4. **“Rashomon”** (1951) dir. Akira Kurosawa (Japan), running time: 1:23
5. **“Persona”** (1966) dir. Ingmar Bergman (Sweden), running time: 1:23
6. **“Au Hasard Balthazar”** (1966) dir. Robert Bresson (France) running time: 1:35
7. **“Ugetsu”** (1953) dir. Kenji Mizoguchi, (Japan) running time: 1:36
8. **“The Bicycle Thieves”** (1948) dir. Vittorio de Sica, (Italy) running time: 1:30
9. **“Breathless”** (1960) dir. Jean-Luc Godard, (France) running time: 1:30
10. **“Aguirre, the Wrath of God”** (1972) dir. Werner Herzog (Germany) running time: 1:35

All films will be shown in their original language with English subtitles. A short introduction will precede each film and a discussion will follow the film.

At least one week in advance, class members will be emailed a short biography of the director and a review of the upcoming film to facilitate their understanding of the film. They are not necessary to enjoy the movie. Come and enjoy some of the best films ever made.
