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### Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

**O**ur current Hebrew year, 5782, brought us the High Holidays, the fall holidays, and Chanukah very "early" in the secular year. This month it brings us *Tu B'Shevat* early, too! *Tu B'Shevat*, the 15<sup>th</sup> day of the Hebrew month of Shevat, also known as the "New

Year of the Trees," more typically arrives in February.\*

As I have explained previously, the new year of the trees is one of four new years mentioned in the Torah. On this date, every tree which had been planted during the preceding months is considered new. It is important to know the exact age of a tree to fulfill two precepts of Jewish law. The first called, Orlah, decrees that for the first three years of its growth, the fruit of a tree may not be eaten, reminding us that all food ultimately comes from God. But what if we don't remember the exact date when it is planted and begins bearing fruit? We note this date as the new year of all trees so we know when the third year of its growth is marked. Similarly, to fulfill the commandment of Ma'aser, tithes, our ancestors had to mark a specific date to quantify the produce of a tree in order to offer one tenth of its produce for the year to the priests of old.

While these regulations may not apply to the trees on Long Island in 2022, by recalling them we are reminded that we are bound to the land of Israel. Thus in recent generations, we have come to observe Tu B'Shevat as a day to celebrate the trees of modern Israel. This is the source of the Jewish National Fund's efforts for all of us to 'plant a tree' in Israel at this time. We don't have to be in Israel to plant a tree and we surely don't have to get our hands dirty either. Today we can do so from the warmth and ease of our homes through the Jewish National Fund (visit https://usa.jnf.org/jnf-tree-planting-center).

Planting a tree is a vote for the future. On this subject, one of my favorite teachings from the Talmud comes from Rabbi Yohanan ben Zakkai. He taught: "If you are holding a seedling in your hand and you hear that the Messiah is coming, plant the seedling first and then go and greet the Messiah."

Join me, then, during the cold of our winter, bring warmth and new growth to our world and our homeland.

\*A calendar note: 5782 is a leap year on the Hebrew calendar. An entire month will be added to the calendar after Shevat. Therefore, Purim and Passover will actually be 'late' this year!

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### Clergy Reflections by Rabbi Audrey Halpern

 $m{D}$ ear Friends,

It occurred to me that I am writing this to you at the end of a long holiday weekend and you will probably receive it at the end of the next holiday weekend. The holidays are often emotion filled times when we miss people who have passed or simply live far away, and our expectations are high for our family time. They can be challenging in a myriad of ways because when children

return or parents visit, friends stop by and our tables are filled, our emotions can be triggered in unexpected ways. Needless to say, we mostly love to be with those who are close to us, but old dynamics can creep in, exhaustion exacerbates emotions and either we, or those around us can feel envy, isolation and even despair.

I have heard from so many of you that the holidays are the hardest time of year, and every therapist knows that the old saying, "comparison is the thief of joy," is never truer than on a holiday or special occasion. It is human nature, but how can we cope with these very natural feelings.

Firstly, I think that we can remind ourselves that just like on Facebook, nobody's life is really picture perfect. We can acknowledge that though someone else may seem to have it all, we can be certain that every life and every family faces its own unique challenges.


Secondly, though it may sound like a cliché, we also need to take stock of the good we each enjoy. I was recently with a group of women who all spontaneously took out their phones and began sharing pictures of their baby grandchildren. I noticed (fortunately before I took out my own phone) that a couple of the women suddenly became quiet and did not take out their phones. So, I would add that the third thing we can do is to try to be sensitive to others who may feel particularly vulnerable at the holidays.

There is a reason that the Torah instructs us to care for the widow and the orphan. It is more than a physical caring – it can be an emotional attunement as well. We must always care for those who are having a hard time, but the holidays can be the most poignantly trying times of the year and the most critical time to show kindness.

Many people suffer from the holiday blues and extreme loneliness and depression. Those of us who are surrounded by lots of family must remember that while family always brings a little 'touch of tired' it is nothing when we think of what it must be to face loneliness.

As I rest up from my own family chaos, I write to you to express my availability to listen and to be present if this time meant to celebrate and rejoice has been difficult for you in any way. In the meantime, I offer my sincere hope that 2022 will find all of us filled with renewed hope, health, and a true sense of connection to one another.
















### Spotlight on Brotherhood
