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Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

As many know, *Talmud Torah*, Jewish learning, the study of Torah and all Jewish books, is among the highest values in Judaism. In fact, we are told that *Talmud Torah* is the greatest commandment because it leads to all the others. Learning is a value for young and older alike. In fact, one of the greatest early scholars of Judaism began his studies at the age of forty.

This is the story of Rabbi Akiba. Until the age of forty, Akiba was illiterate and despaired that he could never master the books of Judaism. One time, he was gazing at a rock which had been eroded by water – drops of water, which fell on it each day. Akiba immediately saw the connection between the rock and his learning; he realized he could begin one drop at a time as well. Over time, he became a sage and leader of the Jewish community in the first/second century in Israel.

Akiba teaches us that one is never too old to engage in *Talmud Torah*, the study of Judaism and Jewish texts. His example also reminds us that every daunting task can begin with a first step.

With Akiba in mind, I am happy to invite Jewish adults in our Temple family who have not already become Bar or Bat Mitzvah, to participate in adult learning with the goal of becoming Bar or Bat Mitzvah in the coming year. The focus of the learning will be on the Hebrew alphabet and Hebrew reading. Each adult Bar or Bat Mitzvah will work towards reading/chanting from the scroll of Torah and chanting the traditional Aliyah blessings. The service will be held on a Friday evening during Shabbat worship next year for all participants.

Cantor Halpern, Dr. Margie Gursky and I will be teachers of the class. We are in the preliminary stages of planning because we first want to hear from interested adults. Please contact me by May 31 so we can plan a gathering sometime in June to further discuss our plans.

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Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

By the time you read this, the haggadahs will be back on the shelf, the good china and the big serving dishes back in the buffet and the fresh bagels may even be in the freezer! I am happy to say, though, that the enduring lessons of Passover will not have been forgotten. No, I am not talk-

ing now about freedom and redemption. I am referring today to an unlikely lesson of Passover that speaks to me.

This year someone invited us to their Seders and asked me to share one theme of Passover that was near and dear to me. He confided that he was going to speak about the little known fact that it wasn't really Moses who parted the sea. It took the first steps of an ordinary person to enter the sea for the waters to part. What an extraordinary lesson in the sheer democracy of our faith! The value each of us brings to our people is equal to any leader. It teaches us the power of community and the individual all at once. Brilliant, I thought, as I became increasingly anxious. What in the world is near and dear to me that I can speak about with any credibility or honesty? And then it came to me.

It may sound a little far-fetched, but I have become a little bit obsessed with a rising star from the east –not the Middle East, but the Far East - Japan. It's Marie Kondo! Now, please don't write to me that I am blasphemous for advocating a Buddhist philosophy and I am in no way going that far, but I do have an understanding when Marie talks about understanding objects as more than objects. I don't kneel or ask my house for permission before I clean out. Instead, I may pour a double cup of Japanese tea for the caffeine to keep going and get through those junk drawers.

What really speaks to me, though, is Marie's philosophy to keep only what sparks joy and the idea that less is more. I may not be able to fold my tee shirts so that they neatly stand up (but I haven't given up), but I am definitely the queen of giving away what no longer "sparks joy." The word she uses for this in Japanese is *tokimeku*. It is similar to the verb used for the feeling you would get when you see your crush – it makes you flutter.

Marie is clearly influenced by her culture, and the Zen philosophy of "less is more" is something we can all learn from, which brings me right back to Passover. What in the world, you may ask does Marie Kondo have to do with the lessons of Passover?

Well, for me the spring cleaning and the ridding ourselves and our shelves of chometz is a metaphor for cleaning out the real crumbs that clog our lives physically and spiritually. We busy ourselves and we rush around, we buy things we don't need, we eat things we shouldn't, and we speak in ways that don't reflect who we want to be. By thinking about the physical removal of chometz from our homes we can begin the real cleaning out that can lead us to find the true sparks of joy that are the essentials to a deeper and fuller life. Here is to a springtime free from clutter and filled with joy!

Religious School News

It is hard for me to believe, but I am now finishing my first year as Assistant Director of our Religious School. While I can definitely take a deep breath, I also have the stress of what my kids will do this summer. Summer (or at least the approaching of summer) is often stressful as parents are desperately planning their children's time off from school.

For some parents, summer means pools, beaches, sleeping late, vacations, and most importantly, no homework. Some families embrace the idea of unstructured outside play all summer, though this idea is becoming less common as more families do not have a parent home during the day. And yet for others, summer can be a time of anxiety, especially for a family that needs childcare or camp.

How can parents find a way to provide a meaningful, yet restful summer for their children? I guess the answer really depends on your individual child(ren). If your child needs a lot of activity, then the full-day, as well as sleep-away, camps are a great choice. The Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) has some great sleepaway options for the artsy child, the techy child, the athletic child and the child who prefers a little of everything (I know that sounded like the four children in the Passover Haggadah!) URJ even has programs for teens as well.

If you have a child who needs a lot of down-time, maybe the full day, intensive camp situation might not be appropriate. That child may need a shorter day program or alternate weeks of camp with weeks at home. You can check out our local JCC to see if any of their programs work with your schedule and family needs.

Jewish camps provide a wonderful opportunity for kids to form a community of Jewish friends in a fun atmosphere. Jewish values are not just taught but lived; Jewish camps are structured for children to live Jewishly through unique Shabbat celebrations, camper-led services, community service projects, opportunities to learn about Israeli culture and Jewish history, as well as *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* training. And perhaps most importantly, Jewish camp experiences strengthen our children's Jewish identity, a gift that lasts a lifetime. If you would like more information about Jewish camps, please stop by the office and ask. Or explore the URJ camp website www.uriyouth.org/camps.

Whatever you end up with, I hope you and your family have a meaningful summer. Try to find time to spend with your children, whether at home playing ball in the backyard, visiting local parks and beaches, or traveling.

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Spotlight on Brotherhood

Thanks are due to the multi-talented Phil Reinstein, who provided music for the morning event.
