Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

We begin the month of March with the celebration of Purim. The holiday itself falls on Wednesday evening, February 28th and March 1st. In addition to a Purim Pizza Party, Purim Service and Megillah reading on the night of the 28th, our annual Purim Shpiel and Carnival will be held on Sunday, March 4th. Many thanks to Jodi Maisel and Steve Sarisohn, the authors, playwrights, composers, producers and directors of the Shpiel, and to their Broadway-bound cast. Thanks, too, to Stacey Kravette and Randi Lieberman, TBD's Youth Group Advisors, and their 'teams' of youth preparing for the Carnival and assisting on the day. Once again, the Brotherhood will be at the 'concession stand' with lots of edibles. To the many adults and older teens, we thank you. The excitement and 'bouncy-fun' at our temple celebrations for families during the year (the Chanukah Experience, Family Fun Day and this month's Purim Carnival) are made possible by Abe Kaplan and his company, "The Big Bounce Theory." 
Our secular month will end with the festival of Passover. First Night Seder is on Friday evening, March 30th. (Please note that there will be no Shabbat evening services on March 30th.) Worship services for the first day will be held on Saturday, March 31st at 10 am. Everyone is welcome! Once again, Cantor Halpern and I will be leading the Sisterhood Women's Seder on Wednesday, March 21st for women of all generations.

Though Passover commemorates an event in our people's ancient history, it seems that each year, the meaning and message of the holiday remain central in our contemporary world. The command to be kind and just to 'the stranger' because we were strangers in the land of Egypt is repeated many times in the Torah and throughout our collective experience. Who is 'the stranger?' we may ask.

In the world of the Torah, we were strangers because we were foreigners in the land of Egypt itself. We were sometimes referred to as 'ger v'toshav,' a resident alien, one given permission to live somewhere while remaining distinct and different than the indigenous people of the land. We may have lived there, but we didn't have the rights of ownership or the freedom to develop our own community in Egypt. This was

Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

As we have all said countless times, "The holidays are always early or late but never on time!" This year we will celebrate both Purim and Passover in the month of March. So just as we finish the leftover hamentashen, we will begin to think about getting rid of the chametz. We will see matzah on supermarket shelves and we will turn our thoughts to a different kind of victory for our people. In contrast to the incredible heroism of Mordecai and Esther and the initiative that they demonstrated to take control of their destiny, Passover illustrates a more passive victory. We did our part to be sure, but it was God, according to the story, who saved us from the hand of the Egyptians.

What similarities could there be between Pharaoh and Haman, Moses and Mordecai, Miriam and Esther? According to traditional sources, "... it is a pattern in the Jewish calendar that there should be a thirty-day period of preparation before a major observance." The High Holidays have the month of Ellul before them with preparations and soundings of the shofar. Passover also has its preparatory season, with the Fast of Esther and Purim to set the tone for a spring of commemoration and celebration. Additionally, the main part of the story in Esther took place on Passover. Haman cast the infamous lot to set a date for the destruction of the Jews on the 13th of Nisan (Esther 3:7, 12). The third day, when Esther went in to see the king, would have been Nisan 15. Thus, the Jews of Susa fasted through Passover in that year!

Both Passover and Purim occurred outside the land, in Egypt and Persia. Both involved the near extermination of the people of Israel. Moses and Esther both appeared before kings to rescue their people. Pharaoh's army and Haman both perished. In The Complete Book of Jewish Observance, Leo Trepp notes that Purim is a fulfillment of the saying from the Passover Haggadah: "Not just one Pharaoh rose against us to exterminate us, but in every generation did they rise up to exterminate us, and each time the Holy One Blessed Be He has rescued us from their hands."

On the surface, though, the two redemptions could not be more dissimilar. *Pesach* is a Torah-based holiday whose fundamental observances are rooted in Torah law; Purim is a rabbinic holiday whose laws and customs are grounded in the rabbinic tradition.

Pesach commemorates the establishment of the Jewish people through deliverance from Egyptian bondage at the very beginning of the biblical narrative, forty years before we entered and conquered the land of Israel; the story of Purim comes at the very end of the biblical era. In the Jewish calendar, Pesach falls in the very first month of Nissan; Purim is celebrated in the very last month of the year.

By contrast, though, the redemption of Purim was almost the antithesis of that of *Pesach*. The Jews of Persia, led by Mordechai and Esther, took control of their own destiny. The miracles that took place were subtle and concealed, unlike the drama of the Passover story. The downtrodden, in a persistent exile that seemed like it would never end, rose up mightily to subdue and defeat their enemies.

On Passover – the seventh day – we were told that "God will fight for you, and you will be silent" (*Shemot* 14:14). On Purim, God remained in the background, with no explicit reference to Him even in the *megillah*, the chronicle of the account, and the Jewish people seized the moment and the day, defeated our enemies.

Our pride, however, and our traditions and connections are reaffirmed with both victories. We feel a palpable righteousness rise up inside us when we are reminded of the struggle of our people and what we have overcome in generations past. May this month of March be a time of reflection and rededication to the values for which our heroes have fought and risked their very lives to preserve.



from the President's Desk

As I sat down to write this month's *HaKol* article I am thinking about the Olympic Winter Games. As I watch each event I find myself routing for the American athlete in each event. As the United States continues to win medals, I remember noticing in the Opening Ceremony that there was an Israeli team in these games. Based on the Israeli climate I wouldn't think they would field a team.

This year the Israeli team consists of ten members, by far their largest delegation ever sent to compete in the Winter Olympics, according to the "The Times of Israel". The biggest Israeli delegation at a Winter Olympics prior to this year was five. These ten athletes will be competing in four sports: figure skating, short-track speed skating, alpine skiing and skeleton. Israel has never won a Winter Olympics medal, and none of the athletes coming this year are expected to win. I know, I will be looking for them and rooting them on.

There are other Jewish athletes competing in this Winter Olympics as part the United States and Canadian teams. I listed a few below:

Jared Goldberg is a 26-year-old skier who was raised in Utah and had his Bar Mitzvah in a ski lodge. He finished in the 11th and 19th places in combined and giant slalom respectively, at the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi.

Ariel Gold is a 21-year-old snowboarder from Colorado who will be competing against her elder brother, Taylor Gold, 24 also an Olympic snowboarder. Both will be competing in the halfpipe.

Dylan Moscovitch is a 33-year-old figure skater from Toronto. He is in his fourth season with his skating partner, Lubov Ilyushechkina. In the 2016-2017 season the pair won medals at nearly every international competition.

Emery Lehman is a 22-year-old long track speedskater who hails from Oak Park, Chicago. He competed at the 2014 Games, placing 16th.

As I watch these Olympics, I am reminded of a classic self-deprecating line from the 1980 movie Airplane! An elderly lady asks the stewardess for light reading, and the stewardess responds by handing her a leaflet of famous Jewish sports legends. Hopefully after these Olympics and the thirty-five years since this movie aired there have been many additional Jewish sports legends.

News from Isaiah 58

Jews all over the world will celebrate Passover beginning Friday night, March 30. We will join with family and friends to read our Haggadahs to recall our history, the story of Exodus, and our journey from being slaves in Egypt to becoming a free people. At our Passover Seders we recall our history and its lessons to our children and gathered guests. When reading from the Haggadah and sharing our story, we recount our degradation, the oppression of slavery, and how we as a people were sustained by God to be able to endure our flight from Egypt, wandering in the desert, and ultimately achieve freedom and dignity for ourselves and our descendants. In addition to retelling our story, family traditions, the ritual foods we place on our Seder plates, and the traditional family recipes we prepare for Pesach link generation to generation and help bind us together as families and Jewish communities.

Haggadahs are written in many languages, express the diversity among Jewry around the world, encompass a range of styles, illustrations, poetry and song, and tell our story so that our children learn from our history and its universal theme of hope, deliverance from slavery and oppression, and the triumph over oppression. Our story from slavery to freedom has historically resonated with non-Jews in the United States and around the world, providing hope for marginalized people who experience discrimination, and seek freedom and dignity for themselves and their children. We, as Jews this season, give thanks for our freedom and recall the trials of so many of our ancestors whose sacrifices enabled us to live in freedom. Pesach is also a season to think about those in our own communities as well as in other lands who have difficult lives and do not feel free due to prejudice, including societal fears of people different from themselves. As we as Jews give thanks for our freedom, let us hope and strive to enable everyone in our communities to live without fear and experience freedom and human dignity.

Isaiah 58 accepts donations to feed and clothe those in need throughout the year. This Passover, any donation of Kosher for Passover nonperishable food is appreciated. Please place items in the designated bin at the rear of the temple, near the Religious School office, by Sunday morning, March 25.

Wishing everyone a healthy and joyous Pesach.





our legal status there.

In a broader sense, a stranger is not just someone we do not know; a stranger is typically someone we fear. Out of that fear, fear of the unknown and the different, the human instinct is often to distance and protect ourselves. In doing so, we may lose sight of the worth of the stranger. I believe that the ancient, Hebrew commandment is addressing this aspect of relating to 'the stranger.'

Several authors of the recent centuries offer some more impressions about 'the stranger.' Irish and English author, William Butler Yeats, reminds us, "There are no strangers here; only friends you haven't yet met." A generation later and closer to home, Tennessee Williams notes, "I have always depended on the kindness of strangers." And what of the stranger who 'lies within' us? As another favorite author of mine, Carson McCullers in The Heart is a Lonely Hunter, pens, "I'm a stranger in a strange land." Lastly, Albert Camus' well-known piece, The Stranger, "L'Étranger,' comes to my mind. Much has been written about the narrative and about the meaning of the title. I find it interesting that the protagonist is described as the 'stranger' because of his emotional indifference in his society. While there is much more to say about these quotations from scholars of literature, I find them helpful in reminding us that the message of the commandment, so central to our Passover Seder, is to remain spiritually open to celebrate the worth of all individuals, including ourselves. In doing so, we can enrich our own lives and the lives of others.
