Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

Centuries ago, the ancient Greek philosopher, Heraclitus, taught: *The only constant is change.*

These words ring particularly true at this time in our nation in recent weeks. In the days between my composing this month's Rabbi's Message and the *HaKol* "going to press," we witnessed the horrific events in Charlottesville, VA. We heard the words of outrage and we saw the lights of candles of hope. So many of us followed the news in the hours and days following, listening for words we never heard, searching for a response. We were shaken to our core - the core of our national values, the core of the Jewish community and the core of our humanity. In the swirl of events, the age-old rituals of our people can provide a guidepost, an anchor for us individually and as a congregation. It is in this spirit that I choose to share the words of my Rabbi's Message, with the prayer that the blessing of this High Holy Day season provide comfort and meaning in our lives.

Dear Friends,

Prior to any important event in our lives, we benefit from truly preparing beforehand. Bar and Bat Mitzvah students spend many hours, indeed years, learning to read and chant Hebrew verses prior to the Shabbat they are called to the Torah. We wouldn't invite friends to a party without making refreshments before they ring the bell at our door. When we have an important exam, our best results come after diligent study before the day of the test. We couldn't submit our income taxes on April 15, if we hadn't completed them in the days and weeks before!

Similarly, Jewish tradition offers us time to prepare for the High Holidays. Around TBD, many of the preparations are practical and logistical such as setting up chairs and filling the sanctuary with the Mahzor, the High Holiday prayerbook, the (red) volume called Gates of Repentance. Members of our Brotherhood get ready by reviewing safety and ushering protocol.

Certainly, Cantor Halpern and I prepare musical pieces and sermons well before the first candles are lit on the Eve of Rosh HaShanah.

The Hebrew month of Elul began at the end of August this year. It will end and be followed by the month of Tishri on the first day of Rosh HaShanah. In some traditional Jewish communities, the shofar is sounded each day of Elul. Elul is the time to prepare our souls and our minds for the sacred Days of Awe. In fact the first worship service of the High Holiday season is not Rosh HaShanah evening. It is Selichot, held on the Saturday evening preceding Rosh HaShanah which falls on September 16 this year. The word, "selichot," means "prayers of forgiveness," and the service is moving and poignant, though fairly brief. It helps set the mood for the community and for individuals. It is the first time we hear the blast of the shofar in our sanctuary for the season as well.

Here at Temple Beth David, we will begin the evening with a Collation of coffee and cake at 7:30 pm (really just like the weekly Oneg Shabbat on Fridays!) We then enjoy a Musical Prelude to the evening and the season, performed by our own Moriel Weiselberg and her musical friends and colleagues. As we prepare to enter the sanctuary, Cantor Halpern and I lead Havdalah, the ceremony marking the conclusion of Shabbat and the beginning of the new week. In the sanctuary, the lights are dimmed, the Torahs are dressed in white, as we hear the traditional words and melodies of this holy season. I invite you to join us -- please join us when you are able - at 7:00 for the Collation, or at 8:00 for the Musical Prelude, or for the Havdalah and Selichot Service at 9:00 pm. (The service ends at about 9:30 p.m. and is certainly appropriate for older children to attend with families.)

I look forward to this month of preparation and to celebrating with the sacred community of TBD. From my family to yours, may the new year of 5778 be one of sweetness and blessings.

Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

Dear Members,

From the time I wrote my first Hakol article 29 years ago, I cannot recall a time when our country was in such distress. From international concerns to worldwide climate change, from health care fears to immigration and civil rights being threatened, it has become clear to most of us that we are living in a time of division and unrest. Just this morning I read a posting from the President of the American Conference of Cantors, Cantor Steven Weiss. He shared these thoughts in part:

"In the aftermath of the neo-Nazi march in Charlottesville, the unspeakable and senseless loss of life..., the American Conference of Cantors sends an unequivocal message of condemnation against hatred and bigotry. White supremacy has no home here in our country, founded on principles of tolerance and equality for all. As Jewish professionals, we have an obligation to speak out, stand up, and help be the change that is needed in this world.... our world desperately needs change right now. Let's do our part to be beacons of light to forever cast away this horrible darkness."

I have never considered myself a particularly political person, and yet these events transcend politics. In fact, we are now faced with moral dilemmas that do, in fact, call upon all of us to unify in order to stand up for those who cannot defend themselves. We need not agree politically to understand the lessons of moral responsibility commanded in our Torah. Democrats and Republicans alike may not agree on all of the issues, but as Jews we know that we are responsible for caring for the orphan and the widow, the sick and the poor, and those who are yearning to be free. These are the lessons our people learned through their own servitude and redemption, their own persecution and the constant prejudice that we face to this day. Long before party affiliation became a line of division, we were taught these ancient lessons of liberty and justice. We were taught to leave the corners of the field for the poor, to never put a stumbling block before the blind, and to care for the weakest and most vulnerable in our society.

Let us return to a time of healing and caring for the common good - to respect for one another, and to a time where kindness and compassion are nurtured and valued.

It is in this spirit that I wish all of you, my dear friends, a Shana Tova U'metukah.

Let the sound of the *shofar* awaken our conscience to goodness, renewal - a time of peace for all of humanity.

from the President's Desk

The occasion of installing new officers and board members provided an opportunity to recognize what we have accomplished at TBD in the past year and share with you what we hope to accomplish in the future. This is the speech I gave at the installation last June, and I believe it is equally relevant today.

"I'm honored to serve as your President, and I'm grateful for the support of so many people. Fortunately, I have a dedicated and passionate clergy, a Board I can rely on to propose and implement new ideas, a small but productive staff, and a long list of Congregants that I can depend on to continue to fulfill our mission to be a caring temple.

At TBD, we provide programming and activities that allow us to remain a vibrant welcoming community. Last year I mentioned that our temple is on a more solid financial footing, and this has allowed us to continue to offer a varied calendar of events. We accomplished this through the hard work and collaboration of our Budget and Finance Committee, combined with successful Ways and Means events, ongoing endowments to our Economic Relief fund, and the added revenue of renting space in our building to a number of excellent programs.

To continue to keep our building strong for our Congregation, we are going to need to invest some financial resources to repair and maintain our facility. Earlier this year I asked Adam Browser to head a Roof Repair

Committee. At the Congregational meeting, he made a presentation on what needs to be done to prevent future leaks and other potential problems..

In the Spring, a Survey was sent out to the congregation in order to help the temple leadership understand what our community wants and expects from TBD. I look forward to hearing what our members have to say, what we are doing right, and what can we do better or differently. I recognize that for our temple to continue to be a place where families want to spend time, we need to present programming in a way that recognizes our mission as a reform temple and at the same time meets the needs of our members. I encourage all of us to get involved, find the committee or event that you can become passionate about.

Thank you for your faith in me, and in turn, I extend my thanks to our Clergy, our Board, and every member of the Temple Beth David family. I am always available to discuss any ideas or issues."

Finally, as we move into a new year, I want to wish everyone in our Temple Beth David family a happy, healthy, and sweet new year. L'Shana Tovah!

Spotlight on Brotherhood

It will never cease to amaze me how quickly summer flies by. I hope you and your loved ones have been able to enjoy some time off, time away, or just some time to relax.

This space in *Hakol* traditionally has been used to feature past and upcoming Brotherhood events, and this month's column will not disappoint – we've got plenty to experience together in the months ahead, and you should also have a Brotherhood calendar that was mailed in late August.

I'd like to talk brother-to-brother for a moment about the events in Charlottesville, Virginia on August 11 and 12. By now, I'll assume almost everyone is aware that White Supremacist marchers carried confederate and Nazi flags and shouted anti-Semitic and Nazi slogans. Along their course, they marched past Congregation Beth Israel, where Shabbat services were taking place. Hours later, Heather Heyer, who came to protest hatred and bigotry, was killed by a car driven by an outspoken Nazi sympathizer.

Hate of many forms was on full display in America, just a few hundred miles from Long Island. Will marchers parade down Hauppauge Road anytime soon? Will the presence of a Jewish Community Center, a Jewish nursing facility, and our own Jewish house of worship all located in a row, find its way to some hate group's radar? No one knows.

Charlottesville is a painful reminder that we, as individuals, and hopefully as a Brotherhood, must seek

and provide support to each other. I believe it is our obligation to consider and discuss how these events affect our Jewish lives, and the lessons we must learn and teach to the next generation.

During the memorial service attended by hundreds of people, including many from the Charlottesville Jewish community, Heather Heyer's mother Susan said:

"You need to find in your heart that small spark of accountability. What is there that I can do to make the world a better place?"

Think about this and let's plan, as a Brotherhood and as a Community, how best to discuss this situation, and our role in addressing it.

As the new season begins at TBD, I hope you'll join the Congregation for our "Shabbat Under the Stars" on Friday, September 8. The first official Brother-hood event is our annual Welcome Back Breakfast at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday, September 17. Former New York Giant and two-time Superbowl Champion Perry Williams will be our guest speaker. As the High Holidays approach, the Brotherhood will again be serving as ushers during each service, and we can never have too many volunteers.

Our fall calendar is chock-full of fun, meaningful, and interesting activities, and I hope to greet each of you, especially our new members, to the TBD Brotherhood.
