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MAKING A MEANINGFUL JOURNEY

A Jewish man from the town of Lelov was traveling to see his Rabbi in the city of Lublin. He was unfamiliar with the roads to Lublin, but he was told when he reaches the fork in the road he will see a road sign with four arrows. One arrow says Lelov and points in one direction, and another states Lublin and points to another direction, and so on. He simply needs to follow the directions from the sign and he will reach his destination.



Unfortunately, things never go as planned. Shortly before his trip, there was a severe snow storm, and the road sign fell. There was no one around to ask for directions, which left him at a loss for which road to take to Lublin. He began to dig in the snow and found the sign. However, he still had a problem. If he sets it in the wrong direction then the arrows will be in the wrong way, and he will not reach his destination. However, this man was clever, and he thought, "I know the road that leads to Lelov, it is the road I traveled on to get to this point. All I have to do is direct the arrow that says Lelov towards that road, and I will be able to determine which road to take to Lublin."

Rabbi Elimelech Biderman shared this mashal (parable) to convey the significance of this time of year immediately following the holidays of Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur and Sukkot. As we move past the inspiring time of year we need to remember where we started the year. We ushered in the new year with the spiritual boost of the yomim tovim. Now is the time to remind ourselves of the spiritual growth to guide us for the rest of the year.

The above mashal is also appropriate to capture the importance of receiving a Jewish Day School education. Children empowered with a good Jewish education are set up to travel the path of being sophisticated and knowledgeable Jews. They are armed with purpose and a sense of mission to live a life of meaning and capable of developing a meaningful relationship with Hashem. If they ever come across a fork in the road, they can look back at the road they traveled to provide the guidance to move forward.

WILDLIFE EDUCATION GRANT

Thanks to the efforts of 3rd grade teacher, Amy Rahav, CTA is the recipient of a Wildlife Education Grant from the Ohio Department of Natural Resources Division of Wildlife. The grant, eligible to schools who have an educator who has participated in Wildlife Education programs, provides funding to advance awareness, skills and education related to wildlife and the environment. Mrs. Rahav's proposal is a renewal of the trails in the wooded area on CTA's campus. Students in grades 3 and 4 will work to clear and mark the trail from CTA to the creek. The project timeline is throughout the Fall and involves the students doing research about the area and the foliage and wildlife along the trail as well as hands on work using rakes and their hands to clear sticks and leaves. The students will be marking any scenic nature points on the trail and staking with clear markers. The wooded area has a lot of wildlife including snakes, frogs, deer, wild turkeys and many different types of birds. All of this wildlife will be easily observed on the new cleared trails. The project is aligned with academic standards in English language arts as well as science and will provide lots of opportunities for students throughout the grades to enjoy a walk in the CTA woods. Mr. Norm Leist, CFO and Facilities Manager has been supporting the venture as well. We look forward to a Nature Trail Opening Ceremony late in the Fall.




ART ROOM UPDATE

Lower School

We are rollin' in to 5781 (literally, with Ms. Neiworth's art-on-a-cart!) and getting in the swing of our art routines and procedures. Students are starting off by exploring the big idea of "What Do Artists Do?" and investigating how artists make their creative studio spaces special. We read the book Studio: A Place For Art to Start by Emily Arrow (check out the read-aloud video by Ms. Kim King at <https://watchkin.com/a3983d23cf>) and listened to music to help us get excited to transform the classrooms into our studio workspaces.



We are now starting work on our first projects of the year – from "Beautiful Oops" art, to bubble letter name creations, to overlapping shapes, to illustration design - CTA Lower School students are really thinking like artists!

So what *do* artists do? They plan; they create; they work through problems; they don't give up; they work hard; they learn how to use different tools and materials; they reflect on their work; they connect to other artists; they make mistakes – and the list goes on!

Upper School

Continuing with our theme of "What Do Artists Do?" Upper School students are creating sketchnote-inspired designs outlining some of the things that artists do in order to be successful. They are using creative lettering techniques, shading, and doodles to complete their art.

Tenth graders, after completing their sketchnotes, are moving on to explore contrast and positive/negative space through sliced still-life art, Japanese Notan designs, and Shibori textile dyeing.

Whether in the classroom or in the art room, CTA students are finding their own voice and creating a place for art to start!



HEBREW DEPARTMENT UPDATE



Morah Eva's High School Advanced Hebrew Class learned another way to communicate in Hebrew and it is Hebrew Sign Language. The students had a virtual visit from **Rima Popov**. Rima is a hard-of-hearing and lip-reading sign language teacher from Israel. Rima is a second generation to Holocaust survivors, a Volleyball Olympic athlete and has been a Hebrew sign language teacher for the past 10 years.

During the Zoom, the students introduced themselves and showed Rima the signs they have been learning.

Rima expressed that she was touched by our students' open-mind and desire to learn.



The students were excited to participate in a project that Rima was doing with the song **שער הרחמים**, a special song for the high holidays. The lyrics of the Hebrew song are about doing mitzvot, teshuvah and being kind to others. The song was written by Ehud Bani Z'L, a renown Israeli singer.

The students sang in Hebrew the chorus for the song, and how to sign it in Hebrew Sign Language.

COLLEGE GUIDANCE IN THE ERA OF COVID-19



CTA 12th graders are thinking about their futures and applying to colleges now. Many of them will opt for a gap year in Israel, but they apply to college now and then try to defer their admission to the following Fall.

The era of Covid has changed both the technical details as well as the larger ideas about going to college. For example, most colleges are placing more emphasis on letters of recommendation and student essays in lieu of standardized test scores, because so many test centers were closed down. With the bigger picture in mind, if college classes will be online, students all over the country are rethinking what it means to "go to college". Our students are doing more authentic soul searching

about the value of higher education and how it meets their career aspirations.

College Admissions visits are all virtual. So far, the following colleges are offering Zoom info sessions for CTA: University of Maryland, Yeshiva University, Bar Ilan University, Ohio State University, Brandeis University, and IDC, Herzliya. For more information, contact Mrs. Delman.

OHIO EMA GRANTS BRING BUILDING UPGRADES

Thanks to the approval of grants from the Ohio Emergency Management Agency, CTA has some upgrades coming in the next few months to maintain and enhance the safety of our campus.

1. All of the outside lighting will be replaced with new LED fixtures that will increase the amount and strength of the lighting outside to enhance security. The LED fixtures are environmentally friendly and will last longer.
2. Also fully funded by the Ohio EMA grant will be a new school wide PA paging system which is expected to be installed in late December. The new system will increase coverage and reach areas that currently do not have direct communication to the PA system including several outdoor areas. This is an important safety feature for our school community.
3. The Ohio EMA grant will fund an upgrade to our camera server and camera system which will include 16 additional cameras throughout the building and on campus to cover some of the areas now not in view.

KEEPING OUR STUDENTS CONNECTED

Coming back to school means making accommodations to meet our students educational needs throughout the year. We are ready to pivot as needed and are set up to make sure that students who are sick or in quarantine are able to access learning. The policies in Lower and Upper School are a little bit different but principals are ready to speak with parents and set up the learning that will work best for their child. Classrooms are set up with Zoom stations and teachers are learning and refining ways to make zooming into the classroom a natural experience for the students.

The Zoom technology also allows teachers in quarantine to keep on teaching from home with an aide or substitute in the classroom to manage the technology. With the new 1:1 devices throughout the school and headsets students can be on their device and teachers can interact with them directly. Thank you to JewishColumbus for the grant for devices and Zoom stations.

SUKKAHS, SUKKAHS, EVERYWHERE



The ruach and excitement of Sukkot permeated throughout the school both leading up to and during Sukkot. We are always fortunate to be open during the Chol Hamoed days so that we can celebrate Sukkot together not just at home on Yom Tov days.

This year we added several new sukkahs to the already big sukkah on the patio near the Lower School. Thanks to all of the Upper School students who helped to build (and since take down) the sukkahs. In addition, a sukkah on the K/1 playground and in the amphitheater made space for a steady rotation of lunch in the sukkah for all grades. The 5th graders also built a small sukkah on the 2-6 playground using innovation and found materials.

From lunch in the sukkah and special treats to Sukkah activities including grade level Sukkah Wars, lego sukkah building challenge, making decorations and a visit from Buckeye Game Truck Company with Laser and Nerf Tag for the Lower School students. Even on the Monday we were off from school, the 5th graders got together over Zoom for Shacharis, Hallel, a story and to show each other their sukkahs virtually. In Upper School, they had a socially distanced movie afternoon in the gym.



KINDERGARTEN AND SENIOR BUDDIES!!!!





The Story of Yonah: Morah Esther's 1st graders really enjoyed the story of Yonah and the Big Fish which is traditionally read on Yom Kippur. The students created art masterpiece of a scene from the story of Yonah.
