

Henri Nouwen once reflected upon the New Year:

It may be through the gift of a smile during a chance encounter - that's a blessing

It may be through the gift of a kind or understanding word - that's a blessing

It may be through the gift of a listening ear or shoulder to lean on - that's a blessing

It may be through the gift of quiet intercessory prayer - that's a blessing.

This is the beginning of a New Year. We have no idea what the year holds for us. But just imagine...God has a gift for you and can't wait for you to see it! And when you do, don't hesitate to share it around because that's a blessing and it will make everything new!
