In every place and era, and perhaps all the more so in our own, we need to answer afresh what it is that makes us Catholic, and then imagine how to embrace this faith to sustain us on our journey home to eternal life.

How can we respond with integrity and humility, while still maintaining our zeal for sharing the saving message of Jesus Christ? What next steps and bold initiatives must we now take?
