BIRTH AND DEATH CERTIFICATES

BREAST AND CERVICAL CANCER SCREENING REFERRALS YEAR-ROUND

REACH PROGRAM HAS OPEN ENROLLMENT

The REACH health care program for uninsured adults has open enrollment for new qualifying applicants. Applicants will need to make an appointment to submit an application. To make an appointment or for more information, call 410-222-7020. REACH offers county residents low-cost doctor visits, checkups, prescription medicine, lab work and tests, radiology services and dental services.

DENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

The Department of Health provides dental services by appointment to income-eligible children, young adults, expectant mothers and to adult participants in the county REACH program. Dental clinic locations are in Annapolis (3 Harry S. Truman Parkway, 410-222-7138) and in Glen Burnie (North County Health Building, 791 Aquahart Road, 410-222-6861). Services include cleaning, fluoride treatment, periodontal treatment, sealants, fillings, root canals, extractions, crowns, bridges, oral health education and dental health referrals.

SUBSTANCE MISUSE TREATMENT SERVICES

Substance misuse assessment, referrals and treatment services are available through the Department of Health. For details, call 410-222-0117. Methadone and Suboxone maintenance services (for opiate-addicted adults) are available. For information, call 410-222-0100.

SAFE STATIONS INITIATIVE

Anne Arundel County and Annapolis City fire and police stations are designated safe environments for individuals seeking assistance from heroin/opioid addiction. Those seeking help can visit any fire or police station 24/7 to be linked with a substance use disorder treatment program.

STAR (Screening Teens to Access Recovery)

The Anne Arundel County STAR Program allows school health nurses to utilize technology to connect public high school students in a video tele-session with a Department of Health licensed therapist. High school students can go to their health room during the school day for help with substance use issues.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SERVICES FOR CHILDREN AND TEENS

The Department of Health provides outpatient mental health and substance use disorder treatment for 4- to 18-year-old children and their families without private medical insurance. For more information, call 410-222-6785.

DRUG AND ALCOHOL USE PREVENTION AND EDUCATION FOR COUNTY YOUTH

The Prevention and Education Services Office helps to increase awareness of the risks associated with drug and alcohol use among young people in Anne Arundel County. The program provides information, training, presentations and exhibits to county schools, after-school programs, community groups, faith-based programs and parent groups. HIV/AIDS/STI SERVICES

The Department of Health offers free, confidential testing and counseling for HIV, the virus that can cause AIDS. ADULT EVALUATION AND REVIEW SERVICES (AERS)

AERS nurses and social workers provide inperson assessments of individuals with chronic illnesses or disabilities. AERS provides plans of care and referrals for those who require community assistance and Medical Assistancefunded care. For details, call 410-222-4361.

MEDICAL ASSISTANCE TRANSPORTATION

The Department of Health provides medical transportation services for eligible Medical Assistance (MA)/HealthChoice clients. Individuals with a valid Maryland MA/HealthChoice card and no means of public or private transportation may be eligible. For information, call 410-222-7152.

ADMINISTRATIVE CARE COORDINATION PROGRAM (ACC)

ACC provides services to clients who are enrolled in (or eligible for) Medical Assistance and HealthChoice to help them access health care. Short-term care coordination may be provided for certain groups. The Ombudsman investigates issues with managed care organizations. CHILDREN'S IMMUNIZATIONS

Your baby needs immunizations at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, and between 12 and 18 months. Boosters are given prior to entering kindergarten. FOOD FACILITY INSPECTION REPORTS

WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC)

The WIC supplemental nutrition program provides free nutritious foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding support and resource referrals for pregnant, breastfeeding and postpartum women and to infants and children up to age 5. OPIOID OVERDOSE RESPONSE TRAINING

FREE Opioid Overdose Response Training and Naloxone Kit

The Anne Arundel County Department of Health offers free training to community members on the use of intranasal naloxone to reverse an opioid overdose and prevent

death. Trainees will receive a free naloxone nasal kit to administer to victims of opioid overdose.

Who Should Attend?

- At-risk individuals, family members, friends and associates of someone who is using and at risk for overdosing on heroin or prescription pain medications. Teens under 18 may take the training if accompanied by a parent orgunidan.
- Staff and volunteers with treatment programs, recovery services and transitional housing.
- Anyone working with the public.

What Will I Learn?



Training will incorporate the following information:

- What an opioid is.
- How to recognize, respond to and prevent an opioid overdose.
- · How to administer the naloxone intranasally.
- Information about the Good Samaritan Law, treatment and recovery services and family support.

What Is Naloxone?

Naloxone is a prescription medication that is used to reverse an opioid overdose. It cannot be used to get "high" and is not addictive.

New Year, New Goals— Quit Smoking or Vaping Today!

Department of Health and Community Medical Partners Provide Free Quit-Smoking Resources

Are you thinking about quitting smoking or vaping? Choose to quit in 2020! The Learn To Live program at the Anne Arundel County Department of Health offers free self-help information to assist adults in quitting.

Quit-Smoking Kit (available in English and Spanish): Provides adults with steps for
quitting and staying smoke-free. To request a kit, call the Learn To Live Line at 410-2227979 or the Spanish Language Line at 410-222-4479. Kits can also be ordered or
downloaded at www.MyQuitKit.org.

The Department of Health, in partnership with community health care providers, sponsors free quit-smoking classes for adults who live, work or attend school in the county. The classes include counseling and may offer patches, gum or other FDA-approved nicotine replacement therapy. Pre-registration is required. Kits and Online Class Provide Advice on Home Safety for Babies and Toddlers

The Anne Arundel County Department of Health offers free Healthy Babies and Healthy Pregnancy Kits that contain information about home safety for infants and toddlers. County residents can order the kits on the Department of Health's website, www.aahealthybabies.org, or by calling 410-222-7223.

A free online Home Safety class is also available at www.aahealthybabies.org. The Home Safety class certificate of completion provides one credit toward the Continuing Training Certificate from the Maryland Department of Education Office of Child Care.

The kits and class, which are helpful for parents, parents-to-be, grandparents and childcare providers, include the following tips on preventing injuries and fatalities.

Poisoning

- Keep medicine and poisons out of sight and reach. Visit www.aahealth.org/MEDS for more information. If there is a poisoning emergency, call the Maryland Poison Center at 1-800-222-1222.
- Put safety latches or locks on drawers and cabinets in the home, storage sheds and garages.
- Hide or securely cover trash cans.

Falls

- Use baby gates and window guards.
- Secure furniture and televisions so that they cannot tip over if pulled.

Burns

- Keep matches, lighters and lit candles out of reach.
- Keep your child away from hot surfaces such as stoves, fireplaces and heaters.
- Always check the water temperature before placing your child in a bath.

Injury Treatment

- Keep first aid kits in your home, car and diaper bag.
- Call your health care provider for injuries that need treatment.
- Call 911 if injuries are severe or for any head injuries.

Anne Arundel County Department of Health Provides In-School Vision and Hearing Screenings

Anne Arundel County Department of Health vision and hearing technicians and school nurses conduct mandated vision and hearing screenings in public schools each year. The screenings are for children in preschool, kindergarten, first and eighth grade, and for students new to Anne Arundel County schools. Special education students receiving speech therapy may also be recommended for screening. Department of Health vision and hearing technicians also administer vision and hearing screenings at private schools, nurseries and day care programs to ensure that the appropriate children are screened. Children who wear glasses should bring them to school on the day of the screening. Students in the following schools and programs will be screened in January:

Children are screened in order to detect vision or hearing problems that may impair a child's ability to perform successfully in school. If a potential deficiency is detected, a letter is sent to the parents or legal guardians informing them of the results. The parents are advised to contact the child's doctor for further testing and advice.
