Future Growth

Between 2017 and 2022, the largest employment gains will be observed in education and healthcare, professional and business services, and government. Together, these sectors will account for 74 percent of net job creation in the county.

Population growth will accelerate over the next few years. Annual growth in the 2017-2022 period is expected to average 1.0 percent per year.

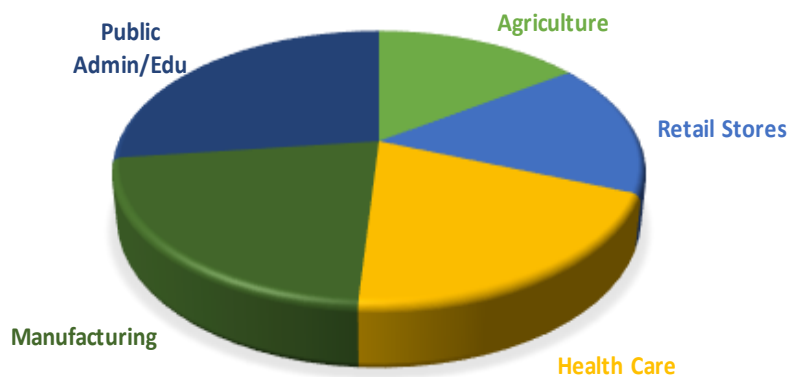
Farm production is expected to increase at a rate of 0.5 percent per year between 2017 and 2022. The principal commodities in the county are almonds, pistachios, grapes, and milk.

Industrial production is expected to increase by 4.1 percent in 2017. From 2017 to 2022, the growth rate will average 1.9 percent per year.

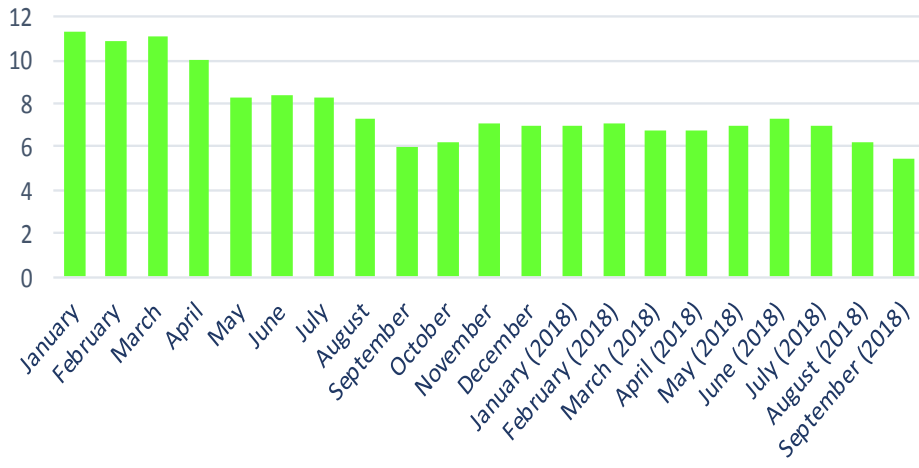

Madera County Unemployment Rate (2017-2018)



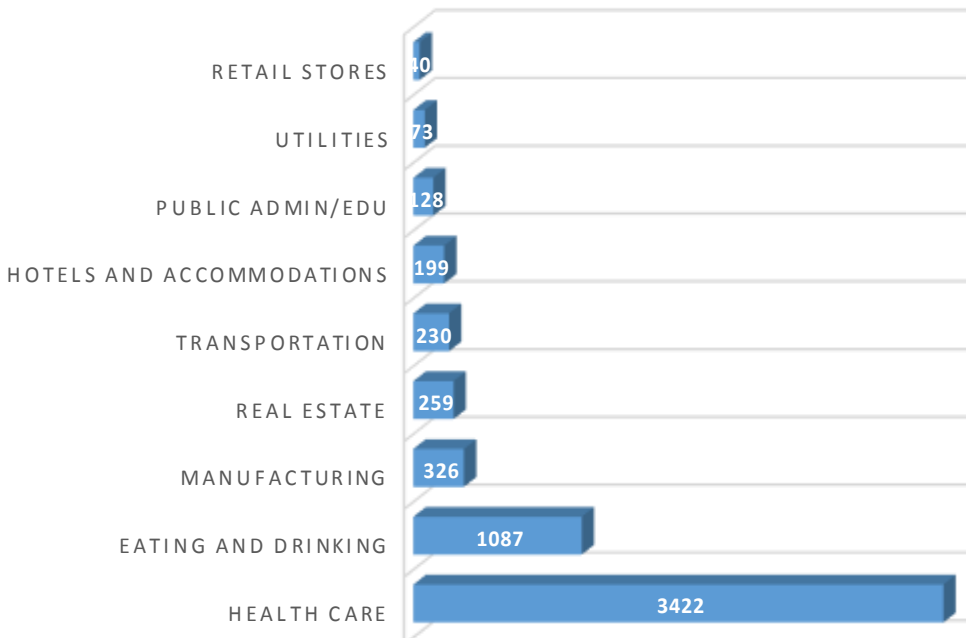
Fun Facts

Madera has a total of 54.8% of its population actively working. 40.8% of the population is not in the labor force.

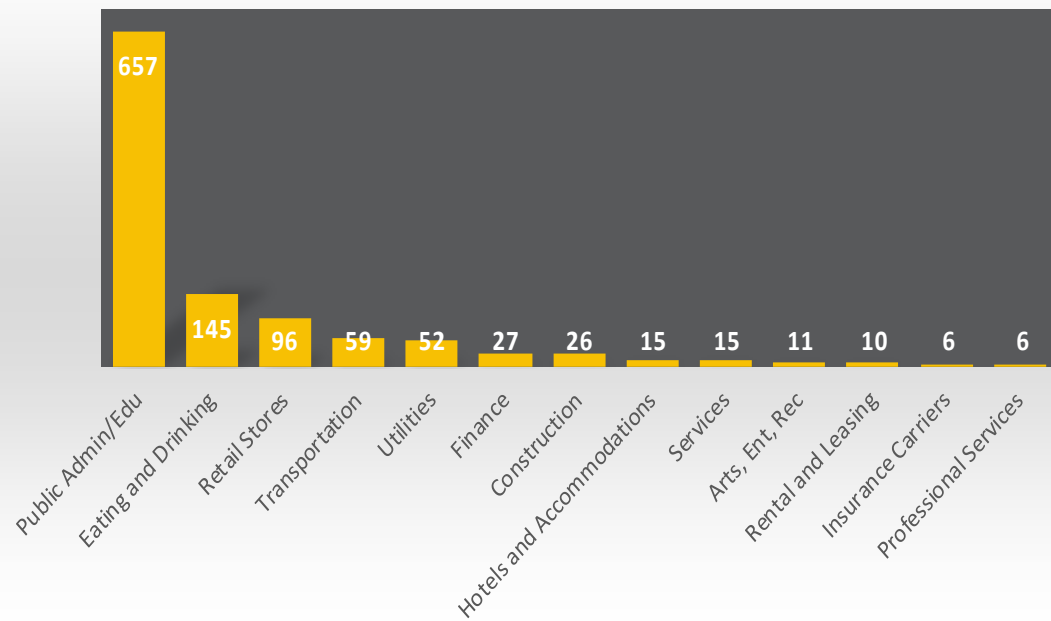
The average household size is 3.1 individuals.

On May 16, 1893, Madera County became a county of California.

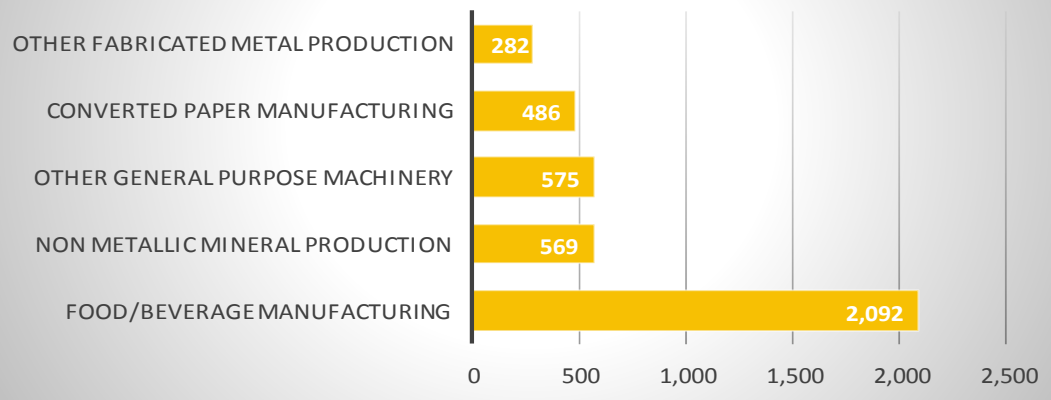

Industries in the Fabricated Metal Product Manufacturing subsector transform metal into intermediate or end products, other than machinery, computers and electronics, and metal furniture, or treat metals and metal formed products fabricated elsewhere. Important fabricated metal processes are forging, stamping, bending, forming, and machining.

Paper converting is an essential part of the process of taking raw paper, made at paper mills around the world, and creating a finished product such as a book or magazine.

General purpose machinery engages in manufacturing pumps and compressors, such as general-purpose air and gas compressors, nonagricultural spraying and dusting equipment, general purpose pumps and pumping equipment (except fluid power pumps and motors), and measuring and dispensing pumps.

Non-metallic mineral products comprise of the production of cement, ceramics, glass, and lime. These manufacturing sectors are characterized by the transformation of naturally occurring minerals such as limestone, silica, and clays through an energy intensive process.

Food & Beverage Manufacturing are prepared foods as well as packaged foods, and alcoholic and nonalcoholic beverages. Any product meant for human consumption, aside from pharmaceuticals, passes through this industry.

Hiring Incentives

OJT - The On-the-Job Training program enables businesses to hire new employees and receive a reimbursement to offset a portion of the training costs during the training period.

TJT - Transitional Job Training program is a subsidized work-based training activity that takes place at a worksite for a limited period of time.

Tax Credits - Work Opportunity Tax Credit is available for employers who hire individuals who are members of federally designated groups.

PWEX - The Paid Work Experience is a temporary work placement activity in a public, private or non-profit organization. PWEX provides individuals with an opportunity to gain on-the-job knowledge, experience and technical skills, while earning a minimum wage.
