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Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth Klafter

During this month, we will once again sit at Seder tables to tell the story of our ancient people. The drama begins in Egypt, as Moses pleads with Pharaoh to allow the Israelites to be free to return to our homeland. This journey from servitude to freedom shapes our history and our faith. We know that we continue to work towards liberation in our world today. This struggle is ongoing, as well, in the modern State of Israel.

Once every five years, The World Zionist Congress (WZC) meets in Jerusalem. Jewish adults have the duty and the opportunity to vote in the WZC election. It is a Jewish civic duty and opportunity to cast our vote now until May 4, for delegates to the 39th Congress when it meets next October. This body gives guidance and direction to the World Zionist Organization. Among the crucial tasks of the Congress is to approve the allocation of state funds. Voting in the WZC election is a primary way Jewish individuals living outside of Israel can impact the society and government in Israel.

Among the many slates running for seats in the Congress is

VOTE REFORM.

The Vote Reform slate will make the safe return of all the hostages their number one priority. They will fight to make sure that our children and our children's children are recognized as Jewish in Israel – a right that our ultra-orthodox opponents in this election are trying to take away. The Reform slate upholds the values of equality, feminism, inclusion and religious pluralism in Israel.

Casting a vote is completed online and will take less than five minutes. I urge all members of TBD to vote. (There is a \$5 administration fee to register.)

The bully picked on those he believed to be inferior due to his own lack of intelligence, empathy, and courage. Pharoah was no more than an arrogant opportunist and bully.

Clergy Reflections by Rabbi Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

It's taken me a while to think about how to express what is in my heart this month. Without naming everyone who has recently passed, I must tell you that the list of our beloved congregants is long, including founding and lifelong members like Mort Glick, Sandy Wolfson and Norma Leonard (all just last week). Writing eulogy after eulogy is a bit like the practice of shoveling earth on the grave. It is cathartic and meaningful, and it is heart wrenching in a deep and compelling way.

It also forces me to think about time and energy and love. I've been listening to small tidbits of podcasts by motivational speaker and host of The Mel Robbins Podcast. She believes in listening to our intuitive voices. She teaches us to give ourselves ten minutes in the morning to unplug from social media and phones and become intentional, and she believes in the power of how we think. As I listened to her ideas, like millions of her followers, I found it to be in alignment with so much of what I believe. "When you change the way you think, you change your life," she said. It is so true. There are so many of us who are most comfortable in the role of the victim. When we are asked, "How are you?" our immediate response is either: "exhausted or bored or overwhelmed or for some... Ugh, terrible! Everything is terrible!"

Now, please understand. When someone is in mourning or in the middle of a critical disease, it is important to speak our truth. But, it is also important to take stock of what we have and be able to find places of joy. We wonder where our friends have gone but do we ask if we have been good to people we care about. Have we simply dumped our misery on them for years or have we been givers? Sometimes we need to really become self-aware and take responsibility for our own thinking as I believe Mel would suggest.

Passover is this month and there is always a message that speaks truth to us in this dramatic story. When I think about the bondage of our people, I believe it is the bondage some of us allow ourselves to continue to feel. Our story speaks about narrow places where we were stuck. Are we sometimes stuck too, and do we need to force ourselves forward into a freer more joyful place? Our own land of milk and honey where we can rejoice in a personal kind of redemption? Sound a little corny? Not for me? I believe the power of taking stock of our lives can propel us to a place of renewed joy.

My friends, in this season of rebirth, let us give up the *chomets* of wallowing in unhappiness that keeps us from personal fulfillment and let us taste the *karpas* of resetting our thoughts so that we may be once again filled with the hope of God's promise.

Passover Recipes

Grandma Faust's Passover "Bagels"

Ingredients

1 1/3 cup water
2/3 cup vegetable oil
2 Tbsp. sugar
1/2 tsp. salt
2 cups matzo meal
6 eggs

Directions

Boil water, oil, sugar, and salt.
Stir in matzo meal.
Remove pan from heat.
Stir in eggs, one at a time.
With wet fingertips, roll into balls & place on well-greased cookie sheet.
Make an indent in the center of each ball.
Bake 350-375 degrees for 1 hour.

Mrs. Gessel's Passover Spinach Casserole

Ingredients

1 pkg. chopped spinach thawed & drained
1/2 lb. feta cheese, crumbled
4 eggs, beaten
6 Tbs. matzo meal (or flour when not Passover)
16 oz. cottage cheese
1/2 tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1-2 Tbs. butter
1 tsp. pepper

Directions

Mix spinach and feta cheese in one bowl.
In another bowl, mix eggs, matzo meal (or flour when not Passover), salt, & pepper.
Combine these ingredients plus the cottage cheese and butter.
Place in greased square pan or 9x13 pan if doubling the ingredients.
Bake at 350 degrees for about 1 hour

Spotlight on Brotherhood

Each Monday through Friday morning, my alarm jars me awake at the same time. I grumble, say the same thing and then hit snooze. When I drag myself out from underneath the warm covers of my bed, I do the same things in the same order. Making coffee is second on the list. I get dressed and follow the same pattern each day. (socks, shirt, pants, tie and shoes). Then, it is off to work driving on the same road listening to the same radio station.

We all have habits, and we all follow routines. They provide us with a sense of order and stability, and make it easier for us to complete our daily tasks. The same holds true in our congregational life. Shabbat services follow a routine as well. (henay ma-tov followed by candle-lighting followed by blessing over the wine with the oneg bringing up the rear)

It is not always easy to deviate from patterns and behaviors that have been successful for us in the past. **Change though, can be invigorating.** Starting in January 2025 the first Shabbat service of the month no longer begins at 8:00 pm like the services do for the remainder of the month. Instead, we now gather at 6:30 pm so that those of us with younger families and earlier bedtimes can enjoy the end of the week and the start of Shabbat together.

Our Oneg used to be a gastro-delight. Fresh bakery products and fruit were the norm until Covid forced us to change. This year, Brotherhood has made a small attempt to reverse that pattern. On March 28 we will sponsor our third themed Oneg, featuring ballpark snacks! You may recall that our prior sponsorships offered retroneg (twinkies and ring dings) and traditional (babka, rugelach, black and whites).

Traditionally, Brotherhood held many of its events on Sunday mornings. We would drop our children off at Sunday school and then eat and schmooze until it was time to pick them up at 11:00 am. Rarely did we combine with Sisterhood and jointly hold an event together. This year, we made a small change. Brotherhood often schedules events throughout the week. So far this year, Brotherhood and Sisterhood have jointly sponsored a trip to see the Billy Joel Exhibit, a lecture about antisemitism, and a trip to see Fiddler on the Roof.

I have written previous articles in *HaKol* inviting you to join us at one of our many activities. It would not be a *HaKol* article of mine if I did not extend that invitation again. Thank you to those who bravely came for the first time. Thank you also to those who have returned after an absence. We hope that in either case, your attendance will be the beginning of a new routine for you, one that includes Brotherhood.

We have made some changes in the way we do things this year and are looking to do even more, but we need your help. What events and activities appeal to you? What days and times are the most convenient and likely to encourage your attendance? 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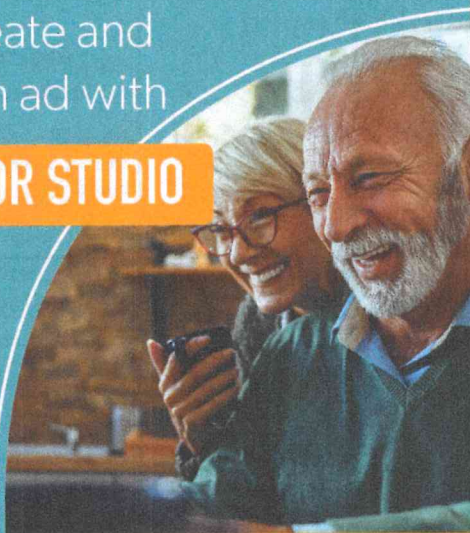
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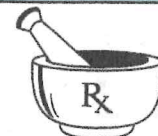


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
