageous men and women who lost their lives in the struggle for independence, as well as all military personnel who have died while on active duty in Israel's armed forces. A siren is heard at 8:00 p.m. the evening prior and again at 11:00 a.m. the following morning before public prayers are recited at military cemeteries. All radio and TV broadcasting portray the lives and heroic deeds of the fallen soldiers. Almost every high school in Israel has a "Memorial Corner" with photos of school graduates who died while serving the country.

Yom Hazikaran is always observed the day before **Israel Independence Day, "Yom Ha'Atzma'ut."** It is a uniquely Israeli tradition, immediately following the sad (Memorial Day) with the joyous (Independence Day). Joining these two holidays together conveys the message that Israelis owe their independence and very existence to the soldiers who sacrificed their lives for the country.

Finally, on April 20 and 22, we at Temple Beth David will be celebrating **Cantor Halpern's thirty years of service** to our congregation with a wonderful weekend of music and festivities.

My hope is that we will have many more joyous occasions to celebrate together as a community.

Agi became a slave laborer, building roads and fortifications. He and Andi were separated and she was transported to the Auschwitz-Birkenau camp where she, too became a slave laborer. We hope you will join us for their son's incredible presentation at 9:00 a.m. on April 8.

On Sunday, May 6, Brotherhood will join the entire TBD Community for Mitzvah Day. While our designated role is to support the annual Blood Drive at the temple, keep an eye out for information on the many Mitzvah Day choices that will be available – without a doubt, there's something there for you and your loved ones to participate in.

With any luck, we've seen the last of Winter's surprise storms – as of this writing, four Nor'easters have barreled across Long Island in less than a month.

On April 18th Israel will celebrate the 70th anniversary of the establishment of the Jewish state. Surrounded by Muslim countries that threaten its destruction (with the exception more recently of Egypt and Jordan), Israel has not only survived five wars but has flourished and succeeded in re-indigenizing the land that they have always called home. Israel's Jewish pop-

ulation has grown from 600,000 in 1948 to over 6.5 million in 2018. Over the past seven decades thousands of Israeli startups have given rise to innovations in a wide range of fields, including technology, agriculture and medicine, thereby providing a vital contribution to all of humanity (Tikkun Olam). Below are some interesting facts about Israel's amazing contributions.

Agricultural

Israel's development of "desalinization" and "drip irrigation" has made the country, which is 60% desert, into an agricultural powerhouse. Israel's cows produce more milk than any other cows in the world. Cherry tomatoes were invented in Israel. Israel is the only country to have more trees today than it did 50 years ago.

Academic

People of the Book: Israel publishes more books per person than any other country. Israel has the highest number of university degrees and its academics produce more scientific papers per capita, than any other country in the world. Compared to its small size, Israel has won more Nobel Prizes (12 since 1966) than all other Middle Eastern countries combined in the fields of chemistry, literature, economics and peace.

Innovation

Surrounded by hostile countries, and having limited natural resources (no oil), Israel needed to innovate in order to survive economically and otherwise. More than nine out of ten Israeli homes use solar power to heat water. In addition, they developed cutting edge technologies, which encompass a wide range of fields. Flash Drive, Voicemail, Waze and the Cell Phone were all created in Israel. Israel is one of the industry leaders in the cyber-tech industry -- the 2018 Olympics relied on Israeli security to protect the athletes.

Medicine

Universal Health Care is granted to all Israelis. A lot of resources are invested in medical research and drug development. Many new drugs will soon be available to the world that will treat Alzheimers, Crohns and other inflammatory and neurodegenerative diseases. The Hadassah Medical Organization is in the forefront of Stem Cell research. They are making significant progress towards eliminating such disabling diseases as Multiple Sclerosis, Macular Degeneration, Parkinson's Disease and Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS).

Cultural/General

Israel has more orchestras per capita than any other country. Israel is home to the world's only theater company comprised entirely of deaf and blind actors. Israel has the highest number of museums per person in the world. Life expectancy in Israel is among the highest in the world at 81.6 years (18th of 228 countries). Israel is the 11th happiest country in the world of more than 150 ranked (the U.S. is 14th). This happiness is not based on material wealth but on the love of family, friendships and community (everyone is Mishpucha "family"). Israel is the only democracy in the Middle East.

Israelis are tough and optimistic as they look into the future. No country is perfect. Israel's contributions to the world far outnumber its imperfections. Like their national anthem, *Hatikva* (The Hope), Israelis are always seeking a better tomorrow for the Jewish people and Tikkun Olam for the world.


