BLACK METHODISM: LEGACY OF FAITH -- REVIVAL (102049) This special anniversary DVD celebrates the 40th anniversary of several related and pivotal events in the life and history of The United Methodist Church: the end of the racially segregated Central Jurisdiction in 1967; the birth, through merger, of The United Methodist Church in 1968; the establishment of the General Commission on Religion and Race in 1968. This version, which includes the original 'Legacy of Faith' first broadcast in 1994, has a new introduction and updated ending. Includes guide. Age: Middle school - Adult. 31 Minutes.



CHISHOLM '72 - UNBOUGHT AND UNBOSSSED (103148) Author: Lynch, Shola. Recalling a watershed event in US politics, this compelling documentary takes an in-depth look at the 1972 presidential campaign of Shirley Chisholm, the first black woman elected to Congress and the first to seek nomination for the highest office in the land. Following Chisholm from her own announcement of her candidacy through her historic speech in Miami at the Democratic National Convention, the story is a fight for inclusion. Shunned by the political establishment and the media, this longtime champion of marginalized Americans asked for support from people of color, women, gays, and young people newly empowered to vote at the age of 18. Chisholm's bid for an equal place on the presidential dais generated strong, even racist opposition. Yet her challenge to the status quo and her message about exercising the right to vote struck many as progressive and positive. Period footage and music,

interviews with supporters, opponents, observers, and Chisholm's own commentary all illuminate her groundbreaking initiative, as well as political and social currents still very much alive today. 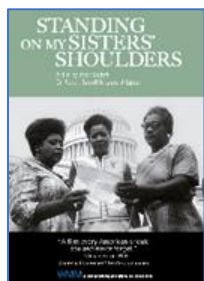

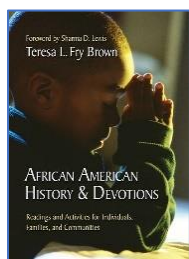

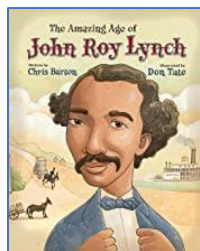
STANDING ON MY SISTERS' SHOULDERS (119168) Author: Sadoff, Joan; Sadoff, Robert; Lipson, Laura. In 1965, when three women walked into the U.S. House of Representatives in Washington D.C., they had come a very long way. Neither lawyers nor politicians, they were ordinary women from Mississippi, and descendants of African slaves. They had come to their country's capital seeking civil rights, the first black women to be allowed in the senate chambers in nearly 100 years. A missing chapter in our nation's record of the Civil Rights movement, this powerful documentary reveals the movement in Mississippi in the 1950's and 60's from the point of view of the courageous women who lived it -- and emerged as its grassroots leaders. Their living testimony offers a window into a unique moment when the founders' promise of freedom and justice passed from rhetoric to reality for all Americans. Through moving interviews and powerful archival footage, this DVD weaves a story of commitment, passion and perseverance and tells the story of the women fought for change in Mississippi and altered the course of American history forever. 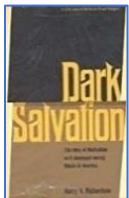


BY AND BY: CHARLES ALBERT TINDLEY, THE FATHER OF GOSPEL MUSIC (821013)

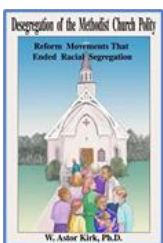
Author: Weatherford, Carole Boston. Designed for children ages 4 - 8, this full-color picture book is a biography about gospel composer and preacher Charles Albert Tindley, best known for the gospel hymn "We'll Understand It Better By and By." At a time when most African Americans were still enslaved, Charles Tindley was born free. His childhood was far from easy, with backbreaking hours in the fields, and no opportunity to go to school. But the spirituals he heard as he worked made him long to know how to read the Gospel for himself. Late at night, he taught himself to read from scraps of newspapers. From those small scraps, young Charles raised himself to become a founding father of American gospel music whose hymn was the basis for the Civil Rights anthem "We Shall Overcome." Told in lilting verse with snippets of spirituals and Tindley's own hymns woven

throughout, author Carole Boston Weatherford's lyrical words and Bryan Collier's luminous illustrations celebrate a man whose music and conviction has inspired countless lives. Includes bibliography. 41 Pages.

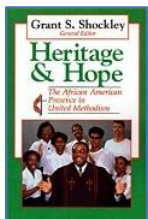

He concludes with the story of the founding of the Colored Methodist Episcopal Church, illustrating the emergence of black Methodism from white control in the South following the Civil War.
