On Saturday, September 19 Keep Wakulla County Beautiful joined in the 35th Annual International Coastal Cleanup. Despite the COVID pandemic we had 309 volunteers that came out and participated. Volunteers were given KWCB gaiters, a snack, and of course the popular event shirts.

Different from past cleanups, we did not have an event at Woolley Park in order to keep our gatherings small. The cleanup sites were located at Mashers Sands, Woolley Park, Bottoms Road, Shell Point, Spring Creek, Wakulla Beach, St. Marks at San Marcos de Apalache, St. Marks Lighthouse, Wakulla Springs, TnT Hideaway and Cherokee Sink. The cleanup yielded approximately 5.2 tons of trash including everything from the usual cigarette litter and single use plastics to appliances and furniture. Some of the more unusual items gathered were box springs (3 of them), vehicle bumpers (2 of them), a recliner, a water dispenser, and a ceiling fan. Trash was removed from shorelines, wooded areas, and in the water.

Thanks to Dr. Gabrielle Gabrielli, this year we had divers in the St. Marks River near Riverside Café. The conditions were not ideal and it was not as productive as we had hoped. The storms and rain had the water very dark and the current rather strong. We hope to include this location in our River Cleanup in December and expect to yield much better results.

We were honored to have a few of our county leaders participate this year. Commissioner Quincee Messersmith acted as a site captain for Spring Creek site. Commissioner Chuck Hess came out to participate and help clean at the lighthouse. County Administrator David Edwards and his wife, Sopchoppy Mayor Lara Edwards, along with their family had a group that participated at Wakulla Beach. In addition to these county representatives we had groups from local churches, Boy Scout troops, Operation Santa, TCC, and the Wakulla Road & Bridge Department.

We are very thankful at Keep Wakulla County Beautiful for our wonderful sponsors, KWCB board members and volunteers. Adopt-a-Road / Adopt-a-Highway Needs You!

Instead of posting about it, do something about it! Keep Wakulla County Beautiful is still looking for new groups, businesses, neighborhoods, or families to adopt roadways within Wakulla County. Show your community pride in keeping Wakulla County litter free.

Adopt-a-Road is comprised of volunteers that give of their time to pick up litter along Wakulla County roads. It is a 2-year agreement and groups must adopt a minimum of two miles of roadway (one mile stretch on both sides). The agreement is for these groups to hold cleanups at least 4 times a year. The results from these cleanups should then be reported on the kwcb.org website.

Keep Wakulla County Beautiful will provide an Adopt-a-Road sign at each end of the adopted roadway. We also provide the garbage bags, 2 pickers, and gloves for each group. Applications can be found on our website at kwcb.org along with an up to date map showing current adopted roads and what roads are still available.

We do ask that with the current pandemic situation that groups are limited to 10 people. Social distancing should be used during cleanups. Utilize caution when cleaning and be sure to have hand sanitizer handy. Always use gloves or a picker when possible.



FDOT Adopt-a-Highway

Although the Adopt-a-Highway program is not run by KWCB, we do promote and encourage involvement in maintaining our state roads also. Please reach out if you have any questions.

Currently in Wakulla County there are no active Adopt a Highway groups that have a current agreement. KWCB is updating our agreement for another two years for our portion of Hwy. 319. Here are a few links for anyone interested.

So what exactly is plastic film and how do you recycle it?



Plastic film – also known as plastic film packaging – is soft, flexible polyethylene (PE) packaging such as grocery, bread, zip-top and dry cleaning bags. It's also the wrap around many products including paper plates, napkins, bathroom tissue, diapers, and more.

Did you know?

You can recycle plastic film packaging items like air pillows, product overwraps, bubble wrap, and dry cleaning bags along with your plastic carryout bags at participating drop-off locations.

How to Recycle

Find your local drop-off location at PlasticFilmRecycling.org/drop-off. Put all your clean and dry plastic bags and film packaging in a single bag and return to a local store drop-off.

Remember to:

- make sure bags are clean and dry
- remove any labels and tape

What to Recycle

If it's stretchy it can be recycled.
If it's crinkly or tears like paper it cannot be recycled.

Or look for the How2Recycle label



DO NOT INCLUDE:

These are made of different plastics that cannot be recycled with the bags and film.

- degradable bags
- frozen food bags
- chip bags
- salad bag mix bags
- candy wrappers
- six-pack rings

2/27/21- Apalachicola National Forest Cleanup and Leaders Against Litter

The Apalachicola National Forest Cleanup is an annual event held with help from the U S Forestry Service and kicks off the Keep America Beautiful Great American Cleanup for our local affiliate.

The Leaders Against Litter was first held at last year's event and will also be incorporated into this year's cleanup. The purpose of his initiative is to raise awareness about how Florida's pervasive litter problem affects communities by inviting community leaders to observe the problem first-hand by cleaning up a local site and educating participants about the direct and indirect costs and damage caused by litter.
