 <p>Red Light intentional academic time set apart with your child Example: Learning to do Math at Home with Stacy Greener on YouTube</p>	Addition Draw a line across the center of a paper, then a line to divide the top half again. Write a plus sign on a sticky note. Place your sticky note on the line dividing the top half. Roll the dice, placing that number of buttons in the first section. Roll the dice again, place that number on button in the second section. Add the two sections together and put the correct number of buttons in the bottom half of the paper. Play again.	Easter Egg Letters Using plastic Easter eggs, write upper-case and lower-case letter on the outside of each egg. Set the upper-case letter eggs out for your child to see and leave the lower-case letters in a basket or bowl. Invite your child to find the egg and match the upper-case with the lower-case letters.	Shape Sorting Materials: Masking tape, Random toys/objects from around the house. Directions: First you make a shape (oval, triangle, rectangle) on the carpet/floor using the tape. Place toys/items from around the house that are shaped of an oval, triangle and rectangle. While the child is sorting, stay close and ask questions.	Writing names Materials: Shaving cream Directions: Smear shaving cream on a table or tray and have your child practice writing their first and last name with their finger.	Matching Make a sheet with squares like for a game. Then make chips with numbers out of paper. Have your child match the same number from the chip to the number on the square. After matching each number. Children will count how many squares/chips are on the board.
	Counting and Movement Cut out “puddle” shapes from blue paper. Write a number one each puddle. Then lay all the number puddles on the floor taping them so no one slips and have your child jump to the number you call out.	Name that Play a game with your child where you choose a daily topic and ask your child to name objects or ideas that go with that topic. As your child becomes more proficient, encourage him/her to come up with new topics. The categories can be anything, examples are, shapes, body parts, types of clothing, flowers, birds, insects, school supplies, furniture found at home, furniture found at school, transportation, pets, foods, etc.	I Spy Shapes Take your child for a walk and play a game where you ask him to guess what shape you see. For example, “I spy a black circle” which was for a car tire. Then your child will guess what shape and object it is. Then it would be the child’s turn to ask and you guess.	Treasure Hunt Freeze colored ice cubes using food coloring, then fill a plastic container with one inch of water. Add a few toys and colored ice cubes and freeze. Then add more water, add toys and freeze a few more layers until container is full. Remove the ice block from container. Have your child “excavate” and look for treasure having conversation about it. Salt helps ice melt. You can use a hammer with adult supervision.	Counting with Playdough Have your child make balls with playdough. Then encourage him/her to count each ball they make.
