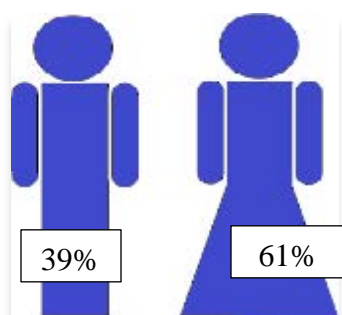


A priority in 2017 was to establish a process to collect data at the health facilities we support. We focused on our facilities in the western area and are very pleased with the progress of our patient utilization and disease prevalence data project.

The four facilities in the western area included in the project are St. Anthony's Clinic and Stella Maris Clinic, both located in the western area urban, and the Monsignor Sullivan Health Center and Christ the King Hospital located in the western area rural.

Finding #1: Our key beneficiary population are women and children and we can report that our services are reaching this population.
