When I was in grade school, we didn't observe "Presidents' Day" as the third Monday in February. The highlight of the month wasn't "Presidents' Week Vacation." Instead, Abraham Lincoln was remembered on his birthday, February 12th. (There is a story in my family that when Lincoln's Birthday was once mentioned at the dinner table, I was about five or six and suggested that we buy him a shirt as a gift!) And we honored our first president on his birthday, the twenty-second day of February.

Among his accomplishments, President George Washington is remembered for the message he shared with Jews in our country. You may know the story about Washington's visit to Touro Synagogue in Newport, Rhode Island. Touro, built in 1763, is the oldest synagogue in North America and it continues to function as a congregation. After a visit to Touro Synagogue in 1790, Washington wrote a letter to the community there. The letter is still read aloud annually in Newport at the congregation. His words, including some that have often been cited, remain meaningful and powerful today. (Following are excerpts from his text.)

The citizens of the United States of America have a right to applaud themselves for having given to mankind examples of an enlarged and liberal policy—a policy worthy of imitation. All possess alike liberty of conscience and immunities of citizenship.

It is now no more that toleration is spoken of as if it were the indulgence of one class of people that another enjoyed the exercise of their inherent natural rights, for, happily, the Government of the United States, which gives to bigotry no sanction, to persecution no assistance, requires only that they who live under its protection should demean themselves as good citizens in giving it on all occasions their effectual support.

Religious School News


While the Jewish people are fortunate to have the opportunity to create a second set of New Year's resolutions each year (January – secular and September – Jewish), we still find ourselves giving up on these resolutions fairly quickly. In an attempt to counter this problem, this year, I have decided to make a resolution that renews itself each month. My resolution,

then, is that on the first of each month, I will review

the resolutions I made in January and September, think about my progress (if any) and amend them where necessary (hopefully). My resolutions often have to do with parenting my two daughters who are now teenagers (Yikes!).

While reading a book on spiritual parenting during the break, I came across a different way of understanding "created in God's image" (b'tzelem Elohim bara). Previously, I had thought of it as doing what is right, walking with God, etc., which is all fine. But Rabbi Paul Kipnes and Michelle November, the authors of *Jewish Spiritual Parenting*, spoke about this idea in terms of parenting. It should be our goal as parents to ensure that our children "identify tzelem Elohim in themselves and others, and thus to create a world of kindness and connectedness" (p. 119).

In other words, we should see our children for whom they are and teach them to see the unique and special qualities of other people as well. Thinking of our children as so closely connected to God helps us understand or at least accept our children's differences. When my eldest was 4, I was troubled with the way she played. I know that sounds crazy, but she



never just played with Legos or dolls or any one thing, like other kids. She would create a city, (right in our living room!) made of furniture, dolls, blankets, Lego creations, and anything else she could find. Everything was scotch-taped together. Yes, it took her hours or sometimes days to create and then play with, but the clean-up became unbearable for me. I couldn't handle it. I spoke to a wise woman from her nursery school. She said to me that her "different" way of playing demonstrates how creative Lindsey is. Those words have stuck with me for the past 15 years. Once I accepted that her behavior (as strange as it was to me at the time), was just a manifestation of her imagination, peace was brought to our house once again. I stopped trying to get her to play with one thing at a time and learned to involve her more in the cleanup. (Her methods of creativity have changed with each phase of childhood – art, writing, filmmaking. She now is an amateur screenwriter and director.)

Why not take February to be the month of finding the "tzelem Elohim" in each of your children? I am holding a Religious School Parenting Workshop on Sunday, March 10th at 9:15 a.m. Please join me for a bagel and conversation about finding "tzelem Elohim" in your children. Bring stories that will help us all become better parents.

from the President's Desk

When I became president of the congregation a fellow congregant gave me a book of quotes as a gift. This same congregant is seemingly always the first to read my article and send me words of praise which certainly helps me as I start the next month's piece.

The book I was given is called *Don't Forget to Sing in the Lifeboats*, by Kathryn and Ross Petras. The subtitle of the book is "uncommon wisdom for uncommon times." It is with this subtext in mind that I want to center my article this month. After the horrific shootings in Pittsburgh, we as a temple and in fact, the entire Jewish community, were poised to take action to make sure this didn't happen in our temple. We are now embarking on what I would consider uncommon times and therefore need to take uncommon or action that we have not typically done.

As you read in the letter expertly written by Craig Cooper, we are already doing a lot to protect all of us, but more is needed. We have hired security guards for major events and busy times in our temple. We have looked to improve our alarm system, conduct lock-out/lock-down drills in our school and make other upgrades to our structure that will help to protect each of us as we enter our building. Additionally, we are conducting training for all Board members who serve as hosts and reps each Friday and Saturday, so that these key people know the procedures in order to protect everyone's health and safety.

Just a few weekends ago I met with Craig Cooper and Steve Sarisohn, and we brainstormed about everything we are doing as a temple to protect our congregants, guests and facility. We also looked at what makes our location vulnerable and discussed what we can do to address these vulnerabilities. We did all of this as we wrote a grant sponsored by the NYS Division of Homeland Security and Emergency Services. As you already know, we asked everyone to make a donation to our security campaign because unfortunately security protection does not come cheap. This grant offered us the opportunity to apply for additional funds to help us fortify (their word not mine) our facility.

Unfortunately, we did not receive the grant but will continue to pursue other grant opportunities (they let us know one will be offered in 2019). Many thanks to Craig and Steve for all their hard work and grant-writing skills, to all who donated to our security campaign, and to the countless volunteers who help to make TBD prosper and continue to be an amazing place to call home.

As president, I am always humbled by the tremendous efforts of all who work to ensure our temple's future. These very efforts resonated when I read this quote by Isaac Bashevis Singer from the book I was given. Isaac said, "For those who are willing to make an effort, great miracles and wonderful treasures are in store." I hope the miracle we gain is peace for all, and the treasure we gain is enhanced protection from those who do not share in the miracle we believe in.





Let's enjoy the calm of February, so we will be ready to participate in our exciting future events, making Sisterhood the terrific organization it is!


