


COMMUNIQUE

GATINEAU, June 21, 2018 – CFLA-FCAB celebrates National Indigenous Peoples' Day by actively implementing the Recommendations of the Truth and Reconciliation Committee Report

This National Indigenous Peoples Day, the Canadian Federation of Library Associations/Fédération canadiennes des associations de bibliothèques (CFLA-FCAB) is continuing to acting on and implement the recommendations of the CFLA-FCAB Truth and Reconciliation Committee report. Truth and Reconciliation continues to be one of CFLA-FCAB's main priorities therefore the Federation continues to promote initiatives to all types of libraries to advance reconciliation by supporting the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action and to promote collaboration on these issues across Canadian communities.

Highlights

 Establishment of the CFLA-FCAB Indigenous Matters Committee and its Working Groups to implement the Truth & Reconciliation Committee Recommendations based on the medicine wheel model (http://cflafcab.ca/en/about/committees/indigenous_matters_committee/)

- Indigenous Canada MOOC The Indigenous Matters Committee of CFLA-FCAB, in collaboration with the University of Alberta, Edmonton Public Library, Northern Light Library System and Toronto Public Library, is providing Canadian libraries with an online kit containing the tools and resources to help support the delivery of this MOOC to the Canadian public through library programming and promotion.

- 3. <u>Let's Talk About Reconciliation</u> is the title of a series of dialogues associated with the screening of a film made by an Indigenous artist, and organized by public libraries across Canada. This three-year project (2018-2021) is the result of a partnership among the Canadian Commission for UNESCO, the <u>National Film Board of Canada</u>, <u>Library and Archives Canada</u>, <u>the Canadian Federation of Library Associations' Indigenous Matters Committee</u>, the <u>National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation and your local library</u>.
