Rabbi's Message by Rabbi Beth H. Klafter

\boldsymbol{D} ear Friends,

Decades ago when I lived in Jerusalem for the first year of my rabbinic studies at Hebrew Union College, the fourth Thursday in November was a day like all other days at the College and in the city. For most of us, US citizens living abroad, it was still Thanksgiving. So we made our own holiday, preparing a festive meal, celebrating new friendships, and sharing that we all probably missed "home and family" that day.

Thanksgiving in New England developed as a blending of the cultures of the Native people of North America, the Pilgrims and Puritans. On Thanksgiving, they offered gratitude for a bountiful fall harvest and they prayed for blessings in the seasons to come. The concept of "giving thanks" is embedded in the Jewish tradition as well. One of the prayers included in our weekday and Shabbat worship is called, "Hoda'ah," literally meaning, "thanks." [There is a play on words because the Hebrew word for turkey is "hodoo," which is actually a different word than Hoda'ah but it sounds similar!] The prayer begins, "Modim anachnu lach," "We thank You for the numberless gifts and blessings that fill our days."

In many ways, this fall has not been one of "blessings" for many in our nation and our world. Hurricanes, earthquakes and fires have dev(Continued on page 15)

Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

As any of us who have celebrated milestone anniversaries know, they are an opportunity to reflect and also to express gratitude. This has never been truer than the anniversary we are commemorating on Friday, December 1, when we will honor our organist and musical director, Dr. Gary de Sesa.

When I was called to the pulpit as full-time Cantor of TBD in July of 1988, even before I began working, the first task I was charged with was finding the right organist. When Gary heard about the position, he contacted us. He came in and we met to talk briefly. I still remember bringing Gary into the sanctuary to the piano to hear him play. Quite simply, I was shocked! Right here in the middle of Commack I had found nothing less than a world class talent. Not only was Gary a Julliard trained classical pianist with a Master's degree from Julliard and a doctoral degree from NYU in piano with impeccable credentials, he was also the associate director of the Columbia University Glee Club. How was this possible?!

In addition to his superb pianistic skills, Gary was incredibly gifted at transforming a single line of music into an arranged piece with beautiful accompaniment. There is no way to overstate his talents. From accompanying with the perfect sense of tempo and style, to his ability to rearrange music for choirs, conduct choral music and direct rehearsals - he had it all. As we like to say, there was no doubt from the very beginning that Gary was the real deal and so much more. From his perfect pitch to his impeccable musical taste, we have enjoyed the blessing of this rare treasure for thirty years!

What few people know, however, is the man behind the pony tail. Gary is a family man first. His devotion to his beautiful wife Kita is unparalleled and he is a proud and loving father to their talented and wonderful son, Garinka. Gary and Kita have been loyal friends of ours and they have both been there for me through thick and thin. Working with Gary is not only a pleasure, it is an honor. Our relationship has always been based on trust, respect and love - the cornerstones of any successful partnership.

The music that will be featured on December 1 are original compositions from Gary's full Friday evening service: Shabbat Joy, Shabbat Peace. This work has been performed across the country including a performance I was honored to be featured in at Lincoln Center. He brought the work to Moscow and it received international acclaim.

Although Gary is too modest to speak of his amazing achievements, this thirtieth anniversary is a time that we can tell you, our dear Gary, that we know just how fortunate we are to have been blessed to be able to listen to the beautiful music you bring to life each and every week. From junior choir to adult choir; from weekly Shabbats to Shabbat Under the Stars and the High Holidays - Gary, none of it would happen without you! Thank you from all of your friends and fans at Temple Beth David and from me - the new little cantor that listened to you all those years ago and never let you go!



News from Isaiah 58

With November upon us, we look forward to Thanksgiving, a time to gather with friends and family to celebrate our good fortune with food, football, and often the Macy's Thanksgiving Day parade. The traditional feast begins with turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, green vegetables, and apple and pumpkin pies. In many households, Thanksgiving dinner is a time when families join to prepare sumptuous meals and calories do not count.

For Jews, Thanksgiving falls the month after Sukkot with its own traditional historic focus on gratitude and praise to G-d. At Sukkot, we are reminded how our ancestors celebrated the end of the harvest season and recall how G-d protected us when we fled from Egypt. Rabbi Elias Lieberman, leader of the Falmouth Jewish Congregation in Massachusetts, sees a strong biblical influence on the "celebrations of thanksgiving" that began in colonial New England and were formalized into a national holiday in 1864 at the height of the Civil War. From this common background, the celebration of both holidays has come to include coming together to express our gratitude by providing food to those in need.

Despite the wealth around us, many in our community do not have the money or resources to enjoy plentiful food, let alone a holiday meal. The Isaiah 58 Committee partners with food pantries and school districts to provide for those in need throughout the year; and each November, for over 20 years, we have conducted our Annual Thanksgiving Food Drive. We sincerely thank everyone at Temple Beth David for donating to prior Thanksgiving Food Drives, and we ask that this year you continue to be generous. When you shop for your Thanksgiving table, please purchase additional canned goods and packaged items for our upcoming Food Drive. Isaiah 58 also welcomes monetary donations to help us feed less fortunate families both this Thanksgiving season and throughout the year.


