#### *From the Pastor's Pen...*



I recently read an article about the Japanese art of repair called *kintsugi*, “golden repair.” It’s a way of mending broken ceramics using precious metals, usually gold, mixed in with the lacquer. This highlights the cracks, rather than trying to hide them.

The article in February’s edition of Sojourners magazine interviews artist, theologian, writer, and professor, Makoto Fujimura. Fujimura reflects on the Western mindset of fixing things, so they are like new again, so the damage is hidden, covered, unseen.

In kintsugi, he points out, we are invited to see the beauty in the brokenness. “I actually think that there is virtue in being able to see the brokenness and fractures, as painful as they may be.” And that we are called to learn to “look with compassion and love on broken lives and broken systems as the starting point of repair, reform, or healing.”

I thought about this form of art, as well as Makoto’s theological perspective as I considered the season of Lent this year. Lent is the 6 weeks leading up to Easter and a time intended for reflection, repentance, spiritual practices.

I decided “Repair” is a good theme for this Lent. In the spirit of kintsugi though, I invite us to take time to acknowledge the broken places, in our lives, our community, our nation, our world, and in creation. Looking, not only to ask, “how can it be fixed,” but looking with compassion. Taking time to lament the brokenness in so many places.

This past year has laid bare deep fractures in many

places: systemic racism and fractured trust between communities of color and law enforcement, inequity in how the pandemic has affected people’s lives and livelihoods, the continued challenge of adequate and affordable medical care for all people, political division, and rancor practically unprecedented in our modern time.

As we consider brokenness, mending, and repair through Lent, we consider it through the lens of the Gospel, the Good News. As followers of Christ, we affirm that God in Christ is “reconciling all things to Himself,” as Paul writes. We trust that the repair work isn’t up to us on our own, alone, but that God’s healing power and life-giving Spirit are also at work. Our part then, becomes being willing to enter into that healing work, mending and repairing in our own ways, with our own gifts.

I encourage you to look for ways of repairing this Lent. Maybe it’s a literal project, repairing or restoring something. Maybe it’s reusing something or being more conscientious about recycling. Maybe it’s focusing on a relationship that needs repair. Perhaps the work is more introspective, taking time for prayer and personal devotion to help repair your own spirit.

My prayer is that our Lenten journey be one of healing, mending, and experiencing God’s work of life and restoration, even in the midst of brokenness.

**Covid-19 Vaccination:** Below is a link for Yakima County's Covid-19 vaccination information which lists easily understood criteria for the different phases. It shows who is currently eligible, the locations and phone numbers of local clinics for people to call and make an appointment for getting their vaccination. The speed of getting one's vaccination is very dependent on the day-to-day supply that is shipped to the various clinics. <https://www.yakimacounty.us/2472/COVID-19-Vaccine>.

There is excitement that the COVID vaccine is finally being administered in quantity. There are several points to remember before we start seriously talking about reopening for in person worship.

- As with any vaccine, it is not 100% effective, although 95% is better than expected. What that means is that in a congregation of our size, several people could be expected to still be at risk even after vaccination.
- At this time nobody knows whether the vaccine totally prevents infection or just prevents serious illness. Until we get that determination, we have to assume that it is possible to infect someone even after vaccination.
- The current rates of infection are still so high that Yakima continues to be in Phase 1. Hopefully, we will be moving forward to the next Phase within the next couple months.

Therefore, at a minimum we need to know that all attendees have been vaccinated before we resume normal worship. Given the supply problems, that is going to take weeks.
