HOW TO "Let Your Home Become a Sanctuary"

Our theme for the season is "Let Your Home Become a Sanctuary," reflecting the message in the Book of Exodus, "V'asu Li Mikdash." In ancient days, our ancestors were instructed to build a sanctuary, a sacred space, wherever they traveled. This year we encourage you to do the same: to create within each of your homes a mikdash me'at – a small sanctuary enabling you to sense the heights and the depths of these auspicious days. We hope these practical ideas help you accomplish this.

Choose a prayer space that is not your 'usual' place to sit at your computer screen, if possible. Use this same place for all worship services during the season. Wherever your screen sits, place a tablecloth under or around it. Move other items away from the screen if possible or cover them with a pretty cloth. In place of file folders or pens, surround your screen with fresh flowers, candlesticks in the evening, photographs of loved ones. Select seating in which you will sit comfortably without lounging, adding a special pillow perhaps.

Included in the High Holiday Gift Bag which will be distributed or mailed to all households are pictures to display around your home prayer space which you can color if you wish. They include images of our temple building and sanctuary: in this way you can literally bring TBD into your own home.

During Live Stream Services, disconnect other electronics, including other programs that might be on your computer. Turn off your cell phone, as you would in the temple sanctuary. Turn off a landline as well.

Dress in a way that will help you transform yourself to prepare for Services. While this might not be as formal as you would dress in the temple sanctuary, we encourage you to change your attire during services. Wear a kippah or tallit if these are your customs.

Be on time and participate in Services, standing or sitting as comfortable or traditional. Follow in the printed High Holiday Prayer Booklets we are providing to each household; print additional copies before services if you wish. (Links to these documents will be posted on the temple website.)

Lastly, be open to the new experiences of this season. Prepare yourself and your space. Let your home become a sanctuary, a sacred space to welcome the year 5781.

Message ftom President Craig Cooper



Down by the Sea Shore

In the spirit of the holiday season, I apologize if this sounds like I am "tooting my own shofar," but bringing Tashlich to TBD is something I am particularly happy about. Some time after our family joined Temple Beth David in 2013 (yes, we're still considered "new members" by some), I learned that there wasn't a tashlich ceremony during the High Holidays. I remember asking the Rabbi and Cantor what would be involved to add tashlich to the calendar, and in 2015 we printed a flyer, got permission from the town, and the clergy put together a short prayer sheet to

When I asked the Rabbi if she knew how to get to the location I had secured, she reminded me that *tashlich* is a very personal experience. It's just you, some bread crumbs and the opportunity to cast away your sins. She encouraged me to lead the ceremony myself – to find a few people to read from the prayer sheet, make sure someone there could blow the shofar, and make sure no one drowns (kidding.) And for some crazy reason my takeaway from our conversation was "You can do this, Craig – *vaya con Dios.*" (She didn't actually say that, but it's the feeling I left with.)

So I talked it up, left flyers outside the sanctuary, publicized it in The Megillah, and around 40 people came to the Kings Park bluffs on a beautiful Rosh Hashana afternoon. When I realized some people arrived without bread to throw, I made a mental note for the following year, and robbed some leftover hot dog buns from the temple freezer (this has become an annual tradition.) Our attendance has grown each year, probably reaching 75 people – old, young, families with kids, even a few non-members who saw the flyer somewhere. And dogs. There have been at least three or four dogs in attendance.

If you're not familiar with *Tashlich*, there's actually a really cool video here https://tinyurl.com/y6er2qv6 that explains it in less than a minute. If you can't copy the link, just do a YouTube search for "Tashlich: A Rosh Hashanah Tradition."

In any case, as the temple leadership and clergy discussed this year's High Holidays and the very unique circumstances surrounding our virtual services and other special plans, we agreed *tashlich* will take place by the water's edge. And then something dawned on us. It became clear that *tashlich* may end up being the first real opportunity for the Temple Beth David family to worship together since we closed our physical building. I can't think of a more meaningful, personal, yet communal experience for us to share. If you're thinking of attending, please keep a close watch for details and strict social distancing guidelines. If you're so inclined, find a disposable face mask and decorate it for the New Year!

This year's ceremony is scheduled for 3:00 pm on Saturday, September 19, with Sunday the 20th as a rain date, at the same time. This year we are planning our ceremony at Sunken Meadow State Park which offers a more accessible and larger space than the Kings Park Bluffs. The Sunken Meadow Park Director knows TBD well from past Mitzvah Day projects there, and he has invited us to use the beach. (NOTE: It's likely the toll booths will still be staffed, and if so, you will be asked to pay the \$8.00 daily fee. If this is an issue for anyone, please contact the clergy or me.) More details will be published between now and Rosh Hashana.

As we enter the month of Elul, you will be receiving frequent emails with inspiring messages that will guide the TBD family toward the celebration of the new year 5781.

My family and I wish each of you an early "Shana Tovah" and we hope to see you down by the seashore.

Margie Gursky Religious Achool News

I had no idea back in March when we closed our school that we would still be in the middle of a pandemic in September. Alas, that is the case. Keeping the safety of all families and staff in the forefront, we will be opening our Religious School online. Rabbi Klafter and I have been working for months to construct a program, which although different, will be comparable in meaningfulness and whose schedule will work for the majority of TBD families. For

those of you for whom this schedule does not work, please let us know immediately as it is our goal to accommodate all families' needs during this very uncertain time. As author Margaret Drabble said, "When nothing is sure, everything is possible." So, we are striving toward finding unique possibilities for families who are being challenged by this pandemic.

Here is a basic recap of our schedule: Instead of two hours inside a classroom, fourth, fifth and sixth grade students will attend virtually two days per week for 30 minutes each. Before or after the Tuesday and Wednesday classes, we have also attached a 15 minute "Snack and Chat" session where students can talk or chat with their fellow students and teachers. Kindergarten through third grade, however, will attend once per week for 30 minutes, Snack and Chat is scheduled for second and third grade as well. Seventh grade will meet once a week for 45 minutes, plus Snack and Chat.

While finding community online can be difficult, I have been working with our teachers throughout the summer to develop ways for them to get to know students, as well as for students to engage with each other. One of the methods we will be utilizing is the "Snack and Chat" sessions before/after classes. Another is through breakout rooms. Students will be broken up into small groups (breakout rooms) to discuss a question provided by the teacher or to practice prayers. Student aides will be assigned to these breakout rooms and teachers will pop in and out of them to monitor students' progress.

To maintain a high level of Hebrew learning while school remains remote, every student from grades two through seven will be privately tutored by a teacher. In addition, any child who needs extra tutoring will be paired with a student aide for a virtual session outside of school hours. Speaking of student aides, we will have three different types of student aides this year:: Tutors, Techies, and Class Assistants. If you think your child could be helpful and may want to volunteer in one of these areas, please email me. I need as many as I can get! Also, this is a great way for teens to get community service hours this year!

When will we be returning to the building, you may want to know? I want to know that too! TBD has a reopening committee which is working very hard on just that question. They are currently trying to figure out whether and when we can have family workshops in-person, in small groups of course. For those of you who do not want to return to the building anytime soon (which is completely understandable), we will have an option for remote learning. No one will be put into an uncomfortable position.

Although religious school does not begin until October 4, we will be providing plenty of ways for you to connect with the High Holiday season. First, we will be sending out emails everyday of Elul (the month prior to Rosh HaShanah). Emails will contain videos and activities for you and your family to help you get in the holiday spirit! Also, we are having a Zoom Family Holiday Program on September 13. Please keep an eye out for emails and Facebook posts for the details.
