AN ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION honoring the New Jersey National Guard.

WHEREAS, The men and women of the New Jersey National Guard have honorably served the people of this State since it was a colony, tracing their lineage to the unification of the provinces of East and West Jersey and the signing of the first Militia Act in 1704; and

WHEREAS, For more than 300 years of history, members of the New Jersey National Guard and the State militia, a direct predecessor, have served in every major conflict, at home and abroad; and

WHEREAS, In the throes of the Revolutionary War, the State's militia provided security and stability across New Jersey, combatting local Tories and British Loyalists while also providing support to the Continental Army under the command of General George Washington in battles at Trenton and Princeton; and

WHEREAS, When the Civil War broke out in 1860, New Jerseyans overwhelmingly responded to President Lincoln's call to action, sending the first full brigade of militia to defend Washington, D.C. and ultimately committing more than 70,000 New Jerseyans to the fight for freedom; and

WHEREAS, Following the war, in 1869, the State enacted a critical new piece of legislation to reorganize and consolidate the militia and the New Jersey Rifle Corps into what is now known as the New Jersey National Guard, forming a more modern State-based fighting force; and

WHEREAS, Through this reformation, the State incorporated African American men into the State's fighting force for the first time, established a regular training schedule, and better positioned the National Guard for the conflicts that lay ahead; and

WHEREAS, These reforms paid dividends when President Woodrow Wilson federalized New Jersey National Guard units and deployed them to the front lines in France during World War I, demonstrating that the guardsmen were prepared for combat, wherever and whenever called upon; and

WHEREAS, The New Jersey National Guard further demonstrated their capability and determination when multiple units were deployed to combat tyranny in Europe during World War II, including the 102nd Cavalry which landed at Omaha Beach on D-Day plus two and was instrumental in the liberation of Paris; and

WHEREAS, In 1948, the New Jersey National Guard made history in another sense when, following the adoption of a new State Constitution which expressly prohibited discrimination in military and civilian life, the New Jersey National Guard became the first federally recognized military component to integrate; and

BE IT RESOLVED *by the General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:*
