Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

This season of the year is called Sefirat Ha-Omer, the counting of the Omer on the Hebrew calendar. These are days between Passover and the festival of Shavuot. The Omer is literally the barley crop. In ancient days when the Israelites were farmers, each

day the crops of the season were counted and the first crops of the harvest were offered as a sacrifice to God. Today, though most of us are not farmers, many consider these days of 'counting' in a more spiritual way. By counting each day we are reminded of the precious nature of time. We are made aware of the passage of time, of the steps we take along life's journeys.

This period of counting also links Passover to Shavuot. At our Passover Seders, we commemorate our path from the slavery of Egypt to the freedom of our homeland. Tradition teaches that on Shavuot, Moses ascended to Mount Sinai where God revealed the Torah. This year Shavuot falls in the middle of this (secular) month, on the evening of May 16th and May 17th.


This year, especially, these weeks of 'counting' take on another meaning. Rabbi Joseph Soloveitchik was a leader and teacher in the American Jewish community of the 20th century. He taught that the practice of counting the days and weeks with intent helps us to recognize where we have been and where we are going. In the months and days since the start of the pandemic, that is just what we have been doing too. *Sefirat HaOmer* encourages us to recognize not just the past and the future, but also the moment in between past and future: the very moment we are in. Judaism values every moment; every moment of our lives is significant; simply put, every moment counts.



Just as every moment counts, we are reminded in many different ways that every person counts in Judaism. About this the rabbis taught that God counts each human being with great love, as a king counts each gold coin in his possession.

As the counting of the Omer comes to an end this month, may we take its lessons with us into the new season.

Clergy Reflections by Rabbi Audrey Halpern

 \boldsymbol{D} ear Friends,

As I write to you, I'm thinking about Mitzvah Day and what that represents to us as Jews. We are reading from the book of Leviticus that deals with sacrifices that seem archaic and obsolete. But, if we look beyond or rather deeper into the text we can glean a wisdom buried in the rituals we no longer practice. Aromas and scents are a very primal sense. As soon as I got into the

car that was taking me to the airport today, I remembered the familiar cologne that my driver seemed to have bathed in! Scents carry memories - foods that are part of festivals, love inside favorite cookies and all of the associations of a scent or aroma. It is an embedded memory.

The Torah itself describes the scent or aroma that we are to bring to the sacred altar as a sacrifice. It says, "reiach nichoach l'Adonai." We must bring forth the sweetest scents to the altar. I recently heard a former professor of mine describe the close relationship between "reiach" and "ruach." Ruach is spirit! That is the remnant of this ancient wisdom. We no longer bring sweet smelling animal sacrifices but we feel the compelling urging from the text to bring forth the sweetest part of our spirit. This is what we offer to God as a gift of the heart. Our sweetest spirits and nothing less is what we are to bring to fulfill God's clear requirement of sacrifice and giving.

That's where Mitzvah Day fits in! Here is a day to offer up to God and to the world *Adonai* has created, the best instincts, the true sacrifices and gifts from sweet hearts.

May this year renew our covenant of sacrifice, of sweetness and of covenant with the Divine.

What Else Can Temple Beth David Do For You?

Can't. Restricted. Isolated. Quarantined. Tested. Cancelled. Closed. Prohibited. Distanced.

After more than a year of speaking, writing and just thinking some form of the word "no," it's taken a little adjusting to contemplate the word "yes."

In the April Hakol, I announced your opportunity to return to our Sanctuary. "No" is becoming "yes." After carefully measuring the pews in the Sanctuary, running through an assortment of social distancing scenarios based on the sizes of families or household groups who might attend together, we determined that the safe number for most services was 50.

But, was that it? Was getting people back into the Sanctuary the end goal? Or was it the first, symbolic (and practical) step of many needed to truly resume life as a congregation? The answer is clear – there is more – much more – we need to do.

And that raises a broader, yet equally important question: "What else can Temple Beth David do for you?"

To be clear, as Temple President, I can tell you our leadership has shouted from the rooftops the many things we <u>have</u> done:

In-person Tashlich ceremony at Sunken Meadow State Park

Drive-In Shofar Sounding

Rosh Hashanah & Hanukkah Gift Bags delivered to hundreds of members' homes

Virtual Meditation Sessions

Check-in phone calls to our members

Online Religious School classes to keep our children engaged

Virtual B'nai Mitzvah tutoring

Installation of a state-of-the-art video streaming system to bring our Sanctuary into your home

Member-led online educational and "schmooze" sessions

In-person Yom Hashoah observance

Heck, we even had a Zoom Mandel Bread baking class!

We've kept our members engaged with creative and meaningful programs that have bridged some of the distance we've felt for the past 15 months.

50 people. Hundreds of gift bags. 15 months. Have you noticed how much counting we've been doing during the pandemic? So many things in our lives have been tabulated, measured, limited or reported in terms of "how many."



The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism's 2021 Initiative

Most of you know me as a long time active member of Temple Beth David's Isaiah 58 Social Action Committee and coordinator of TBD's annual Passover and Thanksgiving Food Drives. In addition, I became involved with The Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism and its New York initiatives (RAC-NY) and I represent Temple Beth David. Each year RAC-NY (https://rac.org) identifies and votes to determine which NYS legislation to support, in keeping with its mission for social justice. This year RAC-NY voted to work to support legislation for parole reform- called Less is More: Community Supervision Revocation Reform Act (S.1144 - Benjamin / A.5576 - Forrest). This bill is sponsored by NY State Senator Brian Benjamin (S.1144) and Assemblyperson Phara Forrest (A.5576). RAC-NY has already met with 40 state legislators to win their support for Less Is More, and is building on those early successes to get the bill across the finish line. RAC-NY's effort to pass Less Is More parole reform is part of the Reform Movement's national social justice campaign. Lee Winkelman and Sophie Raim are RAC-NY staff coordinate activities and email communications. Their are: lwinkelman@rac.org and SRaim@rac.org should you have questions for them.

This is important work. RAC-NY's effort to pass Less Is More parole reform is part of the Reform Movement's national racial justice campaign. It also includes efforts to pass Federal bills to ensure that everyone can vote and opportunities for congregations and Reform communities to engage in anti-racism work. There is also a new national racial justice campaign launching on April 28 at 8 pm EDT. If you would like to register with RAC-NY for this, email either Lee Winkleman or Sophie Raim.

This year I attended RAC-NY online meetings regarding parole reform legislation and want to share information with you so that those who are interested can join me to represent TBD. You can learn more about RACNY's efforts at https://www.yammer.com/thetent/#/files/962883043328 and can read about RAC-NY's work at https://rac.org/take-action/rac-your-state/rac-ny. You can sign up to help support parole reform in NYS by contacting either Lee Winkleman or Sophie Raim at the email addresses listed above. I look forward to working with you. For every reason I've heard or read for someone staying home, not venturing out, not dining at a restaurant, not inviting guests, or not attending services in person, the one that is by far the most common and most aspirational is some form of:

"I'm just waiting for my second shot. Then I'm waiting 14 days after that, and then..."

"And then... what?"

For each of us, the answer can range from clearly obvious to deeply personal. In our temple family, the emotional toll of this pandemic is immeasurable to many. The losses within our congregation – jobs, memberships, and of course, lives, have been painful to process.

So, even as we boast of being fully vaccinated, the truth is there are many members of our temple family who still aren't ready. "I just don't want to take any chances. Yet." Are you one?

And that begs the question: "What Else Can Temple Beth David do for you?"

I think in particular about our seniors, some of whom have spent the better part of the past year virtually home-bound. Staff members and temple members living with a health condition that places them at a higher risk, or with a family member whom they must protect at all cost. Temple members who haven't fully recovered from their own COVID infection. Religious School families still anxious about letting their children return to any classroom other than where they attend "regular" school.

Knowing that hesitation persists for a multitude of reasons, we need to ask, "What else can Temple Beth David do for you?"

This is not a rhetorical question. It's not a casual "we're here if you need us." This is an important, entirely serious question. As our temple moves back toward rescheduling in-person services, programs and events, we need to know what, if anything, will help you decide to point your car toward Hauppauge Road, turn at the lettered sign, find a parking space and walk through the doors of your temple - rocking your newest mask, of course!

Whether it's aspirational or congregational (how's that for a play on words?) I'm really, truly asking for your thoughts. Please email me at President@TBDCommack.org. Be specific! I will read every email and share your thoughts as appropriate with the right people. If you ask for your email to remain private, it will remain between us.

TBD's leadership, clergy, staff and you – our temple family – have all had to reimagine just about everything in our personal and congregational lives. As we reopen the doors to our temple, I'm hoping you will share your thoughts about what you hope to experience the next time you walk through them.

So, hit me with your thoughts, and let's put our heads together to answer the question:


