Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

As the Religious School year comes to an end this month, we will be honoring the 12th Grade and the 10th Grade of students in our Community Hebrew High School (CHHS). On Monday evening, May 14th, TBD students, Sarah Brandsdorfer, Michelle Cohen, Alex Rousso and Ethan Rousso will join their classmates from Temple Beth El in Huntington for Graduation from the CHHS Program. Graduation begins at 7:00 p.m. Mazel Tov to these students and we wish them all the best as they begin the next chapter of their lives, heading off to college in the fall. CHHS Confirmation will be held on Monday evening, May 21st at 7:00 p.m. It has been my privilege to study with the tenth graders this year as we prepare for this meaningful celebration. TBD members of the Confirmation class are Amy Held, Jessica Hymowitz, Eric Rousso and Elyssa Zucker. The congregation is invited to both of these events.

This spring marks the end, not only of this school year, but of more than two decades of Shirley Offman's dedication and devotion to Temple Beth David and especially to our children. As we announced earlier this year, Mrs. Offman will be retiring at the end of June.

Mrs. Offman began as an instructor in the classrooms of the Early Childhood Learning Center and as a teacher in our Religious School. She brought her warmth to each child in her class and she enriched the curriculum of any grade she taught. We can't begin to count the impact she has had on our congregation and our TBD family. How many moments of kindness she has shared, how many craft supplies she has assembled, how many bottles of apple juice she has provided, how many lessons she has taught, how many phone calls she has had, how many textbooks she has ordered, how many colleagues she has assisted, how many family programs she has developed.

# Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

 $oldsymbol{D}$ ear Friends.

These articles, however, are due by the end of the first week of the preceding month, and so, I am sitting here writing to you during Chol HaMoeid Pesach and the service and celebration are still weeks away. I am still praying I don't get a cold and that all of the details which seem endless and out of control, will somehow all come together. What I can already tell you, however, is how grateful I am to Beverly Wolcott and the Anniversary Committee, Gary, the choir and musicians, and Rabbi Klafter, who have all been working diligently to make this weekend meaningful and memorable! After services, Steve and I will host a special Oneg Shabbat in their honor.

Thank you all for being part of our communal celebrations this year. It is wonderful to have all of you share in our joy.

### from the President's Desk

 $oldsymbol{T}$ he state of Israel has faced numerous issues throughout its entire history. Israel has had to deal with its hostile neighbors, its vast desert terrain, and its unique demographic make-up. As Israel celebrates it's 70th Anniversary on May 14th, I wanted to highlight some of the country's major accomplishments as it overcame its countless obstacles.



Israel is 60 percent desert, thus its farmers and agricultural scientists have long focused on expanding both the yield and quality of crops, as well as making agriculture more efficient. The world's first surface drip irrigation system was developed in the 1960s at Kibbutz Hatzerim near Beersheba. Drip irrigation has become popular with fruit and vegetable growers in dry weather areas, from Southern California to the Middle East. Israeli scientists have developed genetically modified, disease-resistant bananas, peppers and other crops that have helped expand the world's food supply.

Israeli High-Tech developments are used around the world. Many offices now have computerized phones that plug into the Internet, taking advantage of Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP). VocalTec Communications of Herzliya, Israel, developed the first practical Internet phone software. Metacafe, the world's third most popular video sharing website, was founded in Israel. The original IBM Personal computers were controlled by the Intel 8088 processer that was developed by Intel's Israeli division. More recently, The Pentium M series processors for laptop computers using the Intel Centrino platform were also designed by Intel Israel.

Israel leads the world in such critical fields as solar power generation and seawater desalination. Thus, Israel contributes to a cleaner world. Israel is planning to break from gasoline dependency to provide structure and predictability to the marketplace. Finally, Israel has set a national goal to increase its share of renewable energy in electricity generation by 10% by 2020. In the same period of time, Israel plans to reduce its electricity consumption by 20 percent. Israel's doctors, scientists and researchers have produced countless medical advances and drugs.

The Jewish state is now a member of the exclusive Organization for Economic Cooperation (OECD), has hundreds of companies listed on Nasdaq and its expertise, technology, humanitarian assistance and defense strategies are utilized by many countries. Neil Brandsdorfer

## Spotlight on Brotherhood

I'm almost reluctant to use the word "Spring" in this column. Here we are, more than a full month into the season, and my heaviest winter parka was used a week ago against a below-freezing wind chill. One of my biggest dilemmas for several weeks was deciding whether or not to put the snow blower away for the season.

It would be nice if each of our dilemmas was no more earth-shaking than that, but the truth is so many of our choices cause much more meaningful effects. The notion of "choice" became a part of many of the things our temple and our Brotherhood did together in the past several weeks.

Our Yom Hashoah presentation in April was an amazing and very moving experience. We learned about the heartbreaking, yet hope-inspiring story of Fred Gross's parents, Agi and Andi. Their choice to leave Europe for Palestine in the 1930's was understandable. Their choice to return to Europe just before the Nazi uprising was ironic and upsetting to consider.

As Passover approaches, each of us makes the choice about how (or if) to bring the festival to life in our homes. If you're like our family, whatever small or large changes you make during those eight days lead to thoughts and discussions about the history of our people, and in many cases, very spirited discussions about what you can and can't eat during *Pesach*, and why.

Another choice that was exercised in April was the creation of the proposed slate of officers by the Brotherhood's Nominating Committee. I'm looking forward to passing the torch to a new team of leaders, and excited at the ideas and new programs that are already being discussed.

In many ways, I feel that one major event on the Temple and Brotherhood calendars each May is really the ultimate choice in the entire year. Mitzvah Day.

Our Hakol publication and mailing schedule makes it tricky to know if you will be reading this column before or after Sunday, May 6<sup>th</sup>, but in either case, here's the point – make the choice to be a part of Mitzvah Day. Now, and in the future.

Mitzvah Day presents levels of choices for each of us. The first, of course, is whether to participate at all. I've been consistently proud of how many Brothers and their families enroll in an activity, or help out with some part of the event held at the temple.

Enjoy the sunshine!




