READY exists to harness our communities' power to create quality schools that Rochester educators and families want. Our mission is to increase quality public schools and educational opportunities for Rochester's children, in both traditional district and charter schools, centered in community-driven approaches and strategies. Quality schools are those that consistently perform above the statewide average across multiple measures, including English language arts and math proficiency, student growth, graduation rates, student absenteeism, and teacher certification.

EMPOWERING PARENTS AS AGENTS OF SYSTEMIC CHANGE

Parent engagement is a critical building block for quality schools, as research demonstrates that when parents are actively involved in education, student achievement improves, and schools function more effectively. Programs like the Parent ACTION Academy empower parents to leverage their lived experiences as valuable assets in designing solutions. Studies show that when parents understand how education systems work, their advocacy efforts can lead to systemic changes (Henderson & Mapp, 2002). The Academy provides parents with the knowledge and tools to engage in decision-making, grounded in research that links parent involvement to better educational outcomes. By exposing them to policy and advocacy spaces, the program ensures parents can take on leadership roles, which is essential for fostering a school system that is responsive to the needs of its community (Epstein, 2011).

The **Parent ACTION Academy** invites parents with school-age children in Rochester public schools to participate in an eight-month fellowship designed to empower them as advocates and leaders in education. Participants will gain a deep understanding of how the education system functions—from the school level to city, state, and school board decision-making—and how effective advocacy can disrupt the status quo and push for systemic change.

Throughout the program, participants will engage with leaders who have navigated various pathways to effect change both inside and outside the system. This journey will allow parents to explore paths that align with their own needs, values, and strengths, while preparing them for ongoing involvement in education reform beyond the fellowship. Experiential learning is a core component of the Academy. Fellows will attend local and state legislative sessions, with clear objectives and guidance. These experiences will be followed by facilitated reflections, helping participants translate their observations into actionable strategies for engagement.

- Harnessing the power of personal narratives and storytelling to strengthen advocacy efforts.
- Learning how to organize and effectively influence decision-makers within the local education system.
