Session 1

A. Liturgy Is Not Dead

Don't buy the hype that we need to toss out the Liturgy or strip our churches bare of liturgical accouterments because "modern" people want something different. The Liturgy is not dead, though our celebration of it may be. Liturgical worship is rich, passionate and truly transcendent; however the ways in which we celebrate the liturgy may seem otherwise. Instead of throwing away something beautiful, let's embrace the rich themes, symbols, and images of the liturgy as it provides an experiential framework and for an entire year of events, activities, and joy-filled worship.
