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Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

Perhaps, like me, you have seen the reality television series, **Undercover Boss**. Each episode follows a CEO, owner or upper-level manager of a company, as they hide their true identity to work with lower-level employees. Their intent is to understand how their business is actually functioning, including its successes and its faults. Along the way, the high-level executive meets employees; some of them are model staff members and others, not so much. At the end of each episode, their true identity is revealed, employees are evaluated and, often, outstanding

staff members are rewarded with financial support and sometimes with deserving promotions.

Among the companies whose bosses have gone 'undercover,' are nationally known White Castle, Choice Hotels, 7-Eleven, Roto-Rooter and NASCAR. Mayors of Gary, Indiana, and Pittsburgh, PA, have also been featured. With many years on the air, the show has followed well over 100 bosses. I got to wondering, what if the greatest Boss of all, the CEO, founder and executive of the entire world, had the chance to go 'undercover' to investigate the state of the business which began 5779 years ago.

Scene One:

"Shalom, Boss," begins the costume designer, "I have some ideas about how to hide your identity. How about some wings." "Nope," replies the Boss, "I will look like Michael and Gabriel, my favorite angels." "How about a fancy jacket?" "Nope, they'll think I am Joseph." "How about giving you a whale on a leash?" "Nope, that whale belongs to Jonah." "OK, no costume then, just try to hide behind some trees and walls when you go undercover."

Scene Two:

"You need a pseudonym," explains the show's director, "What name would you like for the show?" "I have so many names already," the Boss answers, "There's YHWH, El, Elohim, Adonai, El-Shaddai, HaMakom, Baal, HaShem, Shekinah. My favorite is what I told Moses, 'I am that I am.' I'll use that one - it's sure to confuse them.' "I've reserved a plane and a ship for you to take you to your first location." "No need, I can get myself anywhere, anytime – no planes, trains or automobiles necessary."

Scene Three: In Antarctica

"Hello, let me introduce myself. I am 'I am that I am.' Who are you?" "We're penguins." "Penguins, who named you that? You were supposed to be called, 'funny walking guys.' Oh well, what do you do?" "Our job is to walk like penguins, eat some ice, and stand still when those humans appear with their cameras." "Where are the jackets your boss left for you to wear in the cold?" "Jackets? We thought we look dapper enough in these suits." "Did the district manager give you good instructions?" "No, we still haven't figured out what our purpose is – but we sure do have a fun time anyway."

Scene Four: In Israel

At this location, the Boss is a little concerned about being discovered. It seems that there are a lot of people in Israel looking for this Boss. "Shalom," says the Boss to some cooks, "What are you making?" We are cooking chumus. People here love this stuff. They just eat it up." "Great use of all those chickpeas," notes the Boss. "We've been getting creative," the cooks explain, "Now we make it in lots of flavors: Spinach & Artichoke, Sun Dried Tomato, Red Pepper, Chipotle, Basil Pesto, Olive Tapenade, Carmelized Onion and Lemon. We sometimes don't even use chickpeas. Now we use carrots and white or black beans too." "Oy vey," the Boss says to the camera, "And they still want to call all of this chumus. These sabras have gone too far."

Scene Five: On Long Island

As the Boss approaches Long Island, the Boss notices that the land doesn't look like the original blueprint. The nice round, fluffy shape the Boss had planned got all stretched out. And there is even a fork in the Island. "Interesting," mumbles the Boss, "Note to self: find the spoon and smooth the edges." Then the Boss notices long, long lines of vehicles of all sizes. "What do you call that parking lot?" the Boss shouts to a driver. "This, it's called the LIE." "Oy, that's just wrong. It looks like they paved my paradise and put up a parking lot. Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

In the past couple of months we observed the Jewish celebration of trees, Tu B'Shevat. It reflects a love of our Creator who is the ultimate giver of life to all the earth and all that grows. As Americans we also celebrated Valentine's Day – not so Jewish, but popular because we love romantic

love and chocolate! I would argue that even as Purim approaches, beyond loving our sweets there is another common denominator and that is God's love for us as demonstrated time and again in our stories – our salvation from those who would oppress us and the love we find in human connections when we imbue them with holiness!

In Parshat Yitro, we read the Ten Commandments. It is believed to be, in many ways, like a Table of Contents for the Torah. At first glance the Ten Commandments may not really feel all that relevant to our daily lives, but when we look more deeply, there may be layers of meaning that can connect us spiritually.

Like any important document, the structure may tell us a lot. When we look at the first layer of structure we immediately think of the iconic two tablets. We can see one side as having to do with our relationship with authority figures (God or our parents, or our other creators, if you will) and the other side dealing with our relationship with our peers. Rabbi David Fohrman describes this as the first layer of structure. He goes on to explain that each side has five commandments and there may actually be a corresponding relationship to one another.

Rabbi Fohrman brilliantly goes on to extrapolate a relationship between the commandments and the ultimate definition of love – true love based on respect as opposed to a love based on control or self-aggrandizement. When we acknowledge and honor our Creator, the sacred becomes manifest within our human relationships and ultimately leads us to love – a true love based on respect.

The Talmud recounts a story of a prospective convert to Judaism who asked the renowned Rabbi Hillel to explain the whole to him as he stood on one foot.

"That which you hate, don't do to your fellow," was his wise response. He went on, "That is the whole Torah, all the rest is commentary."

It's the essence of Judaism; the actions and the attitudes we are taught to bring to bear on all of our relationships beginning with our relationship with our Creator.

As we celebrate the victories of our people, our kinship with one another, and our connection with God, may we see the many levels of meaning in our teachings as they reveal themselves through study, learning and action.

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A SPECIAL GIFT

Chicago's frigid winter warmed up a bit on January 18 when my family held a naming in that city for its newest member, Emily Sophia Herman, daughter of my son, Andrew and daughter-in-law, Carolyn. It's always a special pleasure to welcome a new grandchild, but this simcha was particularly sweet, as Emily is named for my father, known to all as "Grandpa Ernie."

Grandpa Ernie Elias was born in 1920 in the small town of Hoya in Northern Germany. His father owned a successful dry good business in town, and the family of four was considered "comfortable." Of course, all that ended when Hitler came to power. First, the business was forced to close since Jews were prohibited from being business owners. Ernie was a teenager at that time, and although he graduated from high school, he had to wear a yellow star, denoting his "Jewishness." After his father was arrested on Kristallnacht in November 1938, his parents managed to secure a visa for Ernie to emigrate to the US when a distant relative agreed to serve as his sponsor. Sadly, his parents and younger brother never made it, and all perished in concentration camps. Ernie served as a cook in the US army during WWII, where he also became a US citizen. After the war, Ernie used his new-found cooking skills to open a luncheonette in Queens. We all agree that Ernie made the best egg creams we ever tasted. He was a devoted Mets fan, and served as "master carver" of briskets and turkeys at all family dinners. Ernie married Kate, my mother, and together they had two children and spent more than 60 years together.

So, what made this day even more memorable? It was the realization that the descendants of that dark time, namely Ernie, my brother and me, our children, and now Ernie's great-granddaughter (and almost three-year old great-grandson Graham), are here to carry on our Jewish traditions, and in this case, the name, of one of the very people that hate tried to extinguish from this earth 80 years ago. Welcome to the world, Emily Sophia! Grandpa Ernie's Hebrew name was Eliahu; your Hebrew name is Eliana. Eliana means "my God has answered," and He truly has, not only to us, but, in your birth, to all the Jewish people.




