ALL THOSE ASHES

Each morning the Kohanim draw lots to determine who will be first to perform the daily rituals. The winner performs the terumat hadeshen (taking a portion of ashes). First he purifies himself in the mikva. Next, he puts on his priestly garments. Then he pours water from the Kiyor, (the washing basin), over his hands & feet. Next he takes a silver pan & climbs the ramp of the Mizbayach. From the previous day's ashes he takes a handful and places it into the vessel. Then he takes the pan to the east side of the ramp and pours out the contents in a designated spot. One of the miracles that occurred in the Bait Hamikdash was that these ashes would be swallowed up into the floor immediately. No trace of them would remain.

After the first pan of ashes are poured out, it's a "free-for-all" for the rest of these *Kohanim* as they rush up the ramp and empty the ashes of the *Mizbayach*. These ashes are piled in the center of the *Mizbayach*. This pile is called a *Tapuach*. It is considered a monument to the large amount of *Korbanot* that had been offered *the day before*.

As days go by, the *Tapuach* gets very large, excess ashes are taken to a place outside of the *Mishkan*. During the time of the *Bait Hamikdash*, these ashes are taken by a *Kohain* wearing old priestly garments, to a special spot outside the walls of *Yerushalayim*.

TORAH GREATS: RAY MOSHE FEINSTEIN 1895-1986

Rabbi Moshe Feinstein (RMF) was born in the town of Uzda, near Minsk, Belarus where his father was the rabbi. He was born on 7 Adar, which is also the date of Moshe Rabbeinu's birth (and death).

RMF studied with his father and also in yeshivas throughout Belarus, before being appointed rabbi of Lubań where he served for sixteen years. He married Shima Kustanovich in 1920 and had 3 children (Fay Gittel, Shifra, and David) before leaving Europe. Under increasing pressure from the Soviet regime, he moved with his family to New York City in 1936 where he lived for the rest of his life.

Settling on the Lower East Side, he became the rosh yeshiva of Mesivtha Tifereth Jerusalem. He later established a branch of the yeshiva in Staten Island, New York, now headed by his son Rabbi Reuven Feinstein. His son Rabbi Dovid Feinstein heads the Manhattan branch.

Rav Moshe was president of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada and chaired the Moetzes Gedolei HaTorah of Agudath Israel of America from the 1960s until his death. Rav Moshe also took an active leadership role in Israel's Chinuch Atzmai.

RMF was revered by many as the *Gadol Hador* (greatest Torah sage of the generation), including by Rabbis Yaakov Yisrael Kanievsky, Aharon Kotler, Yaakov Kamenetsky and Yosef Shalom Elyashiv, even though several of them were far older than he. Rav Moshe was also recognized by many as the preeminent Torah sage and *Posek* of his generation, and people from around the world called upon him to answer their most complicated Halachic questions. There are endless stories about his brilliance, and the amazing accomplishments he achieved through the power of Torah.

His most famous works are the *Igros Moshe* (halachic responsive), *Dibros Moshe* (Talmud commentary), and *Darash Moshe* (Torah commentary). When he passed away in 1986 there were over 300,000 people at his funeral, which is one of the biggest Jewish funerals since the Mishnaic era. He is buried in Har Hamenuchot, Israel.
