

Cantorial Notes by Rabbi/Cantor Audrey Halpern

Dear Friends,

Our fasts will have long been broken and the *succahs* disassembled by the time you read this, but what I am always left with is the memory of the list from the Yizkor service on Yom Kippur of the people who have passed away during the past year. It reminds me of the seashore or the waves and

the continuum of life. We roll in and out with a rhythm that washes away our outward armor of affectations. It makes us all one human family. This year, in particular, it feels like we have lost so many well-known personalities. From John McCain to Burt Reynolds to Kate Spade and Aretha Franklin and on and on, the world lost so many of its beloved icons.

Maybe it is because of my professional life, but I find I am always keenly interested in the *In Memorium* part of every award show. I am somehow amazed that these famous people also die. Of course I know it intellectually, and yet, their mortality comes as something of an awakening. Some always strike me more than others and for many reasons; Kate Spade really struck a nerve with me. I think it is in part because I am close to a friend of hers, but also because of her apparent suffering that led to her tragic suicide. We live with a false impression, (or maybe it's just me) that if someone achieves the financial and professional heights of success, they really have it all. What made Kate Spade's death personal for me was her humanity. Not only was she mortal in her death, but also in her life. Clearly, she, like so many others, was a bright, talented and spirited woman with every reason to live and celebrate life. Nonetheless, she had her frailties and her own demons that she continuously battled.

So many of the people who become our heroes in their passing are people we look up to, not only because of their achievements, but also because we can relate to their imperfections. They, like us, are mere mortals with short-comings and weaknesses. Through this lens we can see ourselves and forgive our own shortcomings and we can feel close to them. We really are all one human family.

Our rabbis have taught:

Like a wave arising from the ocean's dance,
So do we arise from the dance of God.
Like a wave returning from the rocky shore,
Its form given to chaos,
But its essence restored in the ocean's unity,
So do we return from life's end — recycled in holiness —
To dance once more.
Awesome and wondrous is the Dance of God.

May all the lives of those whom we love continue to inspire us and guide us toward ever greater compassion.

Religious School News

"Wake Me Up When September Ends" by Green Day is one of my favorite songs. I have always found the transitions that occur in September to be difficult to endure: Summer to Fall, Vacation to Work, Camp to School, Secular days to Holidays (and then back to Secular days). But now it is October and the transitions have given way to routine, a place I am most comfortable. The teachers have had full weeks of teaching, the students have had full weeks of learning, and I have been through my first start of school at TBD Religious School.

While the inevitable bumps that occur during the beginning of anything can be difficult to deal with, they result in a learning process for future bumps. Mistakes are not failures, but rather chances to learn to do things differently and better in the future. So as our children make mistakes throughout their childhood, we, the adults in their lives, should take those opportunities to show them a new way. And as we make mistakes as adults, we can also learn from our children to do better.

And that is what I see as I walk down the halls and peek inside the classrooms. Students are diligently working with their teachers and classmates on Hebrew and prayers, learning about the history of Israel and the Jewish people, and reading Torah stories. I know that our teachers are showing them how to read and chant more fluently, showing them that practice doesn't make perfect, but practice makes better. And likewise, the students are enlightening the teachers, showing them new ways to think about old ideas.

Learning at TBD isn't just sitting at a desk and reading, however. Learning at TBD takes many other forms – arts and crafts, games, music, as well as other fun activities. The most amazing part of TBD Religious School is not the fun games and music and the learning, but rather the opportunity to be part of a Jewish community. Out in the secular world, we are a few Jews in Commack or East Northport or Smithtown. But at TBD, we share an incredible common history, culture, and heritage. Our Religious School gives our children a new perspective on being Jewish. It shows them that they are part of a much larger Jewish community at TBD as well as in the US, Israel and throughout the diaspora. As a community, we learn together, we laugh together, and we help each other.

This outing explores the deep impact of distilling and brewing on the history of Brooklyn, the historic liquor-making capital of New York City and 18th century America. Our walk-through Vinegar Hill is part of a collaboration with the Kings County Distillery — Brooklyn's oldest operating distillery. The first half is a walking tour through historic Vinegar Hill exploring three centuries of the urban alcohol industry. The second half of our outing is an in-depth tour of Kings County Distillery and, for all participants 21 years of age and older, a whiskey tasting. The holidays...the new year has begun! Our pledge remains the same: Feeding needy families and providing food to the local food pantries is our major mission.
